I respectfully submit this, and am it total alignment with the undersigned in the attached document.

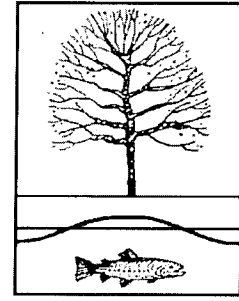
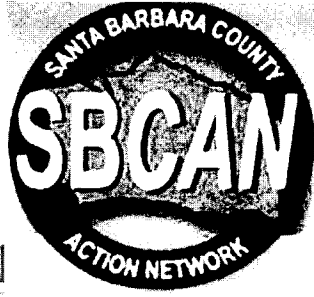

Re: Rancho La Laguna Appeal - DENY

Dear Honorable Chair and Supervisors:


The community organizations listed below submit this letter to express our strong support for the Planning Commission's denial of the Rancho La Laguna Project. This rural subdivision is inconsistent with the Santa Barbara County Comprehensive Plan's Agricultural Element Goals and Policies, and with the site's Agricultural Commercial ("AC") land use designation. We recommend denial of the applicants' appeal based on the following reasons in order to protect the County's agricultural resources, to protect the natural resources in the Santa Ynez Valley, and to ensure sound land use planning.

- The Project would convert a 4,000-acre Ranch, containing one house and one cabin and used for grazing and cultivation, to 13 individual parcels with no guarantee of continued agricultural use.
- The Project violates the County's AC land use designation because the primary purpose of this subdivision is to build more homes and provide separate residential estates, not to continue commercial agricultural production.
- The fact that agriculture is not the primary purpose is evidenced by the fact that the owners and applicants let the Williamson Act contract expire and refuse to require continued combined agricultural operations.
- The Project also violates the policies in the County's Agriculture Element that require continued and enhanced agriculture, and the EIR fails to disclose the Project's inconsistency with many Comprehensive Plan policies protecting agriculture and land use compatibility.
- The Project violates County policies protecting water quality, oak woodlands, native grasslands and habitat for rare species. The Ranch abuts the Los Padres National Forest and contains vast habitat for wildlife.
- The EIR does not contain complete information about the development potential or environmental setting, and thus the analysis of environmental impact is inadequate.

Approval of this Project would establish a precedent for subdivisions throughout the Santa Ynez Valley and other County rural areas, in direct contravention to the County's Comprehensive Plan. For these reasons, we urge you to deny this Project.
