**SUBJECT:** Public Works Director's Report on Emergency Response Actions from Impacts on Flooding and Storms and Continuation of Emergency Actions for the Transportation Division and Conclude Emergency Actions for the Flood Control District

**Recommended Actions:**

That the Board of Supervisors:

- a) Receive and review a report from the Public Works Director regarding emergency actions taken pursuant to Resolution No. 19-327 and Public Contract Code section 22050 related to emergency operations responding to flooding, storms, debris removal and transportation projects following the recent late December 2025 and early January 2026 (25STM3) storm events and the necessity of the action and the reasons the emergency will not permit delay resulting from competitive solicitation of bids;
- b) Determine that there is a need to continue the emergency actions ordered by the Public Works Director (4/5 vote required);
- c) Direct staff to return to the Board at the next regular meeting, or every 14 days in the case of consecutive weekly regular meetings, to allow the Board to review the emergency action and determine whether there is a need to continue the emergency action, by a 4/5 vote, until the actions are terminated; and
- d) Determine that these emergency actions were found by the Board to be exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15269(d) and Section 15301(c) on January 13, 2026. A Notice of Exemption was filed

on this basis on January 7, 2026, and the proposed action is within the scope of that Notice of Exemption. Linked here: [County of Santa Barbara - File #: 26-00044.](#)

That the Board of Directors:

- a) Receive and review a report from the Public Works Director regarding emergency actions taken pursuant to Resolution No. 19-327 and Public Contract Code section 22050 related to emergency operations responding to flooding, storms, debris removal of Flood Control facilities and projects following the recent late December 2025 and early January 2026 (25STM3) storm events.
- b) Determine that the Emergency Actions ordered by the Public Works Director in response to the late December 2025 and early January 2026 (25STM3) storm events is concluded as of today's date pursuant to Public Contract Code section 22050(c)(3).
- c) Determine that these emergency actions are statutorily exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15269(c) for actions necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency. A Notice of Exemption was filed on this basis on January 13, 2026, and the proposed action is within the scope of that Notice of Exemption. ### **Summary Text:**

This item is on the agenda to receive, review, and continue the emergency actions and work being done by the Transportation Division related to the late December 2025 and early January 2026 storm events pursuant to the Public Works Director's authority under Resolution No. 19-327.

The Flood Control District has completed the emergency actions ordered by the Public Works Director's authority under Resolution No. 19-327 in response to the late December and early January storm events. As of the date of the emergency action report, the Flood Control District's work has been completed and emergency actions under Resolution No. 19-327 are no longer needed at this time.

On December 17, 2019, the Board approved Resolution No. 19-327 pursuant to Public Contract Code section 22050(b)(1) which authorizes the Board by a 4/5 vote to delegate authority to the Public Works Director to take certain actions in the event of an emergency (see Attachment A).

Public Contract Code section 22050(b)(3) and (c)(2), requires the Public Works Department to regularly report on current emergency response work actions ordered by the Public Works Director pursuant to the delegated authority (Attachments B and C). This allows the Board to comply with the statutory requirement to review the emergency action and determine by a four-fifths vote whether there is a need to continue the action.

Following the Board's initial review of the emergency actions, Public Contract Code Section 22050(c)(2) requires the Public Works Department to request that the Board review the emergency action at the next regular meeting, or every 14 days in the case of consecutive weekly regular meetings and determine by a 4/5 vote that there is a need to continue the action until the action is terminated. Public Contract Code Section 22050(c)(3) requires terminating the action at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant so that the remainder of the emergency response can be completed through normal competitive bid procedures.

Disaster response and recovery processes are actively in progress. The extended timeframe of these operations is a result of the extent and severity of damage, the multi-jurisdictional collaboration at some damage sites, and staff's attention to federal procedures and guidelines to maximize reimbursement. Public Works is planning to continue emergency operations with expedited procurement to ensure public safety and access to roadways and prevent further exacerbation of vulnerable locations across the county.

**Discussion:**

On December 17, 2019, your Board explicitly authorized the Public Works Director, or designee, to take action whenever an Emergency occurs whether or not the Emergency results in a declared emergency. This Resolution defines Emergency as "a sudden, unexpected occurrence that poses a clear and imminent danger, requiring immediate action to prevent or mitigate the loss or impairment of life, health, property, or essential public services" (Pub. Contract Code § 1102.)

Public Contract Code section 22050(a)(1) provides that in the case of an emergency, a public agency, pursuant to a four-fifths vote of its governing body, may repair or replace a public facility, take any directly related and immediate action required by that emergency, and procure the necessary equipment, services, and supplies for those purposes, without following otherwise-applicable competitive bid procedures. Section 22050(b)(1) authorizes that the Board of Supervisors/Directors, by a four-fifths vote, may delegate, by resolution, to the appropriate county administrative officer, chief engineer, or other nonelected agency officer, the authority to order any Action.

**Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:**

**Fiscal Analysis:**

Preliminary damage estimates for Transportation are currently \$3.6M countywide, with additional assessments ongoing. This work will be funded by reallocating road funds budgeted in FY25/26 for permanent restoration projects from 2023 and 2024 storms. Those projects will be delayed until resources are available to complete that work. Attachment B will be updated as additional work is performed. To date, actual expenditures total \$274,294 with an additional \$699,734 in committed obligations, for a cumulative total of \$974,028.

Total Flood Control District year-to-date costs for the 25STM3 emergency response activities are approximately \$286,411.52 consisting of contractor/vendor expenditures and staff labor incurred to date. In addition, there are estimated outstanding costs of \$1,168,766.64 associated with work completed or in progress and anticipated remaining activities.

Based on current information, the total estimated cost for the emergency response is approximately \$1,455,178.16, subject to refinement as final invoices are received and costs are fully reconciled.

The costs associated with this work will be covered through existing appropriations from the impacted Flood Control District flood zones. Should actual costs exceed current estimates, staff will return to the Board for consideration and approval of a budget revision.
