SUBJECT: Reaffirm the existence of a Local Emergency resulting from the January 2005 Severe Storm Emergency for the County of Santa Barbara, and; Terminate the Waiver of the Competitive Bidding Process Pursuant to Public Contract Code 22050

Recommendation(s):

That the Board of Supervisors:

- A. Adopt a resolution to reaffirm the existence of a Local Emergency due to the January 2005 storm; and terminate the waiver of the competitive bidding process, pursuant to Public Contract Code 22050.

Alignment with Board Strategic Plan:

The recommendations are primarily aligned with Goal No. 2; Ensure the Public Health and Safety and Provide Essential Infrastructure.

Executive Summary and Discussion:

The purpose of the recommended action is to continue the existence of a Local Emergency for the winter 2005 storms and to terminate the waiver of competitive bidding process. The reason for continuing the emergency is that repairs to county infrastructure damages from the winter's storms are not yet complete. However, there is no longer a need to continue the waiver of competitive bids because relevant contracts have been let.

On January 10, 2005, when the Board of Supervisors was not in session, Director of Emergency Services Michael F. Brown, proclaimed the existence of a local emergency for Santa Barbara County due to damage resulting from a series of severe winter storms. Additionally, Mr. Brown requested Governor Schwarzenegger to proclaim the County of Santa Barbara to be in a State of Emergency. On January 11, 2005, your Board approved **Resolution 05-006** ratifying the proclamation of a local emergency and the request for a State Proclamation of Emergency. At that time and based on Mr. Brown's recommendation your Board requested the Governor to seek a Presidential Declaration of Emergency from the President of the United States. On January 26, 2005, Governor Schwarzenegger proclaimed the County of Santa Barbara to be in a State of Emergency.

On February 4, 2004, President George W. Bush proclaimed the County of Santa Barbara and seven other Southern California counties to be a major disaster (FEMA-1577-DR). The President's declaration provides assistance for public agencies, but initially excluded assistance for private individuals and businesses.

On March 16, 2005 Governor Schwarzenegger issued a new proclamation (*see attached*) stating that a State of Emergency exists within the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego and Ventura. The Governor further proclaimed that because of statewide impact to the highway infrastructure, his proclamation also included Santa Barbara County. As part of this new proclamation, the Governor's previous Executive Order (S-1-05, *see attached*) for the earlier storms remains in effect.

Also on March 16th, Governor Schwarzenegger requested that President Bush declare a major disaster to exist for the State of California in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego and Ventura commencing on of February 12, 2005 and continuing through February 24, 2005. (*see attached letter*). Your Board adopted a Resolution requesting an extension of the incident period Santa Barbara County has requested an extension of the incident period through February 28, 2005. This has been transmitted to the Governor and FEMA Region IX but there has been no action as of this date.

On March 17, 2005 the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), after reassessing the damages sustained by private individuals and businesses in Santa Barbara County, determined that residents and businesses are now eligible for federal Individual Assistance (IA) for damage sustained from December 27, 2004 through January 11, 2005.

The assistance can include grants to help pay for temporary housing, home repairs and other serious disaster-related expenses not met by insurance or other aid programs. Low-interest loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) also will be available to cover residential and business losses not fully compensated by insurance. SBA is the federal government's primary source of money for the long-term rebuilding of disaster damaged private property.

The only way residents can register for federal and state¹ disaster aid is through FEMA's toll-free number or website at:

¹State disaster aid is limited to a state supplemental grant program administered (SSGP) by the State Dept. of Social Services, Disaster & Safety Services Bureau (DSS) for unmet needs. The SSGP may assist with any eligible items not already addressed by the federal Individuals and Housing Program (IHP) disaster assistance. However, individuals must have applied to FEMA and maximized the IHP award in order to be eligible for the SGP. If an individual has maximized the IHP, FEMA will automatically transmit the application to SSGP. There is no separate application process for SSGP.

