










3 Year Old Children




Why is Preventing Child Abuse Important?

- Physical, mental and emotional health (obesity, depression, anxiety, eating disorders, diabetes, heart disease, cancer)
- Cognitive dysfunction (language development, attention deficits, school performance)

Why is Preventing Child Abuse important?

- High risk health behaviors (teen pregnancy, alcohol and substance abuse)
- Behavioral problems (aggression, juvenile delinquency, adult criminality, abusive and violent behavior)



CAPC Core Principle #1

Prevention is possible - AND saves costs in intervention and treatment.





CAPC Core Principle #2

Communities that invest in and support parents and families ensure healthy development for children.






Prevention programs and services strengthen families through

- -reducing risk AND
- -promoting protective factors,
- so child abuse never occurs.

- Stress
- Job loss
- Poverty
- Domestic violence
- Substance abuse




all increase the risk of child abuse!



- Lack of understanding of a child's developmental stages
- Postpartum and other kinds of depression
- Isolation


all increase the risk of child abuse!

- Nurturing and attachment
- Knowledge of parenting and of child and youth development



serve as protective factors!

- Parental resilience
- Social connections
- Concrete supports for parents



serve as protective factors!

The costs of responding to the impact of child abuse and neglect are borne by the victims and their families, but also by society

- Direct costs: Hospitalization, mental health care, child welfare system, law enforcement
- Indirect costs: Special education, juvenile delinquency, mental health and health care, adult criminal justice system and lost productivity to society

In 2006 in the United States, the direct and indirect costs of child abuse and neglect were \$103 billion.

The Child Abuse Prevention Council

A community council with the primary purpose of coordinating Santa Barbara County's efforts to prevent and respond to Child Abuse (mandated by Welfare & Institutions Code Sections 18980 et seq.)

Child Abuse Prevention Council – a cost-effective resource

- Existing agencies working together to improve coordination and outcomes
- Brings resources and information to the County
- Community participating voluntarily in activities to strengthen families and protect children

CAPC Projects

- Education, outreach and resources for providers and their families
- Mandated Reporter training for school community
- The "Front Yard" an organized, coordinated and well thought out system of PREVENTION, so that families are strengthened and children are nurtured

Policy Recommendations

Give priority to:

- Access to Health Care
- Safe, Affordable Housing
- After-school Programs & Youth Activities
- Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks
- Economic Support for Families
- Law Enforcement

Every decision in these areas has an impact on Child Abuse Prevention.
