2) Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

**Problem Statement** 

Population to be served

According to the Census, the 2021 population of Santa Barbara County is 446,475.

Northern Santa Barbara County is primarily agricultural and home to a large

migrant Spanish and Indigenous Mixteco speaking agricultural population which

is the targeted unserved population to be served by UV Funding. The primary city

of Santa Maria is home to a 76% Hispanic population. The target area of this

proposal is defined as the Santa Maria Valley which includes the city of Santa

Maria (population 109,711), Guadalupe and unincorporated areas of Santa

Maria and Guadalupe. The Santa Maria valley has many of the socio-economic

factors which contribute to the highest rates of crime in the county: poverty, lack

of healthcare, and dangerous neighborhoods (Davies, Lyon, Monit-Catania,

1998).

**Historical Perspective** 

Since 2010, the Santa Barbara District Attorney's Office has secured

Our current program continues to seek to improve these strategies to

Demographic/cultural/social characteristics

outreach in a culturally and linguistically responsive manner.

It is estimated that between 15,000 and 25,000 indigenous immigrants have migrated to work in the area in recent years due to the labor-intensive agricultural economy. Indigenous immigrants are distinct from other Latino immigrant populations because they may only speak a native indigenous dialect, and do not self-identify as Indigenous or readily admit that they do not speak Spanish fluently. The majority of California's indigenous farmworkers come from a very concentrated area in Western and Southern Mexican states of Oaxaca, and in Eastern Guerrero. The most predominant Indigenous cultures in the geographic area of focus is Mixtec and secondarily Triqui.

Reason the Population is Unserved/underserved

While Spanish-speaking immigrants face profound challenges accessing culturally and linguistically appropriate services, indigenous populations are even

more difficult to engage in the criminal justice system because they are unfamiliar

with the laws of the U.S. and have distrust of law enforcement due to experiences

in their home country. They are fearful of law enforcement and criminal justice

systems. Regional and national immigration policies feeds fear of deportation,

driving the community further into the shadows, and discouraging any voluntary

contact with law enforcement. Indigenous immigrant victims

communication challenges as law enforcement and social service providers

have difficulty discerning whether an individual speaks Spanish or another

language, which requires an interpreter. This can not only impair information

sharing, but also discourage criminal justice cooperation.

Gaps in Service

Based upon current Victim-Witness Assistance Program statistics, only 15% of

victims receiving services require translation assistance, which illustrates that only

a very small percentage of immigrant victims of crime are accessing law

enforcement or victim services. The current statistical incidence of indigenous

speaking victims of crime not accessing law enforcement or Victim/Witness

services is not readily available. Contributing to the need for this funding, is a

high percentage of unsolved violent crime in the Santa Maria Valley, due in part

to lack of cooperation, fears of law enforcement, and deportation.

### Trauma Informed Culturally Sensitive Services:

This project's plan to provide trauma-informed, culturally sensitive services to indigenous/Spanish speaking populations is predicated upon the formation of effective relationships within the targeted immigrant community, and alliances with trusted stakeholders and community providers. The immigrant community distrusts law enforcement, and is suspicious of services which originate from government agencies; i.e. the District Attorney's Office or law enforcement agencies. In order to successfully deliver services outlined in this grant, the applicant agency and its partner law enforcement agencies in the Northern part of the County must understand the community and barriers to access. While the advocates assigned to the project are bilingual (Spanish/English) and bicultural, they will participate in intensive culturally competence training. The Victim-Witness Assistance Program has a working relationship with Lideres Campesinas, who provide assistance to farmworker women who are victims/survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence. Lideres provides cultural and/or linguistic support to Spanish Speaking and Indigenous speaking victims. In addition, the Victim-Witness Program partners with Herencia Indigena, a non-profit that partners with Dignity Health, who provides Cultural Competency/Trauma Informed Training for

social service providers. Herencia conducted a webinar for our staff regarding effective strategies to engage the indigenous community. Our program works with MICOP, Mixteco Indigena Community Organizing Project of the central coast. We have a current contract with MICOP to provide translation services and community referrals that are linguistically appropriate and culturally

**Crisis Intervention-Counseling Services for Victims/Survivors** 

Our Advocate is Spanish Speaking and Bicultural. The Detective Divisions of each of the local law enforcement agencies routinely contact Victim Witness Advocates directly to provide crisis intervention shortly after the crime and during the initial stages of an investigation. When necessary, our staff engage MICOP, when a victim is indigenous speaking, to facilitate timely crisis intervention and counseling support. MICOP is available in person and tele/video conferencing as needed. This is especially important when a victim/survivor is in crisis. On a recent occasion, MICOP was critical in supporting the parents in an infant death investigation conducted by the Santa Maria Police Department.

The Advocates provide referrals to qualified clinical bicultural therapists who offer

privileged communications per California Law. The Victim Witness Program

Program Advocates provide no less than 3 referrals to qualified therapists.

Participation in local and public non-profit social services network

Grant staff attend several public and social service networks using

#### Outreach Plan

Program staff continue to conduct outreach in a variety of ways. Historically, staff participated in annual events hosted by local farmers/ranchers. Thousands of workers and their families attended to receive information regarding community resources, and service providers, including the Victim-Witness Assistance Program UV Advocates. Organizers provide food, family activities, prizes, and entertainment. Staff will seek out similar outreach opportunities during the grant period. UV Program staff have historically used Radio to provide information to the

services. The Program will partner with MICOP's Radio Indigena, which is the

strongest and most effective outreach and organizing tool for the indigenous,

immigrant, and farmworker communities. Farmworkers rely heavily on radio for

Our primary source of referrals is law enforcement. All criminal cases are sent to the office for filing consideration. In addition, the Victim Witness Program receives referrals from the Detective Divisions of each of the local law enforcement agencies prior to a completed investigation or a filing consideration when there is no arrest/suspect. We also have a Victim Advocate co-located at the Santa Maria Police Department who provides early intervention to victims of crime whose cases are unsolved, or haven't been referred to our office due to lack of a suspect.

### Crime Victim Compensation Benefits and Emergency Assistance:

Our Victim-Witness Assistance Program has a Joint Powers Contract with the State Victim Compensation Board. Advocates assist victims immediately with claim completion, and expedite processing locally, including, but not limited to emergency relocation and funeral burial expenses. The Victim Witness Assistance Program also has a discretionary Victim Emergency Fund to assist victims with material needs such as emergency housing, food, clothing and transportation.

The Victim Witness Program Director submitted the original UV grant application

in 2010. She has managed Cal OES funded grants since 1997. She has overseen

the Unserved/Underserved program's evolution, and continues to provide

administrative oversight. The Director, with assistance from the District Attorney's

Business Office, currently administers seven Cal OES funded grants in a cost-

effective manner with no audit findings.
