Overview

- The Multi-jurisdictional Solid Waste Task Group (MJSWTG) developed a long-range solid waste management plan for the county.
 - The Los Flores Landfill was an identified project for the Santa Maria Wasteshed.
 - Waste Conversion Technology was an identified project for the Tajiguas Wasteshed.
- All participating Cities and the County adopted the plan in 2004.

- Every County must demonstrate 15 years of waste disposal capacity through a Countywide Siting Element
- County staff given responsibility to prepare this document and subsequent amendments
- If entity wishes to develop or expand a solid waste disposal facility, it must be included in the Countywide Siting Element via an Addendum
- The entity initiates this process by sending a project description to County BOS

- City of Santa Maria is proposing to develop a new landfill at Los Flores Ranch, currently owned by the City
- Los Flores Ranch is 1,774 acres
- 617 acres of site disturbance of which 286 acres to be used as a landfill
- If receive 161,000 tons per year, will provide 90 years of capacity

- Entity must submit proposed project to the Local Task Force to comment on regional diversion efforts and the regional impact of the facility
- SB Local Task Force provided 3 comments
 - SM to implement curbside collection of greenwaste July 2011
 - SM to implement small business hazardous waste collection program – Jan 2012
 - Monitor other feasible recycling, composting and conversion technologies tied to 5-year permit cycle

- Have presented the project to the Multi-Jurisdictional Solid Waste Task Group on at least 8 occasions
- Environmental Impact Report has been prepared and certified by City of SM City Council – April 2010
- County submitted comments on EIR August 2009
- SM held 3 community meetings, distributed press releases, and posted project on City website

- An Addendum must be approved by County and majority of the cities within the County that has a majority of the population
- If an entity takes no action, the addendum is deemed to be approved
- All cities in the County have approved via action or no action

- If entity disapproves the project, it must provide evidence in the record of 1 or more significant adverse impacts to the County
- Any person can file with Superior Court for writ of mandate for review of the decision to disapprove

Recommendations

 Adopt resolution approving Addendum to Siting Element

OR

 Continue the item until August 2, 2011 to allow staff to return with information regarding possible significant adverse impacts to the County

Host Fees

Non-Hazardous Impacted Soil (NHIS)

- Current NHIS Program
 - Source of material is from old oil development sites
 - Currently taken to Santa Maria Landfill as Alternative Daily Cover (ADC) or landfill closure material
 - NHIS at the SM Landfill is approved by the RWQCB
 - County/City MOU approved to address impacts to County Road System.

Non-Hazardous Impacted Soil (NHIS)


- NHIS as proposed in the EIR
 - NHIS to be used as alternative daily cover (ADC) under the same permit condition that currently exist
 - With a maximum of 250 truck trips per day
 - And a maximum of 5,000 tons per day
 - 75% of the material from North of the site and the remainder from the South
 - Staffs agree the current MOU should be continued to address future impacts to County Road System.

Out of County Waste

- In 2010, the Santa Maria Landfill accepted less than 1,000 tons from San Luis Obispo County
- In the Los Flores Canyon EIR
 - The Project Description identifies the potential for Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) from southern San Luis Obispo County
 - The Project Description also identifies the MSW currently buried at the Tajiguas Landfill
 - The EIR did not analyze the waste from SLO
 - The EIR did analyze the waste from the Tajiguas Landfill in detail

Host Fees

- When a landfill is located on County owned property, Host Fees are sometimes imposed to assure future landfill space for county generated waste (local control)
- Pending legislation may restrict this option (AB 1178)
- Host fees may not however be imposed as a condition of approving the Siting Element
- City of SM is willing to work with County on potential countywide policy or ordinance



Recommendations

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- PRC Section 41704 requires that any area used for a disposal facility must be identified as such in the applicable City or County General Plan
- Although Government Code Section 53090 indicates "local agencies" must comply with applicable zoning ordinances where they are located – cities and counties are not considered "local agencies" for zoning purposes.
- Court of Appeal determined that cities and counties are mutually exempt from having to comply with each other's ordinances (Lawler v. City of Redding (1992) [Inter-governmental immunity])
- City of SM found the proposed site to be consistent under its General Plan
