The assessment of the applicant's capacity is based on whether the applicant has experience completing similar projects; whether the applicant has experience working with the County HCD; whether the applicant possesses the necessary technical expertise; and whether the applicant has adequate resources needed to complete the proposed project. These factors are all crucial for the realization of a proposed project, and are
