I'm writing as a concerned citizen of Santa Barbara County. The Board of Supervisors should deny Sable's application to transfer permits for the Santa Ynez Unit, POPCO Gas Plant, and Las Flores Pipelines.

We learned as a result of the devasting 2015 oil spill that the pipelines that carry oil from the offshore platforms to the Las Flores processing facility are corroded and not safe to operate. Another spill from these facilities is likely and would be devastating to Santa Barbara County and the Gaviota Coast.

Sable likely cannot afford to cover the cost of remediation when another major spill occurs, which it most certainly will with the condition of the pipeline. Sable has not provided any assurances that it will be able to pay to decommission its facilities in that scenario.