Residents and businesses must register with FEMA **no later than May 15, 2005.**

Disaster Recovery Center

To better serve residents who suffered damages during the severe storms of December 27, 2004 – January 11, 2005, the Santa Barbara County Fire Department's Office of Emergency Services is coordinating with FEMA, SBA, the State OES and the Santa Barbara Chapter of the American Red Cross to open a Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) at the Red Cross building in Santa Barbara. This DRC will provide people with an opportunity to meet face-to-face with recovery specialists. Representatives of state and federal, as well as loan officers from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), will be on hand to answer questions and provide recovery information. Written materials about various assistance programs are also available to individuals and business owners.

The Santa Barbara DRC will be open **Friday, April 1, 2005 to Thursday, April 7, 2005 (closed Sunday, April 3rd)**. The DRC will be located at:

Beginning Friday, April 8, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) Disaster Office will be relocated, but still available to provide assistance until May 16, 2005.

Terminate Waiver of Competitive Bidding Process

On January 18, 2005 the Board of Supervisors adopted **Resolution 05-018**, which authorized the waiver of the competitive bidding process for the repair and replacement of public facilities damaged by the emergency conditions pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 22050.

This winter's storm events has constituted a continuing emergency and up to now it has been impractical to solicit competitive bids for the repair or replacement of public facilities damaged by the unrelenting storms. Old San Marcos and other County roads still remain closed. Public Contract Code Section 22050(a)

authorizes the Board of Supervisors, by a four-fifths vote, to “*repair or replace a public facility, take any directly related and immediate action required by that emergency, and procure the necessary equipment, services, and supplies for those purposes, without giving notice for bids to let contracts*”. The Board is required to review its decision every 14 days to determine whether the waiver should continue and is obligated to terminate the waiver of the bid process at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant so that the remainder of work may be completed under the bid process. Therefore, the Board is requested to terminate the waiver of competitive bidding process.

Mandates and Service Levels:

No change in programs or service level.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

There are no direct fiscal or facilities impacts as a result of these recommendations. Adoption makes the County eligible for state disaster relief funds otherwise not available and allows storm damage repairs to be made in the most expedient and efficient way possible in preparation for future storms throughout the rest of this winter’s storm season.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE

ONGOING EXISTENCE OF LOCAL
EMERGENCY DUE TO JANUARY 2005
HEAVY RAINS, AND DISCONTINUING THE
WAIVER OF BIDDING PROCESS
PURSUANT TO PUBLIC CONTRACT
CODE SECTION 22050;

RESOLUTION NO. 05-____

WHEREAS, on January 11, 2005, this Board adopted Resolution 05-006, which ratified the proclaimed existence of a local emergency due to heavy rains which created a condition of extreme peril to life and property in Santa Barbara County;

WHEREAS, Section 8630 of the Government Code provides in part, that the body declaring a local emergency shall review, at least every fourteen (14) days until such local emergency is terminated, the need for continuing the local emergency and shall proclaim the termination of such local emergency at the earliest date that conditions warrant;

WHEREAS, on January 18, 2005, this Board adopted Resolution 05-018, which authorized the waiver of the competitive bidding process for the repair or replacement of public facilities damaged by emergency conditions, pursuant to Public Contracts Code Section 22050. At least every 14 days, the Board is required to review the basis for waiving the competitive bid process;

WHEREAS, on January 26, 2005, California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger proclaimed the County of Santa Barbara to be in a State of Emergency. On March 16, 2005 Governor Schwarzenegger extended the State proclamation for the County of Santa Barbara;

WHEREAS, on February 4, 2005, President George W. Bush proclaimed the County of Santa Barbara and seven other Southern California counties to be a major disaster (FEMA-1577-DR);

WHEREAS, this Board has reviewed and affirmed the ongoing need for continuing the local emergency and need for continuing the waiver of the competitive bidding process, at least every fourteen (14) days; and

WHEREAS, the condition of extreme peril to life and property still exists in this County and the need for the local emergency continues. However, it is no longer necessary to waive the competitive bidding process. There is still a substantial amount of storm related damage to public facilities that will need to be repaired, but this work can be accomplished through the competitive bidding process, without jeopardizing essential public services.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Santa Barbara, that there is a need to continue the proclamation of the local emergency that was made by this Board by Resolution 05-006. The local emergency will continue in place until terminated by action of this Board.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that it is no longer necessary to continue the waiver of the competitive bidding process for the repair or replacement of public facilities pursuant to Public Contracts Code Section 22050, and therefore the competitive bidding process shall be reinstated.

