AB109 Realigned Population

Post-release community supervision (PRCS) offender population with <u>committing</u> prison offense for non-violent, non-serious felony and not deemed to be a high risk sex offender

Non-violent, non-serious, non-sex offenders (NX3) who will now serve their felony sentences locally and can be subject to post sentence supervision by Probation

AB109 Offender Profile & Impacts

PRCS population is 225 after 6 months – 25% over projection Offender Profile

- 89% Male, 11% Female
- 66% live in North County; 34% in South County
- 25% Need housing assistance Projected 17%
- 19% Have mental health issues Projected 20%
- 80% Have substance abuse issues *Projected 80%*

Committing Offense

40% drug, 33% property, 10% crime against person, 4% sex offense, 4% weapons, 3% DUI, 6% others

More high risk PRCS than anticipated 78% High Risk; 11% Med. Risk; 11% Low Risk

AB109 Offender Profile & Impacts

NX3 population is 111 after 6 months – 16% below projection

- 78% straight custody sentences; 22% Split sentences
 - Straight custody sentences resulted in longer jail stays
- Average number of days to be served at the time of sentencing: 255 days.
 - Ten cases with more than 500 days
 - One case with a 23 year sentence
- Average Daily Population for AB109 offenders is higher than projected 125 jail beds/alternative detention slots.
 - Inability to add beds due to hiring delay

Response to Impacts

- Probation shifted AB109 resources to address increase PRCS population
- Reduce caseload size to address the increased number of high risk offenders
- Funding allocated to address identified needs clients
 - AB109 Mental Health Clinic
 - Substance Abuse Treatment
 - Housing: Clean and Sober, Detox, Transitional
 - Expand services at the Probation Report and Resource Center
 - Job Development
- AB109 Training Local and statewide
 - New sentencing structure and community options
 - Data collection/Evidence Based Practices

Response to Impacts

- Sheriff expanded Alternative to Detention including GPS
- Use of Evidence Based Assessments
 - supervision, custody, treatment
- Enhance social workers in jail & add rehabilitation services coordinators to assist jail inmates with early release and seamless transition back into the community
 - Two Social Workers in the Jail
 - Two Rehabilitation Services Coordinators in the community
- Enhance District Attorney's capacity to participate within the Collaborative Courts

On-going Challenges

- Uncertainty of on-going funding formula and guaranteed funding allocations
- Delay in hiring and implementing service contracts
- Potential increase cost to jail operations
 - medical and mental health services
- Lack of adequate jail space to properly house and program long term commitments
 - Recreation Vocational Counseling Medical
- The Plan outlines best efforts for a balanced, efficient, and effective deployment of anticipated FY 2012-13 resources to address Public Safety Realignment
