**Recommended Actions:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors:

- a) Adopt a Resolution Re-ratifying the Proclamation of a Local Emergency related to the Alamo & Whittier Fire Emergency declared by the Director of Emergency Services on July 16, 2017, and formally re-ratified by the Board of Supervisors on July 25, 2017, pursuant to Government Code Section 8550 et. seq. and Chapter 12, Section 12-5(a) of the Santa Barbara County Code;
- b) Direct the Office of Emergency Management to return monthly for re-ratification of the Emergency until such time that the response and recovery conditions dictate otherwise; and
- c) Determine the above actions are not a “Project” within the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), pursuant to Section 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines, because the actions consist of organizational or administrative activities of the government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

**Summary Text:**

This item is on the agenda to re-ratify the Proclamation of a Local Emergency that was initially ratified on July 18, 2017.

On Sunday, July 16, 2017, when the Board of Supervisors was not in session, the County Executive Officer, as the Director of Emergency Services, proclaimed a local emergency due to the Alamo and Whittier Fires. On the same date, the Governor of California also declared a State of Emergency in Santa Barbara County due to the Alamo and Whittier Fires.

This action is necessary to continue the proclaimed local emergency for 30 days.

## **BACKGROUND**

On July 6, 2017, the Alamo Fire began burning in San Luis Obispo County and on July 7, 2017 at approximately 1500 hours it crossed into Santa Barbara County near Twitchell Reservoir. The Alamo Fire was contained at a total of 28,687 acres. On July 8, 2017, at approximately 1342 hours the Whittier Fire started burning near Lake Cachuma. As of August 3, 2017 the Whittier fire has burned 18,430 acres and is 87% contained. Recovery and burn area repairs are continuing.

The existence of two fires of the size and complexity that required Type 1 Incident Management Teams occurring within the County simultaneously is unique and unprecedented. Incident Management Teams are federally certified and are deployed to manage incidents of national significance.

Damage assessment is conducted by County staff using a new software application called Fulcrum. Both incidents have resulted in loss and damage to structures, agriculture, infrastructure, recreational areas and facilities, critical watersheds and other property in the County. The Whittier Fire destroyed sixteen (16) residences and damaged one (1) and destroyed thirty (30) outbuildings and damaged six (6). The Alamo Fire destroyed two (2) residences, damaged (1), and destroyed twelve (12) outbuildings.

On July 16, 2017, when the Board of Supervisors was not in session, the County Executive Officer, as the Director of Emergency Services, proclaimed a local emergency in order to utilize all resources necessary to respond to the damage caused by the local emergency and receive any needed funding through the California Disaster Assistance Act and any other State or Federal funds that may be available; the proclamation was effective for a period of seven days unless ratified by the Board of Supervisors. On July 18, 2017, the Board of Supervisors ratified the Proclamation of Local Emergency due to the Alamo and Whittier Fires. On July 25 the Board of Supervisors re-ratified the Proclamation of Local Emergency consistent with the 30 day re-ratification requirement.

The Proclamation of Local Emergency covers the Santa Barbara County Operational Area, which is the entire geographic area of the county, including cities, unincorporated county areas, and special districts. County staff is working within the Operational Area to compile a preliminary damage assessment.

The Governor's Office has declared a State of Emergency for these events. With the Governor's proclamation, our region could seek reimbursement for costs directly related to and in support of the fire event. Re-ratifying the Proclamation for a Local Emergency due to the Alamo and Whittier Fires is consistent with the Governor's Declaration.

Unfortunately, costs related to private property damage cannot be reimbursed through this process.

**Fiscal Analysis:**

Costs directly related to firefighting efforts are reimbursed by the incidents, and therefore largely covered by CAL FIRE and the US Forest Service.

County OEM is accumulating personnel and equipment costs and damages for submittal to the State OES for possible partial reimbursement.
