

Community Needs

Dr. Broderick

North County has the most urgent needs for crisis services

- Approximately 5,300 North County residents are served annually through our community-based organizations and outpatient mental health clinics
- More than half of the calls for crisis assessment, i.e. 5150, to the Mental Health Assessment Team (MHAT) are from North County
- An average of one North County resident is hospitalized every day for acute psychiatric care, either in our Psychiatric Health Facility (PHF) or elsewhere.



- An average of 19 Santa Barbara County residents are sent out of county each month for inpatient treatment — e.g., Aurora Vista Del Mar in Ventura (children and adults)
- Population in North County is growing more quickly than South County

Objectives

Dr. Broderick

- Diversion from hospital & institutions to community care whenever possible to make our clients more independent and confident in their abilities
- Shift costs from out-of-county hospitals to local services
- Improve the range of services in Lompoc & Santa Maria
- Reduce travel time to psychiatric inpatient care for North County residents
- Adjust to the loss of gero-psychiatric inpatient services in Santa Barbara County
- Add additional beds for South County residents at PHF in Santa Barbara

Objectives

(continued)

Provide a 24/7 "hub" for crisis services in North County in close collaboration with existing services

- ADMHS clinics
- Community-based organizations
- Law enforcement
- Shelters
- Hospital Emergency Rooms
- Mental Health Assessment Team

 Develop integrated care for persons in crisis due to mental illness and/or alcohol & other drug problems

Agreement for SB Access to SLO PHF

Dr. Broderick

- SLO PHF is about 35 miles closer to Santa Maria than our own PHF
- SLO PHF regularly has open beds
- ADMHS is currently negotiating an agreement with SLO Behavioral Health Services for admitting Santa Barbara County residents to their PHF
- Funding: Shift costs from more distant facilities to SLO

Lompoc Adult Mental Health Consumer Self-Help Center

Heidi Garcia, MFT

- New rehabilitation program for adults with mental illness in Lompoc
 - Community support is related to decreased need for hospitalization
- Operated by Transitions Mental Health Association
 - Developed with significant feedback from clients and family members
- "Pilot" consumer self-help program for Santa Barbara County
- Funding: \$70,000 annually for start-up phase (FY 03-04) and ongoing operation (FY 04-05+)

Santa Maria Crisis Stabilization Center

Al Rodriguez

- Location in North County for integrated services for people in crisis due to alcohol, drug, and/or mental health problems
- TSAC has allocated \$150,000 in seed money for FY 04-05 + additional funds from ADMHS + MediCal revenue
- Will build on existing services and be operated by a community-based organization(s) who will work closely with ADMHS, MHAT, Law Enforcement, and Marian Emergency Room physicians
- Local CBOs impacted by clients in crisis

Regional Psychiatric Inpatient Unit MMC & SLO BHS & ADMHS

Dr. Broderick

- Collaborative project in the very early stages of development
 - Marian Medical Center/Catholic Healthcare West
 - SLO County Behavioral Health Services
 - Santa Barbara County ADMHS
- Desire to create a regional psychiatric inpatient unit serving Northern Santa Barbara County & SLO
- Estimated 25 to 30 beds

Regional Inpatient Unit (continued)

- Would operate as a "distinct part facility" of Marian Medical Center
 - Enables Medi-Cal reimbursement even for psychiatric facilities with more than 16 beds
 - Larger facility affords economies of scale for staffing, programming, overhead, etc.

Benefits to Santa Barbara County

- SLO location is closer for Santa Maria residents than our own PHF
- Possibility of serving children, adults, and older adults

Regional Inpatient Unit (continued)

- Current challenges in developing the project include:
 - Finding a suitable site for renovation
 - Collaborative effort to obtain capital for building renovation
 - Licensing and regulatory approvals
- Funding: Santa Barbara County would be asked to enter into a multi-year contract for a fixed number of beds
- Timeline approx. 3 to 5 years



San Luis Obispo County Behavioral Health Services

Dr. Dale Wolff

SLO is enthusiastic about partnering with ADMHS & Catholic Healthcare West on inpatient psychiatric services

 A psychiatric unit large enough to serve Northern Santa Barbara County & San Luis Obispo County would have economic advantages for both

SLO County Behavioral Health Services (continued)

A regional unit could better serve special populations such as older adults and children, as well as mentally ill adults

After the proposal is fully developed, a multi-year contract between the two counties would help San Luis Obispo County move forward.

- Marian is committed to collaborating with the public agencies in SLO & SB Counties to better meet community needs for psychiatric acute care
- Marian intends to be a key partner in the project team that is developing a proposal for a regional psychiatric inpatient unit

- ADMHS is taking action to improve psychiatric services for North County residents in several areas
 Short-term, Intermediate, Long-term
 Recommendations:
 Provide concentual approval for ADMHS to continue
 - Provide conceptual approval for ADMHS to continue to develop the collaborative project proposal with Marian & SLO
 - Authorize Dr. Broderick to continue to facilitate negotiations for new inpatient facilities with private providers and other available county services
