Recommended Actions:

Set a hearing on the Departmental Agenda of September 10, 2013 to:

- A. Consider the introduction (first reading) of an ordinance amending Article III of Chapter 29 of the Santa Barbara County Code Relating to the Regulation of Fats, Oils and Grease to the Laguna County Sanitation District;
- B. Set hearing on the Administrative Agenda of September 17, 2013 to:
 1. Consider adoption (second reading) of an ordinance amending Article III of Chapter 29 of the Santa Barbara County Code Relating to the Regulation of Fats, Oils and Grease to the the Laguna County Sanitation District; and
 2. Find that the proposed ordinance amendment is for the protection of the environment and does not involve construction activities or relaxation of standards and is therefore exempt

from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to 14 CCR 15308 (Actions by Regulatory Agencies for the Protection of the Environment) and approve the filing of a Notice of Exemption on that basis.

Summary Text:

These actions recommend the adoption of an ordinance that would control the discharge of fats, oils and grease from applicable food service establishments after its effective date. The regulation is intended to minimize sewer overflows, prevent damage to district facilities, protect the health and safety of the public, and comply with state regulations pursuant the State Water Resources Control Board *Order No. 2006-0003, Statewide General Waste Discharge Requirements for Sanitary Sewer Systems*. These actions are categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15308 as they are being implemented to protect the environment.

Background:

The State Water Resources Control Board adopted *Order No. 2006-0003, Statewide General Waste Discharge Requirements for Sanitary Sewer Systems* on May 2, 2006. This order was to better control efforts related to preventing the overflow of untreated wastewater from sewer systems and to unify sewer system management practices statewide. Any public agency that owns a sewer collection system exceeding one mile in length was required to enroll in the statewide general permit. Amongst other things, an agency was required to prepare a sewer system management plan (SSMP) that established procedures, programs and goals to prevent wastewater overflows. The Board of Supervisors acting as the ex-officio Board of Directors of the Laguna County Sanitation District adopted the SSMP on November 6, 2007.

Because the primary reason for sewer backups is cooking grease accumulation, agencies were prompted to review and update existing policies, practices and ordinances. While certain regulatory capabilities already existed to control fats, oils, and grease generated by food service establishment, the state recommended certain aspects of each agency's sewer use ordinance to include certain elements specifically intended to better regulate this source of waste. While current policy allows for the regulation of grease traps or interceptors for food service establishments, these actions implement additional best management practices regarding their operation and clearly establishes authority, criteria, and policy.
