We are urging you to pass AB 1243/SB684. We believe that Californians have paid far too much money to clean up the disasters caused by the fossil fuel industry, and it's time to hold polluters accountable to the climate damages they're responsible for.

The California Polluter Pays Climate Superfund Act is a bill that would hold the largest fossil fuel companies financially responsible for the climate damages they've created, and that'd provide significant relief to taxpayers. At least 40% of the funds would benefit the communities hardest hit by fossil fuel pollution. And, these fees would be less than 0.5% of the company's trillions of dollars in profits.

Our agricultural sector is one of the primary economic drivers in SB County, and it's extremely vulnerable to climate change hazards. Drought, extreme heat, and wildfire smoke put an enormous burden on farmworkers. The legislation will help to make California better at addressing affordability issues that low income families face.

Almost all of the major cities in California have passed resolutions supporting The Polluter Pays Climate Superfund Act. This bill will help to address the ever-increasing and devastating impacts of climate change and we're urging you to pass it.
