Subcommittee Findings

Finding 1 - The availability of aviation assets is an indispensable component of modern firefighting and law enforcement.

Finding 2 - Joint firefighting and law enforcement aviation program with an Operational Agreement

Finding 3 - Professional pilots, mission specialist crew

Finding 4 - A single chain of command.

Finding 5 - Medical evacuations and emergency medical transportation



Subcommittee Recommendations

Recommendation 1 - Form a joint fire and law enforcement aviation program in Sheriff's Department

Recommendation 2 - Operational Agreement includes: aircraft and personnel availability, operational procedures, financial policies and leadership expectations.

Recommendation 3 - Use professional pilots for public safety flight operations.

Recommendation 4 - Clarify responsibilities for medical evacuation and emergency medical transport



Staffing Plan

- Improves quality Capable of two simultaneous law or fire missions
- Provides two multi-mission copters, seven days a week, eight hours a day
- Staffing
 - Flight crews = 6.2 FTEs
 - Mechanics = 2 FTEs
- Aviation assets
 - Available = Copters 1, 3 & 4
 - Ready Reserve = Copters 308 & 2



Budget Considerations
