A sincere thank you to Supervisors Capps, Lee and Nelson for holding a community meeting to discuss the Cannabis agenda items this past Friday IN Carpinteria.

Please thoughtfully consider how to mitigate the enormous nuisance that the skunk odor has caused throughout the community. However, this should not be the only item to be addressed. We hope that you re-examine and correct many of the faulty conclusions/decisions that have been made in regard to the amount of acreage permitted for cannabis grows, the proposed processing facility, the manner in which this industry is being taxed and the permitting/ licensing procedures.

As to the Agenda items slated for consideration at this Tuesday's meeting:

1. Measuring odor at the vents with gas chromatography is the ONLY sane option.

Ditch the unreliable, subjective Nasal Ranger idea. There should simply be no odor and no polluting of the

air. Capture and filter all of the emissions and odors before they are expelled from the vents.

2. No extensions shall be granted for the installation of the required systems beyond 3 months of the S.B. Board's

acted upon). The County must proactively do regular site visits/inspections to verify that the proper technology is installed and being properly used.

Thank you for recently holding a public community meeting at Carpinteria's City Hall. I really appreciate your listening to the community's concerns regarding amending the cannabis ordinance.

It is imperative that any changes and requirements of the cannabis ordinance be enforceable. Unfortunately, many cannabis growers have agreed in the past to install carbon filter scrubbers in their greenhouses and to this day the majority have not done so. Therefore, requiring the installation of BETA tested effective multi-technology carbon filter scrubbers will not occur within any timeline Unless the growers are required to do so with the threat of losing their business license. I do believe that having the cannabis growers sign an affidavit stating that they have installed carbon filter scrubbers, in the number recommended by the manufacturer, is a good start. Nasal Rangers are too subjective and are not reliable when used outdoors. The Ecosorb and Benzaco, used in many vapor phase systems, has been proven harmful to the environment and health of employees and residents and needs to be discontinued immediately. The neighbors of the cannabis growers have had to endure the skunk like odors for too long. Thus, there should be 0 D/T odors detected.

The cannabis growers need to document that they are using their carbon filter scrubbers by using run time meters that can verify their use. Also, the cannabis growers need to be responsible for documenting that they have received and corrected any odor complaint issues that arise immediately. The cannabis growers need to be responsible for notifying the public within 1,000 ft. when they apply for a new OAP. Public Comments to Proposed Revisions to Santa Barbara County Cannabis Ordinance

Dear Board of Supervisors,

This written statement is intended to be a follow up to the in-person public comments provided to you at the March 14th meeting in Carpinteria.

First off, we want to express our profound appreciation for the Board's interest in revisiting the Cannabis Ordinance and for your efforts to come to Carpinteria to hear from residents firsthand. As you are aware, local residents across the County and in particular Carpinteria have been significantly impacted by foul odors from cannabis growing operations for several years now. Your renewed focus provides us hope that meaningful change may finally be a possibility.

With regard to the solutions for detecting and containing cannabis terpene emissions and foul odors we recommend the Board consider the following:

- 1. NO IMPACTS from cannabis growing and processing emissions, i.e. no smell, should be considered acceptable. The County should therefore state ZERO IMPACT to be an essential goal of the revised ordinance.
- 2. <u>Carbon filtration</u> is currently the best available technology and should be required of all cannabis operations. In order for this technology to be effective, the County should mandate that carbon

filtration systems need to be properly engineered and approved by qualified experts and must be maintained on an ongoing process.

- 3. Require cannabis operators to <u>submit an implementation plan as of the effective date of the new ordinance</u> and present a reasonable timeframe for implementation. As power upgrades can be a concern, cannabis operators must include evidence at the time of submitting their plan that they have requested and have received a response from Southern CA Edison as to the timing of the electrical upgrade.
- 4. Re. odor detection, many will agree that use of the Nasal Ranger presents challenges as this is a rather crude instrument for monitoring. Cannabis odor is also known to drift across the Carpinteria Valley in various directions at different times. The ability to pinpoint the source is thus the key to successful monitoring and enforcement. Just as cannabis odor containment technology is evolving, so too is odor detection technology. Therefore we recommend that if the County decides to implement use of the Nasal Ranger, this be a temporary odor technology and that gas chromatography and other state-of-the-art technologies, applied "at the tailpipe", be explored concurrently with the intent to implement a more effective monitoring technology in the near future. It should be noted that gas chromatography has been used in many other industrial applications where emissions are involved and therefore implementation for terpene detection in the air (the primary cause of foul odor) should be well within the realm of possibilities. We recommend the Board establish a reasonably aggressive timeframe for study and implementation of gas chromatography and related technology for odor detection at the source.
- 5. Given the inadequacies of the Nasal Ranger, it is also critical that the County fix the feedback loop of odor complaints by residents. Human odor detection is a technology that should not be underrated or underutilized. We recommend the implementation of a mobile phone app that allows for quick, real-time reporting and follow-up. Such an app will facilitate more widespread participation in reporting by affected residents and can also provide useful tools automated geocoding and reporting allowing the County to evaluate odor "clusters", correlate timing of human smell detection, etc. Real-time reporting of incidents from the mobile app can, with graphic overlay possible, can also be made available to the public and cannabis growers alike. A more efficient, real-time system of reporting and tracking resident odor complaints will also aid the County in defending the revised Cannabis Ordinance in the event a grower(s) files a lawsuit challenging Nasal Ranger thresholds or other elements of enforcement. Transparency of odor reporting and documentation of follow up will

provide a valuable "check" on operators, allow for monitoring of progress and help instill much

needed confidence in the public.

