General Relief Program

General Relief (GR)

- State mandated by W&I Code Section 17000 et. seq.
- 100% county funded
- County specific regulations developed by DSS
- Approved by Board of Supervisors
- Program designed around community resources and fiscal restraints

General Relief (GR)

Required by state law to provide financial relief to unemployed and incapacitated who are not eligible to assistance from any other source

- Intended to provide short-term assistance while recipient seeks other means of support
 - > Employment
 - > UIB / DIB
 - > SSI / SSP

General Relief (GR)

- Entitlement cash assistance program
 Recipients remain eligible if they:
 - > Remain within income / resource limits
 - > Cooperate with all mandatory requirements
 - work search
 - work project
 - treatment of incapacity to become employable
 - application for SSI/SSP if permanently disabled

Grant Amount

- \$300 max per month
- Methodology found in W&I Code 17000 et. seq.
- Average max grant of contiguous counties is \$292
- Average max grant of similar size counties is \$318
- Average max grant of regional housing market counties is \$321
- Santa Barbara County has not increased or decreased standard of aid since 1993

Assistance Standards / Method of Payment

- \$300 one person
- \$403 married couple
- \$91 if no shelter expenses incurred
- Issued through EBT directly to recipient
- Vendor payment directly to landlord may be issued by request of recipient

- Caseload peaked in April 720

 - May 653
 - June 609

- Fiscal Year 01/02 Average Cases Per Month 533

Employability Status

Employable / Able-Bodied

- 38% Able-bodied / employable
 - » marginal skills, education or training
 - > many have alcohol / substance abuse issues
 - > many have criminal records
- Must look for work
- Must co-operate with work project assignments
 - > grant ÷minimum wage = # of hours worked
 - > work at:
 - D.S.S
 - Parks
 - Food Banks
 - Salvation Army
- Must co-operate with work project assignments or are discontinued
 - > fail work project
 - loss of contact
 - > failure to follow through and provide verification
- If discontinued for failing work project sanctioned for 180 days

Disability Status

Temporarily Incapacitated

- > 28% have a temporary injury / illness that prevent them from employment
- > minor injuries / illness not expected to last any more than one year
- > must find treatment and follow through to become employable

Permanently Disabled / SSI Pending

- > 34% have permanent or serious illness / injuries
- must apply for and cooperate with SSI application process
- > 2 social workers assist with SSI application process
- > county is reimbursed when SSI is granted
 - \$22,000 average per month back to General Fund

Living Arrangements

24% incur no shelter costs

- > live with family / friends
- > camp / auto / van
- > homeless

 5% live in single room occupancy hotels or board and care facility that requires recipient to request vendor pay

Recommended Options

- Vendor pay housing
- Shared housing deductions if recipient lives with others
 - > living with 1 other = 15% reduction in grant
 - > living with 2 other = 20% reduction in grant
 - > living with 3 or more = 25% reduction in grant
- Time limit of 3 months in 12 months for recipients who are deemed to be able-bodied / employable
