**Recommended Actions:** That the Board of Supervisors:

a) Authorize the Chief Probation Officer to accept on behalf of the County of Santa Barbara an award for funding in the amount of \$200,000 from the Office of Justice Programs under the fiscal year (FY) 2009 Drug Court Discretionary Grant Program for the grant period of September 1, 2009 through August 31, 2011.

#### **Summary Text:**

On January 27, 2009, the Board of Supervisors authorized the Probation Department to apply for an Enhancement Drug Court Grant from the United States Department of Justice/Office of Justice Programs/Bureau of Justice Assistance. On July 10, 2009, the Chief Probation Officer received notification from the Office of Justice Programs that the grant had been awarded to the Probation Department.

The grant will finance the redirection of one Deputy Probation Officer to the Substance Abuse Treatment Court (SATC) program in Santa Maria. The rising availability and use of methamphetamine, coupled with the increased numbers of participants with co-occurring mental health disorders, has far eclipsed capacity for case management and supervision of offenders in the Santa Maria SATC program. Given the current economic climate, local revenue to address this need is not an option. The grant funding will support an enhanced level of supervision to this population, thereby impacting overall success and potentially resulting in an increased rate of SATC graduations and decreased jail bed usage and reduced prison commitments.

**Background:** The purpose of the Drug Court Discretionary Grant Program is to provide resources to state, local, and tribal governments and state and local courts to establish or enhance adult drug courts and systems for nonviolent substance-abusing offenders. Drug Courts help reduce recidivism and substance abuse among nonviolent offenders and increase an offender's likelihood of successful rehabilitation through early, continuous, and intense judicially-supervised treatment, mandatory periodic drug testing, community supervision, and appropriate sanctions and other habilitation services.

One of the first 200 drug courts in the nation, our local drug court, known as the Substance Abuse Treatment Court (SATC), has invested more than a decade of learning and collaboration into developing the non-adversarial team that brings together County executives from the Superior Court, the Sheriff's Office, Probation, the Public Defender, the District Attorney, Alcohol, Drug, and Mental Health Services (ADMHS), and frontline community-based substance abuse treatment providers, all committed to a common mission and intent on finding alternatives to incarceration. The SATC is guided by a Core Committee that meets on a monthly basis to facilitate ongoing planning and program operation and to ensure a mechanism for effective communication. For the past decade, the Core Committee has strived to help each member agency understand the needs and resources of every other participating agency. The Court's enforcement support is provided by Probation, which performs routine case management, random home visits, and additional drug testing to keep offender participants from straying off their path to sobriety. Repeated noncompliance or a lack of good faith effort on the part of an offender usually results in a new sentence that includes jail or prison time.

#### **Performance Measure:**

The Performance Measures for the SATC Program are:

- Ensure that 100% of babies are born drug free to female offenders in Substance Abuse Treatment Court (SATC) Program.
- Ensure that approximately 90% of Substance Abuse Treatment Court (SATC) offenders test clean and sober each month.

#### Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

The grant funding is for a period of two years, commencing in the 2009-10 federal fiscal year on September 1, 2009 and continuing until August 31, 2011. The grant award provides \$100,000 per year for a Deputy Probation Officer to be redirected to the SATC program. Due to the difference in fiscal year periods Probation will receive \$75,000 in FY2009-10, \$100,000 in FY2010-11 and \$25,000 in FY2011- 12. The revenue from this grant will reduce the impact of State and County General Fund reductions. There is no increase to the Probation Department's General Fund contribution.