6. Enforcement of the new cannabis ordinance needs to have teeth. It is critical for cannabis

operators to know that the County is in fact serious about solving the odor issue and will stay on task

until the problem is fixed. This will go a long way in helping rebuild public confidence.

Lastly, we recommend the Board revisit the June 2020 Grand Jury report and provide the public a

statement as to the County's revised priorities with respect to cannabis industry development. The

Grand Jury report represented an earnest fact-finding effort by local citizens that highlighted evidence

that development of a robust cannabis industry in Santa Barbara County was a top priority, implicitly

at the expense of the well-being of residents. The response to the Grand Jury report from the then-

Board of Supervisors at the time of public issuance was most unfortunate, reflecting a tone deafness

to resident concerns. Citizens of Carpinteria and the County would appreciate a public statement as

to the revised priority of the Board in placing the public interest and well-being first.

We again thank the Board for its efforts to date in restoring the faith of the public that County

leadership is committed to solving the foul odor and related issues from cannabis production in our

County.

Thank you for coming last week to Carpinteria to hear first hand the community's concerns regarding the impacts from local cannabis cultivation and the vapor phase systems and to hear suggestions how to solve these problems. For these past 7 years Carpinteria has felt like an "abandoned child" so it was nice to have been finally heard.

- 1. Require cannabis cultivators in Carpinteria to install BETA tested multi technology carbon filtration units (8-12 per acre) ASAP or by March 31, 2026.
- 2. Require cannabis cultivators in Carpinteria to sign an affidavit attesting to this installation ASAP or by March 31, 2026.
- 3. Require removal of vapor phase systems by March 31, 2026.
- 4. There must be **no odor** experienced in the community.
- 5. Use gas chromatography to measure odor at the vents. It's the only system known to identify the source of the odor.
- 6.. Adopt a compliance program that is proactive that must include the following:
- a. Run-time meters showing the equipment is running 24/7.
- b. Replacement of carbon filters must be documented and verified.
- c. Growers must be responsible for detecting whether their odor is escaping from their vents, They must document this via internet/computer systems.
- d. Growers must let the county know when there have been odor incidents and have their corrections verified.
- 7. Use of the Nasal Ranger at the property line will not solve the odor issues.
- a. According to the Nasal Ranger's manual, the Nasal Ranger is not designed for outdoor use.
- b. Calibration takes 20 minutes.
- c. Use of the nasal ranger can be subjective.
- d. There's a time lag between when an odor is noticed (middle of the night, early in the morning, weekends), logging in the complaint, and then having someone come out to measure.
- e. How many places along the property is this instrument going to be used?
- f. The Nasal Ranger can't identify the source when cultivation sites are so close to each other.
- 8. Using the Nasal Ranger to measure an odor below 7D/T will not work. The number 7 indicates a noticeable odor, 4 indicates a faint odor, 2 indicates a very faint odor, 0 indicates no odor.
- 9. **No extensions** beyond the due date March 31, 2026. That's still a year away and everyone here in Carpinteria has been dealing with this for the last 7 years.

- 10. **Notify the public within 1000' when the new OAP is submitted with the new contact information.** This information would have been previously given out 7 years ago when the original application to grow cannabis was submitted. Since we now know the odors are traveling like a cloud more than a 1000', notification of new OAPs Approval needs to also be included in the local paper.
- 11. Notify the public via the local newspaper when the annual review of the annual business license is being reviewed and when the review is completed with the County contact information included.
- 13. It would be good to create a phone app similar to SmellMyCity that wouldn't require stopping and pulling over to notify the county of an odor concern.

Thank you for your consideration in finally making some changes to Chapter 50 and Chapter 35.

County Supervisors,

I am a resident of Padaro Lane, since 1982, who's been smelling the pot odor off and on, and mostly on, since cannabis was made legal 8 years ago.

I have supported numerous appeals of cannabis farm permits, only to be denied repeatedly. Now, with Roy Lee in the First District, there's a chance to finally be listened to.

This is the board's opportunity to right the wrong they've done to County residents with the poorly written cannabis ordinances. It's your moment to make sweeping improvements to the air quality in the Carpinteria Valley and to improve the quality of life of its 16,000+ residents. It will also help property values, and hence your incoming property taxes, which are the County's largest source of income.

I hope you will implement stricter odor ordinances that will actually work and be enforceable.

I don't profess to be expert on what the best current technologies are to prevent cannabis odor, but so many people are counting on you to make the Carpinteria farms implement those technologies, require enough of them per acre to prevent odor, and enforce the new requirements with strict punishments. The Planning & Development's recommendations to Chapter 35 are not strong enough, and I support the following recommendations:

Multi technology carbon filtration units installed 10 per acre, no later than six (6) months after board adoption. One year is too long; and six months is plenty of time to order and install the units. There must be no extensions granted on the above timeline.

Readjust the Planning Commission's formula for acceptable odor on the Nasal Ranger from "below 7 D/T" to "below 4 D/T."

The County should adopt a program of annual inspections of each farm, before renewing each farm's business license.

The inspectors should count the number of working filtration units per acre, as well as perform an odor test at the property line.

Noncompliance and/or continued odor complaints not corrected within 30 days should result in the revocation of the annual business license. (This needs to be added to Chapter 50.)

In addition to the above regulations, we ask that the County Supervisors do the smart thing and put a temporary moratorium on all new cannabis farm permits within 1,000 feet of Carpinteria residents. The supply is clearly higher than the demand, causing farms to shut down, and causing a lack of taxable income from the farms to the County. Adding more farms will only increase the problem. This moratorium will be a win-win for the residents and the existing cannabis farms, and thus for the County itself.
