Recommended Actions:

- A. Adopt the attached resolution authorizing the Acting Chief Probation Officer to submit the grant proposal and to execute the Grant Award Agreement and accept the anticipated funding of the 2018 Board of State and Community Corrections, Racial and Ethnic Disparity (R.E.D.) Grant in the amount of \$147,940 for the period covering October 1, 2017, to September 30, 2018. (Attachment A)
- B. Determine that the approval of the Agreement is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3), finding that this activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment, and where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that this activity may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA, and direct staff to file a Notice of Exemption (Attachment C).

Summary Text:

On December 8, 2015, the Board of Supervisors authorized the Chief Probation Officer to execute the Formula Grant Award Agreement, and accept the anticipated funding of the 2016 Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), Racial and Ethnic Disparity (R.E.D.) to combat racial and ethnic disproportionalities in the juvenile justice system. The purpose of the R.E.D grant is to decrease the overrepresentation of youth of color involved in the juvenile justice system by 1) reducing the number of youth of color coming into contact with the juvenile justice system and 2) reducing bias in juvenile justice system policies and practices. To accomplish this goal, collaboration between probation, education, child welfare, law enforcement, mental health, and other systems were essential as there were often direct connections between each of these different systems. The BSCC was committed to four years of funding, requiring re-application for each of the subsequent three years. Fourth year funding, which is the Implementation Phase, in the amount of \$147,940 for the period covering October 1, 2017, to September 30, 2018 is being sought to continue the R.E.D. efforts countywide. The Acting Chief Probation Officer requests authority to submit the grant proposal, execute the Grant Award Agreement and accept fourth year funding.

Background:

The Probation Department received funding for year one (1) of a four (4) year grant to review Racial and Ethnic Disparities (R.E.D.). We are currently in the third year of the grant.

Year 1 was the Assessment Phase. The focus was on assessing the jurisdiction's overall commitment and capacity to engage in the R.E.D. work. The Department contracted with the W. Hayward Burns Institute (BI) to complete the assessment and provide a report with their findings. A team from the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB) also began their analysis of the various educational systems within the county and prepared several reports with their findings.

Year 2 focused on Infrastructure and Education. Probation contracted with BI and UCSB in Year 2. Many of the recommendations from Year 1 were implemented in the second year of the grant, beginning with the formation of a R.E.D. committee. BI helped in the development and facilitation of the countywide R.E.D. committee. This committee consists of a cross section of county departments, community-based organizations, educators and community members. Several trainings on the subject of implicit bias were offered for probation, partner agencies and the community. Additionally, Probation began its focus on probation violators booked into juvenile hall to determine if policies and practices were impacting racial and ethnic disparities. UCSB also began its analysis of local school districts specifically school discipline in correlation to school readiness and the Department of Behavioral Wellness and evaluated their trends as well as policies and procedures.

Year 3 has focused on Community Engagement. Probation contracted with BI and UCSB. The R.E.D. committee continues to meet monthly and has begun discussions regarding a youth advisory council, with the goal of an additional grant being offered to cover the costs for implementation. Implicit bias training to the community partners continues. Probation implemented its Purpose of Detention and Booking Criteria, will complete the Juvenile Hall Intake Assessment (JHIA) Tool and the Violation of Probation Matrix by the end of this grant year. UCSB continued to assess and provide technical assistance to the Department of Behavioral Wellness and Department of Social Services. Following data analysis, focus groups of Behavioral Wellness clients and their families were held in all three geographic areas of the county to measure barriers to services and increase responsivity. UCSB continues to coordinate with the State Department of Social Services researcher and evaluation personnel who oversee the state database. UCSB's final report, which compares Santa Barbara with California state data on R.E.D. indicators, is nearly completed.

Year 4's focus is Implementation of the R.E.D. Reduction Plan. UCSB will continue their work with the Departments of Behavioral Wellness and Social Services and continue refocusing on discipline data and its link to probation involvement using data from the Santa Maria Joint Union High School District and Probation. Probation with the technical assistance of BI, will implement and evaluate the JHIA tool and Violation of Probation Matrix.

Additional R.E.D. Activities:

The Probation Department contracted with the National Compadres Network in Year 3 to conduct facilitator training for 30 participants in the El Joven Noble curriculum, an evidence based program that focuses on the character development of young men and women while providing a safe place to heal from the high at-risk factors that affect their day to day lives, specifically targeting the reduction of teen pregnancies, substance abuse, and community violence and increase the ability of youth to act in a responsible and respectful way in reference to their relationships. Each participant will agree to complete two groups within 12 months of the training. Year 4 will include data collection and analysis from the participants.

In previous years, the R.E.D. Grant funded several Implicit Bias trainings done by Dr. Rita Cameron-Wedding of Sacramento State University, and Dr. Thomas Fikes and Carmel Saad of Westmont College. Those trainings addressed implicit bias on a personal level to help the individual recognize their own biases. In Year 4, the Probation Department grant funds will be available for training in the area of overcoming institutional bias by reviewing policies and procedures that are barriers to equity, inclusion, and diversity.

Probation continues to be in a position to collaborate with community and partner agencies to work toward the reduction of racial and ethnic disparities across the juvenile justice continuum. Funding will be used to contract with UCSB and BI to strengthen the foundation for the R.E.D. initiative, more actively engage the community, and implement the strategies and initiatives developed over the last three years.
