The Recovery Act awards \$1 billion in CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) funds to be distributed to cities, counties, insular areas and states, of which \$10 million has been reserved by HUD for its administrative costs and \$10 million of which will be awarded to Indian tribes. Recipients of the remaining \$980 million of CDBG-R funds will be the approximately 1,200 jurisdictions that received CDBG funding in Fiscal Year 2008. Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

A) Santa Barbara County General Services Department Women's Emergency Shelter Rehabilitation:

This project proposal involves significant rehabilitation to an existing structure used as an emergency shelter for female victims of domestic violence. The current structure is in need of improvements and the proposal will minimally address the following work elements: heating and electrical systems upgrades, new roof and flooring, security improvements, window and door replacement, structural improvements, interior and exterior paint, reconstruction of bathrooms, as well as landscaping and grounds improvements. The work will promote energy and economic efficiency, while stimulating the local economy by creating up to 24 jobs associated with the improvement work. The CDBG-R project budget is in the amount of \$326,089.

B) City of Lompoc Infrastructure Improvements:

Urban County Participating Jurisdiction member, the City of Lompoc, proposes to use its allocation of Urban county CDBG-R funding to implement infrastructure improvements to areas of its city meeting the Low-Moderate income benefit criteria. The work will principally include new and replacement sidewalks, handicap accessibility and other improvements. It will preserve 1.5 existing jobs. The CDBG-R project budget is in the amount of \$121,985.

C) City of Carpinteria, Chapel Court Apartments Emergency Repairs:

Peoples' Self Help Housing Corporation has proposed undertaking emergency repair work to address public health and safety issues associated with the Chapel Court Apartments in the City of Carpinteria. The City of Carpinteria has expressed support for the commitment of the full \$39,865 in its CDBG-R funding to the project, which proposes to create or maintain up to two jobs according to the project budget request.

D) CDBG-R Program Administration

The County of Santa Barbara will retain \$54,215 (10%) of the grant for administration of the CDBG-R Program.
