• NO to Gutting THE Cannabis CAP: Item A-4 is the County's second reading of its plan to exempt processing (the smelliest part of the cannabis process) from the cannabis cultivation acreage cap. It would have the effect of allowing further proliferation of both processing and cultivation in Carpinteria Valley in excess of the 186 acre cap. In Carpinteria there are currently already 20 (!) different sites with processing permits (10 of which aren't even yet in operation but soon will be). The existing processing is

already causing a huge nuisance. Removing processing from the cap of 186 acres should not be considered for Carpinteria, as WE are already suffering from incredibly dense cannabis activities here.

- NO to APPEAL of Huge Processing Facility Near Beach: Item 5 is Sarah Trigueiro's (local resident) appeal hearing of G&K's (Farrar's) proposed new 25,000 sq. foot warehouse located adjacent to Arroyo Paredon Creek at 3480 Via Real, in addition to his existing 8.17 acre cannabis project at 3561 Foothill Rd. County records show that Farrar's two Carpinteria properties are first and second for the most cannabis odor complaints filed by residents since 2015, with 285 and 252 complaints each. Last year, 100 members of Concerned Carpinterians signed a petition against this processing project.
 - o Carpinteria does not need more density of cannabis and processing activities, particularly when the grower has a poor track record. There are already 20 cannabis projects permitted or in the pipeline in the Nidever Rectangle area alone (between Nidever and Cravens, Foothill and Via Real).
 - o The County has been unable to enforce even its own meager controls that were supposed to protect residents. Case in point there have not been the required quarterly industrial hygienist inspections for the existing greenhouses on the site to ensure the odor control system is effective in preventing noxious fumes in residential zones. Planning officials cannot identify the source of odors when there are so many projects next to each other and as a result, there has been no effective enforcement.
 - O Additionally, the fumes from this location have been a significant nuisance in La Mirada, the Polo Condos and Santa Claus/Padaro areas even at the beach. There are significant Coastal Act considerations here, given that this project affects an ESH (environmentally sensitive habitat), the Arroyo Paredon coastal feeding creek and impacts residents' and visitors' ability to enjoy the coastal zone.

The very last thing Carpinteria needs right now is more cannabis activity! We are already awash in cannabis stink every day. This project is particularly inappropriate given that it has been the source of the most odor complaints to the County.

My husband and I are neighbors of the G&K operation in Carpinteria. We live east of the project on Cravens Lane, and are thus subject to the emitted cannabis odors and other pollution from this site almost daily, depending on wind direction.

The cannabis odors and air pollution from vapor phase are a clear nuisance for the surrounding pre-existing neighborhoods (EDRNs like La Mirada). They can cause and exacerbate asthma. They routinely cause watering eyes, cough, sneezing, and sometimes headache.

The effects of these pollutants on wildlife and habitat have not been adequately studied, and the project is in immediate proximity of a "protected" riparian zone.

Since the operators are already in business under provisional licensing we know very well the nuisance they are causing. There is already an over-concentration of cannabis activities in this area of Carpinteria Valley, with the odor often experienced on the freeway and at the beach.

I am writing to urge you to uphold the appeal of this project and deny this project.

- 1. This project will be a huge processing facility near the beach, residents. A 25 foot tall 25,000 sq. foot new building is not appropriate for this location.
- 2. It is on the Arroyo Paredon Creek and there are not enough protections in place for this creek. There are 4 other cannabis operations along this creek. It is very pristine at Foothill Rd., but by the time it gets to Via Real on its way to the beach, it is no longer so.
- 3. Unfortunately, this parcel has received 252 odor complaints. This is one of only 2 fully permitted cannabis projects in the Carpinteria Valley and though there have been way over 3 complaints per 365 days, nothing has been done. When the original permit was issued in 2019, an amendment was added by the Planning Commission that during the first year of operation there would be quarterly inspections by an Independent Industrial Hygienist to verify that the odor apparatus was installed and not noticed in residential areas. It may have been mechanically checked but P&D has not been able to identify the source of the odor issues for nearby residents of La Mirada, the Polo Field, and Padaro Lane EDRNs. I had been told that once the 3 other nearby permits were issued P&D would be able to identify the source, but that number is now at least 7 other permits in that area that have already been issued and still there is no way the source can be identified. One can not identify the source when projects are next to each other.
- 4. Because of the lack of proper odor control (one definitely smells it driving or biking by), this operator should be not be allowed to add something more to his 8.17 acres cultivation project without better improved odor management on the cultivation side and current processing occurring in Greenhouse #5.
- 5. The odors from the cannabis and the Ecosorb are very offensive to many people and are known to cause health issues for some. It's not fair that cannabis odors cause local residents not to be able to enjoy opening their windows or sitting outside their homes or use the beach for their recreation.
- 6. If the county isn't capable of identifying which operation is the source of the odor problem, then how is the neighbor who has to instigate the complain even know whom to call. It's one thing if there's only 1 cannabis operation in the area but with at least 7 so close together all bunched up on the flat area below La Mirada, it's an impossible situation that at the present time can't be solved. Also I'm not sure if the residents of La Mirada, the Polo Field, and Padaro Lane are included in the 1000' notification area.
- 7. This large warehouse would be visible from the public Toro Canyon Ridge Trail, part of Toro Canyon Park.

- 8. It is not appropriate to build a new warehouse on prime agriculture land. This is converting agricultural lands into non-agricultural uses.
- 9. There will be 50 new employees if this project is approved. Having only 1 van/shuttle isn't sufficient for the increase in traffic expected.
- 10. Please deny this project since there is no way the following required finding can be made: this project <u>"will not result in detrimental impacts to the health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare of the neighborhood"</u> (from modified OAP 5/20/21) and is compatible with the surrounding area.

Carpinteria and half of them aren't even operational yet. Just how many processing sites do these cannabis entrepreneurs really need? Please do

not counter with the trope that if the processing takes place in Carp the 'product' will not need to be sent outside the area for processing and

thus there will be fewer trucks coming and going. There will be the same number of trucks coming and going, they will just be carrying finished

product rather than unprocessed product. The robust, existing 186 acre cap that already exists has already overburdened the community with smelly air and increased traffic.

As to the proposed 25,000 sq ft G & K warehouse it should never have been approved. The existing smell that permeates the air on Foothill and Via Real from

the cannabis sites that are already operating in that corridor are inexcusable. The County has been unable to enforce even its own meager controls that were supposed to protect residents and therefore there has been no effective reduction of the noxious fumes in the residential zone which surrounds these currently operational sites. Logic would lead one to believe that if County planners cannot identify the source of odors when when they attempt to identify

the culprit that there are indeed too many projects next to each other in a confined area.
