Passage of Senate Bill 946: Sidewalk Vending

Defined as: A person who sells food or merchandise from a pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon showcase, rack, or other non-motorized conveyance upon a public sidewalk or other pedestrian path.

Establishes parameters for regulation.

Intent to decriminalize sidewalk vending no criminal citations only administrative/civil.

And to promote entrepreneurship and accessibility into the local economy.



SB 946: Sidewalk Vending

Ends criminalization of sidewalk vending in California and allows authorities to develop non-criminal laws to protect public health, safety, and welfare.

Local Authorities Can:

- Limit hours of operation
- Prohibit stationary sidewalk vending in residential areas
- Prohibit sidewalk vending near farmers' markets, swap meets, and temporary special permit areas

Require vendors to comply with the Americans with Disability Act (for example, vendors cannot block curb ramps).

Require a permit or license.

Request certain information about the business' operations (name, mailing address, type of sale).



SB 946: Sidewalk Vending

Here is what local authorities CAN'T do:

Require sidewalk vendors to operate in a specific area, unless the local authority is restricting vending to protect the community's health, safety, or welfare.

Require vendors to ask permission from businesses or anyone besides the government.

Prohibit sidewalk vendors from operating in public parks, unless the park has a concession agreement, or the park is restricting vending in to protect the community's health, safety, or welfare.

Restrict the number of sidewalk vendors, unless limitation of the number of vendors is to protect the community's health, safety, or welfare.



SB 972: Compact Mobile Food Operations

Updates CA Retail Food Code as of January 2023

Generally, allows for an expanded definition of "limited food preparation" and makes it easier for food carts to obtain a Health Permit.

Exempts food vendors with small quantities of whole fruit and prepackaged food.

Environmental Health issues permits for CMFO.











 Food safety & sanitation concerns – interior of vehicles that store and transport food




