Santa Barbara County's Children

- 105,127 children under the age of 18 years live in Santa Barbara County in 2009
- 33% of these children are under six years old, 67% are school-aged
- Children and youth make up 24% of the total population
- 16% of children under 18 live in poverty

Children in Poverty

- In 2008, a family of two adults and two children was considered poor if their annual income fell below \$21,834. To qualify for
 - Food Stamps a family's net income cannot exceed the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)
 - CalWORKS a family's net income cannot exceed roughly half the FPL
 - "Zero Share of Cost Medi-Cal" depending on the age of the child, a family's net income cannot exceed between 100%-200% of FPL

STRATEGY 1 - Collect and analyze information on the well-being of children

- 2008 Scorecard re-organized around three major domains determined to be important to the well-being of children
- Committee reviewed and analyzed trends over eight years for chosen indicators
- Local context added to each data indicator

- Web-based database funded by the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health continues to provide over 180 indicators to the public

2008 Scorecard

- The rate of child abuse and neglect is highest for infants 0-1 years old.
- One fourth to one third of WIC pre-school kids were overweight or at risk. This trend continues with 7th and 9th graders.
- Test scores of Santa Barbara County's students mirror the state-wide achievement gap, which remains constant across grades.

"In California, the achievement gap is defined as the disparity between white students and other ethnic groups and between English learners and native English speakers, socio-economically disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged, and students with disabilities as compared to students without disabilities."

North County Summit

- Engage community-based and faith-based groups to help reach families that are not receiving services and to tap into their resources and supports
- Increase efforts to reach out through the media and other free or low-cost channels to increase the public's understanding of the issue and provide prevention education

Three-Year Plan for Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention

 The majority (75-80%) of the County's substantiated child abuse cases are due to general and severe neglect or caretaker incapacity. This neglect is most frequently caused by substance abuse, mental health issues or severe family stress.

Three-Year Plan for Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention

- Child abuse and neglect occurs county-wide, but the North County region shows a significantly higher need for services based on a variety of indicators, including the origin of 65-70% of all referrals.
- Prevention services available before a crisis occurs are not sufficiently promoted and/or available in the community.

Fiscal Challenges Affecting Our Children

KIDS Network Domains

- Children and youth are safe and supported by families and communities
- Children and youth are healthy and thrive
- Children and youth are "ready to learn" and will succeed in school



Child Care & Afterschool

- Latchkey Program cut
- CalWORKS childcare reduced

Social Services

- Reduced CWS funding
- Foster Homes underfunded
- CalWORKS grants reduced to ~ 45% of FPL

Juvenile Justice

 Juvenile Probation resources reduced by 21% resulting in program changes and staffing reductions



Health Insurance

- Healthy Families copay increase
- Healthy Kids funding loss

Child and Adolescent Services

- Staffing loss resulting in service reduction
- Teenage pregnancy programs cut

Dental California Children Services

- Oral health education and screening cut
- Staffing and reimbursement loss



K-12 Education

- Roughly \$800 cut in general revenue per student
- Additional individual cuts for categorical programs

Support Services

- Mental Health Services
- Family Support Services (Healthy Start)

Children with Special Needs

- Early Start
- Support Funds
- Regional Centers



Recommendations

- Maintain prevention-focus as though it were a mandate
- Focus attention to identify and strengthen untapped and underutilized community resources
- Target data for decision-making
