PROJECT TITLE: The Santa Barbara County Local Road Safety Plan, all Supervisorial Districts

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The Public Works Department requests the Board of Supervisors approve, authorize, adopt and implement the Santa Barbara County Local Road Safety Plan (LRSP). The LRSP looks at the entire transportation network more programmatically. It considers risk factors, roadway configurations, volumes, and other data for all county roads and indicates effective countermeasures to enhance safety for the entire transportation network. The LRSP information establishes general policy and procedure making and with this information, uniform improvements can be made to the entire transportation system to reduce the potential for collisions.
