Recommended Actions:

That the Board of Supervisors:

- A. Authorize the Chief Probation Officer to submit an application, execute the Grant Award Agreement, and accept anticipated funding of the FFY 2023 California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) Grant in the amount of \$178,949.35 for the period covering October 1, 2022, to September 30, 2023; and
- B. Determine that the above actions are government fiscal activities or funding mechanisms which do not involve any commitment to any specific project which may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment, and are therefore not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15378(b)(4) of the CEQA guidelines.

Summary Text:

The California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) offers grant funding to local and state public agencies for programs that help them enforce traffic laws, educate the public in traffic safety, and provide varied and effective means of reducing fatalities, injuries and economic losses from collisions. The OTS grant provides resources for the monitoring and community supervision of individuals convicted of driving under the influence (DUI) of alcohol and other controlled substances, and that are high risk to become a repeat offender. Through this grant, the Santa Barbara County Probation Department emphasizes intensive

supervision to ensure compliance with court ordered terms and conditions of probation, and to prevent re-arrest on new DUI charges. Enhanced compliance monitoring and enforcement includes utilizing random home/field contacts, group reports, unannounced searches, use of Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitoring (SCRAM), alcohol/drug testing and DUI treatment verifications. Additional objectives include attempts to serve warrants for the targeted population and providing information to local law enforcement on a monthly basis.

Background:

The Santa Barbara County Probation Department has received OTS funding since June 2006. The federal funding through OTS is apportioned to California under the National Highway Safety Act and the Safe, Accountable and Flexible Efficiency Transportation Equity Act - A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). The OTS works with probation departments statewide in order to establish multidisciplinary efforts to reduce repeat DUI offenses, which is in addition to funding traditional law enforcement sobriety checkpoints and other DUI traffic related efforts.

In the last completed Federal Fiscal Year (FFY), between October 1, 2020 and September 30, 2021, Probation's OTS grant-related efforts resulted in 192 unannounced field contacts, 693 office contacts, 628 alcohol/drug tests, four (4) warrant service operations and tracking of transdermal alcohol monitoring or remote breath testing devices.

The FFY 2023 California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) Grant application continues to place focus on providing risk and needs assessment specific to the DUI population and supervising the highest risk DUI offenders in the Santa Maria region assigned to a dedicated OTS-funded DUI caseload. In line with the Department's evidence-based supervision, the Probation Department will continue to utilize the evidence-based Northpointe Correctional Offender Management and Profiling Alternative Sanctions (COMPAS) risk/needs assessment to determine supervision strategies, while the Risk of Violence and Recidivism (ROVAR), the Inventory of Offender Needs (ION), and the Texas Christian University Drug Screen II (TCUDS) are used to further identify an offender's greatest risk factors and needs. The above mentioned assessments allow the Deputy Probation Officer (DPO) to work collaboratively with the offender to create treatment plan goals to improve behaviors and effect positive change.

The 2018 OTS ranking data, which originates from the California Highway Patrol (CHP) Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System (SWITRS), the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), California Department of Justice (DOJ), and the Department of Finance (DOF) records, ranks the city of Santa Maria as 12th out of 59 similarly sized cities in the number of alcohol-involved collisions that resulted in death and injured victims. This is a considerable improvement from 2010, the inception of the first OTS grant, at which time OTS data ranked Santa Maria as 2nd out of 58 similarly sized cities in the number of alcohol-involved collisions that resulted in death and injured victims. It is noted that the above data from 2018 is the most recently published information.

The DPO funded through this grant provides intensive case management and supervision to the DUI caseload through field and office visits, unannounced searches, random alcohol/drug testing, and participation with local law enforcement on DUI prevention efforts. The DPO works closely with the DUI Review Court, which include the DUI treatment providers. The overall goal is to improve outcomes for offenders and to reduce recidivism.

Narrative: The grant is for a one (1) year period commencing October 1, 2022, and continuing until September 30, 2023, with an anticipated award of \$178,949.35 and no required match. This grant funds one (1) Deputy Probation Officer, their associated travel expenses, PAS device/supplies, and testing supplies. There is no increase to the Probation Department’s General Fund contribution and no impact on facilities associated with this grant. The FFY 2023 grant funds the salary of the currently assigned DPO the remainder of this FY and the first quarter of the next FY. If the grant is approved the position and the funding will be included in the Department’s FY 2022-23 proposed budget.
