Adopt the attached resolution authorizing the District Attorney to renew an agreement with the State Department of Insurance for a Workers' Compensation Insurance Fraud Prosecution Unit in FY 2012-13.

Summary Text:

The Workers' Compensation Insurance Fraud program is designed to investigate allegations of Workers' Compensation Fraud, arrest offenders, prosecute violators, and seek restitution for funds lost through fraudulent claims, or business practices. Board approval is required to receive grant revenue and continue this program in FY 2012-13.

Background:

Workers' Compensation Fraud is a community and statewide issue which impacts industry, employers, the medical profession, insurance companies, employees, and local businesses. There is a direct correlation between workers' compensation fraud and increases in insurance premiums. Fraud results in higher insurance premiums for all employers which, in turn, are passed on to the consumer through an increase in costs of goods and services we use every day. These factors led the Santa Barbara County District Attorney to develop the Workers' Compensation Fraud Program, which brings together local businesses, the California Department of Insurance (CDI), and the District Attorney to tackle Workers' Compensation Fraud in Santa Barbara County. This program was originally authorized by the Board of

Supervisors in November 2003, making FY 2012-13 the tenth year of the Workers' Compensation Fraud Program in Santa Barbara County.

The Workers' Compensation Fraud Program is financed through fees assessed by the State Insurance Commissioner as part of the workers' compensation insurance rates. The long term goal of this initiative is to reduce workers' compensation insurance fraud in Santa Barbara County through crime prevention and deterrence, to be accomplished through a combination of community education and criminal prosecution of fraud cases.

The unit currently has 16 open investigations, 4 of which are in court and 1 case pending criminal filing. The open cases include 12 applicant fraud cases and 4 employer fraud cases. During FY 2012-13, the District Attorney anticipates initiating between 30-40 new investigations.

Deputy District Attorneys in Santa Barbara and Santa Maria will be assigned part-time to this grant, while the full-time Investigator will provide countywide coverage. Revenue totaling \$286,000 in FY 2012-13 is \$4,000 less than funding in FY 2011-12. The FY 2012-13 budget includes \$257,352 in salary and benefit costs, along with \$12,550 in operating costs, and \$16,098 in overhead associated with the program.
