


HAMMOND'S MEADOW

 **1978** - Hammond's Meadow was listed on the National Register of Historic Places for its "prehistoric and historic resources."

1984 - Sea Meadow (originally called Ocean Meadows) residential project was approved by the County, allowing 27 privately-owned parcels for single family homes. The 2.96-acre Hammond's Meadow public open space parcel was created as part of this subdivision, with the beach parcel bringing the total open space to 4.2-acres of permanent public open space.

Feb. 27, 1988 - One condition required an Offer to Dedicate an Archaeological Easement. This easement was recorded in 1988 and states, in part: "...no soil disturbance, construction or excavation activity shall be permitted...and no landscaping activities or improvements which involve the disturbance of archaeological resources may be undertaken..." While there is no record that this offer was ever formally accepted by the Board of Supervisors, the current plan adheres to the letter and intent of this easement.

1995 - Offer of dedication was accepted by County of 2.96-acre parcel (includes some of beach) as a public open space and beachfront preserve for passive recreational use. The open space is managed by County Parks.

2010 - 2018 - Innumerable meetings with Chumash representatives & community members, particularly those initiated by David Anderson. The California Indian Advisory Council (local chair is John Johnson, Archaeologist at the SB Museum of Natural History) was also consulted on several occasions over the years.

2013 - The first iteration of the "Hammond's Meadow Preservation and Management Plan" was drafted.

Sept. 20, 2014 - County Parks, on behalf of SB County, and Channel Islands Restoration, a non-profit, entered into a Memorandum of Agreement for planning and implementation of the "Hammond's Meadow Maintenance, Restoration and Stewardship Project."

2015 - 2016 - Revisions were made to the "Hammond's Meadow Preservation and Management Plan" in anticipation of submitting the Plan to the County for a Substantial Conformity Determination (SCD) that the Plan substantially conformed to the original 1984 approval.

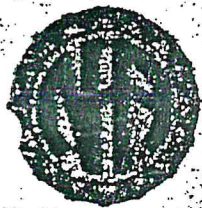
May 2017 - The draft "Hammond's Meadow Preservation and Management Plan" was completed.

August 17, 2017 - Channel Islands Restoration, on behalf of County Parks, submitted a SCD application to County Planning & Development. This submittal was preceded by several meetings with County Parks, County Planning & Development, County Supervisor Das Williams and his staff, and the Sea Meadows Homeowners Association.

Late 2017 and early 2018 - More outreach efforts to the Chumash community including meetings at County Parks, First District Supervisor Das Williams' office and with Planning & Development staff.

May and June 2018 - On May 18th a widely noticed (in local papers & with onsite postings) onsite meeting was held with a focus on Chumash and cultural issues. The next day, May 19th, an onsite meeting was held with neighbors and others. A total of about 40 people attended the two meetings. A follow up meeting was held at County P&D office on June 15th with Chumash representatives with about 10 people in attendance.

Summer 2018 - Refinements to the "Hammond's Meadow Preservation and Management Plan" were made and resubmitted to County Planning & Development.

Members of the Commission:

The Native American Heritage Commission appreciates the opportunity of expressing support on behalf of four Native American groups in their efforts to preserve the Hammond Meadows site. Besides its position as the only National Register site on the Santa Barbara County coast, it was also the first Santa Barbara site to be recorded in the Sacred Lands Inventory of the State of California. The significance of this coastal village of Shalwaj has been expressed as a burial area, a contemporary ceremonial area, and a place of strong historical interpretive value.

Preservation of Hammond Meadow will also allow for the appropriate reinterment of Native American human remains removed from the site. The Native American values accorded Hammond Meadows are consistent with the need for the public use and aesthetic appreciation of the California coast. The Commission urges you to support the preservation plan discussed by the Hammond Meadows Preserve, Inc.
