Recommended Actions:

That the Board of Supervisors:

A. Authorize the Chief Probation Officer, as your lead agent, to submit the Application for Approval to the Corrections Standards Authority (CSA) in order to utilize eleventh year funding in the amount of \$991,491 allocated to Santa Barbara County under the Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA), from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012.

B. Assure that the County will adhere to the CSA's contract terms and statutory requirements, participate in the collection of the required data, and use grant funding to supplement and not supplant existing programs.

Summary Text:

The use of JJCPA funds responds to further reduction in the program's annual allotment, while simultaneously continuing to address the primary areas of concern regarding at-risk juveniles and juvenile offenders. The 2010 Comprehensive Multi-agency Juvenile Justice Plan (CMJJP) identifies gangs, substance abuse and mental health issues, and gender-specific services among at-risk juveniles and juvenile offenders as priorities of the juvenile justice system. Funds provided through the JJCPA

remain geared toward these and related issues. The current use of JJCPA funds is consistent with past years' uses.

The Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC), at their April 1, 2011, meeting, voted to use JJCPA funds to continue to support five School-Based Officer (SBO) Deputy Probation Officer (DPO) positions in the School-Based Officer and Truancy Intervention Program throughout the County, and three Early Intervention (El) DPOs in the Early Intervention Program in each of the geographic regions. Additionally, JJCPA funds support an Alcohol, Drug and Mental Health Services clinician to perform mental health assessments on selected juvenile offenders on the El caseloads. The funding of the DPOs and clinician remains consistent with past years. Funding levels for Community-Based Organizations (CBO) providing services to juvenile offenders under JJCPA remain the same as the previous year.

Background:

Assembly Bill 1913 was signed into law on September 7, 2000, as the Schiff-Cardenas Crime Prevention Act. Subsequent legislation renamed it the JJCPA. The JJCPA is a state funded initiative that supports juvenile probation programs with a record of reducing crime and delinquency among atrisk youth and young offenders. The JJCPA requires each participating county to establish and maintain a multi-agency JJCC for the purpose of developing, reviewing, and updating a comprehensive multi-agency juvenile justice plan (CMJJP) that documents the condition of the local juvenile justice system and outlines proposed efforts to fill identified service gaps.

The CMJJP is reviewed annually and revised as necessary by the JJCC. There are no recommended modifications to the current plan and no changes in the currently funded programs. Consequently, the only updates submitted to the State will be specific to current data and related criminal trends.

Santa Barbara County funding under JJCPA was historically used for three core programs: Truancy Mediation, Initial Assessment/First Offender Intervention, and Aftercare Services. Due to reductions in annual JJCPA allocations, the original truancy component was modified and the aftercare component and one Assessor was redirected from this funding source in FY 2008-2009; as were the remaining two Assessors in FY 2010-11. Probation utilized funds from the Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) to fund the Assessors and the Aftercare component. In addition to JJCPA, the Probation Department utilizes a variety of other funding sources to provide services to at-risk juveniles, juvenile offenders, and their families. These sources include Federal Title IV-E funds, Juvenile Camp and Probation Funding, County General Fund Support, and YOBG funds.

The two remaining Programs funded through JJCPA are the School-Based Officers and Truancy Intervention and Early Intervention.

The five SBOs serve secondary, continuation, and community school campuses throughout the county, and work closely with school staff and administration. They coordinate their activities with law enforcement's School Resource Officers (SRO) and work collaboratively with CBOs. The SBOs presence on school campuses has a deterrent effect and is widely praised by school administrators and SROs for preventing criminal acts or otherwise discouraging delinquent or truant behavior. Youth on these caseloads are eligible for services funded by JJCPA.

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The three El DPOs supervise caseloads consisting of both formal and informal cases, and coordinate closely with CBOs providing life skills education or individual therapy to at-risk juveniles and juvenile offenders. These caseloads provide most of the supervision efforts geared toward younger, first-time offenders. The DPOs focus on assisting the entire family which increases parental accountability and involvement in an offender's treatment and needs. These efforts contribute to the Probation Department being able to maintain a relatively low level of foster care placement.

Three of the four CBOs funded through JJCPA (Family Service Agency, Santa Maria Valley Youth and Family, Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse) provide individual and family counseling countywide to the youth assigned to either the El or SBO caseloads. The fourth CBO (Community Action Commission) provides educational services across various social domains.

Performance Measure:

The Probation Department tracks and reports 18 performance measures related to the JJCPA. The following are representative of JJCPA outcomes:

Ensure that 85% of youth successfully completing the Early Intervention Program have no new arrest for a felony or misdemeanor within six months of program completion. For the 43 youth who successfully exited in FY 2009-2010, 86% did not commit a new felony or misdemeanor within six months of program completion. Of those exits, 95% were not arrested for a felony offense.

Ensure that 90% of youth successfully completing the School-Based Officer Program will not be admitted to the Juvenile Hall within six months of program completion. For the 49 youth who successfully exited in FY 2009-2010, none were admitted to Juvenile Hall within six months of program completion.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

There are no anticipated facility impacts. The project will continue to use existing facilities owned or operated by the County, CBOs, or schools.

Aside from the funding for services provided under the JJCPA, program services are supported by other revenue sources. These include Federal Title IV-E (\$380,626) and Medi-Cal (through ADMHS, \$24,712). In addition, YOBG revenue (\$364,000), in conjunction with Title IV-E (\$154,000), continues to fund Aftercare and Assessors outside of the JJCPA. This funding approach should remain constant in coming years.

The JJCPA budget for FY 2011-2012 does not cause the County General Fund contribution to increase.
