Recommended Actions:

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors:

- a) Receive and file a brief update on the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) and Santa Barbara County’s response and operations;
- b) Provide any direction, as appropriate; and
- c) Determine that the above actions are not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), because pursuant to sections 15378(b)(4) and 15378(b)(5) the recommended actions consist of organizational, administrative or fiscal activities of government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

Summary

Staff will provide the most recent information on the status of COVID-19 cases at the Board of Supervisors’ meeting. Santa Barbara County remains in the Orange Tier for reopening and is preparing for California’s “Beyond the Blueprint” on June 15 and the County’s reopening plan. Santa Barbara County met the metrics for the yellow tier reopening on June 1, indicating the County’s meeting the yellow tier metrics. If SBC meets the yellow metrics for another week, we will move to the yellow tier on Tuesday

June 8, effective June 9. Circumstances, number of cases in the County, and vaccination updates are changing daily with the most updated information on the Public Health information portal at <https://publichealthsb.org>.

Discussion

Since March 2020, County Public Health has consistently informed the Board of Supervisors and the community at large about the status of the disease of communities, demographics of those impacted, status of health officer orders, status of schools and waivers, state monitoring metrics, hospital beds and ICU capacity, vaccine planning and distribution, guidance and updates from the California Department of Public Health, RISE Guide changes, business industry activity and outreach efforts. On August 28, 2020, the Governor unveiled a coronavirus four-tier, color-monitoring system for counties, which replaced the County Monitoring List.

Timeline of Santa Barbara County Movement through the tiers:

- September 29, 2020: Tier 2 – Substantial/Red
- November 16, 2020: SBC reverted to Tier 1 – Widespread/ Purple
- December 6, 2020: The County as part of the Southern California Region fell below 15% ICU capacity which triggered the Regional Stay at Home Order, which ended on January 25, 2021.
- January 26, 2021: Tier 1 – Widespread/ Purple
- March 16, 2021: Tier 2 – Substantial/ Red
- April 21, 2021: Tier 3 – Moderate/ Orange Santa Barbara County remains in the Orange Tier.

COVID-19 vaccination is one of the most important tools to end the COVID-19 pandemic. The State is prioritizing vaccines for equitable distribution to everyone in California who wants it. Current information on the County's vaccination plan is available on the County's website at publichealthsb.org.

Background

Emergency Proclamations and Health Orders. Since March 4, 2020, there has been a number of emergency proclamations and health orders related to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19). These can be found at: <https://publichealthsb.org/health-officer-orders/>

As of, April 21, 2021 the County Public Health Officer issued [County Health Officer Order 2021-12.7](#), that updated information relating to phased reopening into the orange tier. Movement into the Orange Tier resulted in increased capacity limits in many indoor operations, with modifications. As of June 2, 2021, SBC remains in the Orange Tier. The State of California is still following the Four-Tier colored system for reopening until June 15, 2021.

On April 6, CPDH announced “Beyond the Blueprint” for a Safer Economy where on June 15, 2021, California will fully open its economy if the two criteria listed below are met:

- 1) Equitable vaccine availability: if vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians 16 years or older who wish to be vaccinated, and
- 2) Consistently low burden of disease: hospitalizations are stable and low, and specifically, hospitalizations among fully vaccinated individuals are low.

On May 21, 2021, California announced the details of the state's full reopening plan. When California fully reopens the economy on June 15, 2021, the State will move beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy. Beginning June 15, 2021, businesses will be able to return to usual operations with limited exceptions for mega events. The updated framework clarifies that physical distancing and capacity

limitations will no longer be required for most businesses. Employers are still subject to the Cal/OSHA COVID-19 Prevention Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS).

On April 13, 2021, the State added an addendum to the Blueprint Sector Chart which addressed several things for industry/sectors, including how to address vaccinated-only sections for industries that have capacity bonuses for testing/vaccination only sections; capacity bonuses for other sectors that may not have them already included in either the Blueprint chart or their guidance themselves; and verification of testing and fully-vaccinated.

On April 6, 2021, California reached its second Statewide Vaccine Equity Metric Goal to administer 4 million doses to persons living in the Vaccine Equity Quartile, and tier case rate ranges have changed for the Red, Orange and Yellow tiers. The Blueprint has been updated to reflect ranges of 6-10, 2-5.9, and less than 2 cases per 100,000 for the Red, Orange, and Yellow tiers, respectively. The tables below reflect the new metric tier thresholds.

County's response and objectives. The County developed a list of objectives in response to the public health emergency. The list of objectives can be found in [Board Letter](#) from May 4, 2021.

Vaccines. Local vaccine distribution updates are available on the Public Health website at <https://publichealthsb.org/vaccine/>. The Santa Barbara County Health Department will continue to follow guidelines from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) to prioritize vaccine distribution. Additional information on the vaccine distribution plan can be found at publichealthsb.org.

As of April 1, Governor Newsome expanded vaccine eligibility to all Californians 50+ as of April 1, 2021 and to all Californians ages 16+ as of April 15, 2021. Santa Barbara County opened vaccine eligibility to all residents ages 16 and older as of April 5, 2021 at the Public Health Community Vaccination clinics. On March 28, 2021, the County began the rotating vaccine clinics as part of the Health Center COVID-19 Vaccine Program, with clinics rotating in the cities of Lompoc, Santa Maria, and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara County currently has mobile vaccination clinics where all Californians ages 16+ may be vaccinated. Santa Barbara County vaccination clinics are now accepting walk-ins for all who wish to receive the vaccine. Emergency Operations Center. The response effort is coordinated through the Public Health Department's Department Operations Center (DOC), with support from the County's Emergency

Operations Center (EOC) focused on mitigating the spread of COVID-19, reducing the potential overload to the health care system and reopening the community in a safe manner. The EOC closed the call center operations on May 28, 2021 as a result in significant decrease in call volume. County Department Operations. County departments have activated their Continuity of Operations Plans (COOPs) and are prioritizing essential services, although other non-essential work also continues. All County employees are Disaster Service Workers and have been instructed to continue to report to work (on-site or tele-working) unless unable to do so. Departments have been instructed to follow health safety protocols for COVID-19 for any employees on-site and are currently planning for “Beyond the Blueprint” after June 15.

RISE Business Activity. The County published the Santa Barbara County Reopening in Safe Environment, or RISE Guide on May 15, 2020 within the framework of the Governor’s Resilience Roadmap (now Blueprint for a Safer Economy). With the move “Beyond the Blueprint, on June 15, the RISE program will be lifted but the recoverysbc.org will remain up to date with resources for local businesses.

Response Costs and Funding.

On March 6, 2021, the federal government approved an additional stimulus package for COVID19 relief entitled the American Rescue Plan Act. Included in the \$1.9 trillion package was \$350 billion in direct funding to states, territories, tribes, counties and municipalities, \$10 billion for coronavirus capital projects, and \$1.5 billion over two years for revenue sharing counties. Santa Barbara County’s direct allocation was approximately \$86.6 million. In addition to direct funding to local governments, the American Rescue Plan Act increased funding for various programs available for small businesses, created several new programs to aid small business, and provided various funding avenues for residents.