EXECUTIVE ORDER S-1-05
by the
Governor of the State of California

WHEREAS, a series of severe rainstorms swept through Southern California beginning on December 28, 2004; and

WHEREAS, the series of storms brought heavy rains that caused flash floods, mudslides, the accumulation of debris, washed out and damaged roads, and the loss of human life; and

WHEREAS, due to the extensive damage caused by these storms on January 12, 2005, I declared a State of Emergency in Ventura County, and on January 15, 2005, I declared a State of Emergency in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Santa Barbara; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative in the circumstances to bring every necessary resource to bear to alleviate the individual, social and economic impacts of these events and to remove bureaucratic barriers to recovery and to Californians in need of services.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ARNOLD SCHWARZENEGGER, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of California, do hereby issue this order to become effective immediately:

1. The California Department of Transportation shall formally request immediate assistance through the Federal Highway Administration's Emergency Relief Program, 23 U.S.C. Â§125, in order to obtain federal assistance for highway repairs or reconstruction in Kern, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Orange and San Diego Counties.
2. The statutes, rules and regulations, as they apply to the excavation of rock, gravel, sand or soil from public or private lands under the Surface Mining and Reclamation Act of 1975 (as amended) (Public Resources Code, Division 2, Chapter 9) are hereby suspended for excavation that is for the sole purpose of reconstructing state or local transportation facilities in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Orange and San Diego that were damaged in these storms.
3. That statutes, rules and regulations as they apply to California Department of Transportation contracts are suspended for 180 days following the date of this proclamation for the purpose of facilitating the reopening and restoration of transportation infrastructure damaged by these storms in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Orange and San Diego. California Department of Transportation officers shall use sound discretion in applying this suspension to ensure that the suspension of statutes, rules and regulations serves the purpose of accelerating the reopening and restoration of transportation infrastructure damaged in the storms.

Under the provisions of Section 401 (a) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. section 5121 et. Seq. (the Stafford Act), and implemented by 44 CFR 206.36, I request that you declare a major disaster to exist for the State of California, in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Ventura, as a result of heavy rainfall, snow, mud and debris flows, flooding, and sinkholes commencing on February 12, 2005, and continuing through February 24, 2005.

In response to the situation, I have taken appropriate action under state law and directed the execution of the State Emergency Plan, in accordance with Section 401 of the Stafford Act. On March 16, 2005, I proclaimed a state of emergency in the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, Santa Barbara and Ventura.

On February 23, 2005, I requested a joint federal, state and local Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA). Assessments began on February 24, 2005. The survey of the damaged areas indicates approximately \$61 million in damage to public facilities; approximately 70 percent of this is related to debris removal, emergency actions, and roads. At least 672 homes sustained

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some damage and 152 were either destroyed or suffered major damage. In addition to these residential losses, 34 businesses suffered major damage or were destroyed and another 29 sustained minor damage or were affected.

All of the counties included in FEMA-1577-DR-CA experienced more public and private damage following this recent storm series, which struck Southern California on February 12, 2005, and continued through February 24, 2005. Some areas received in excess of seven inches of rain in just three days and more than 18 inches of rain over the duration of these storms, exacerbating ground saturation conditions. Localized flooding and mudflows were reported throughout the region, resulting in damage to homes and businesses and the evacuation of area residents from damaged or threatened buildings. These more recent storms caused several major highway and local road closures, sink holes, dozens of traffic accidents, flash flooding and mudflows. Regrettably, seven lives were lost, raising the death toll from the January and February storms to 40 victims. There has also been extensive agricultural damage to the dairy, strawberry, and avocado industries.

The affected counties, and many cities, activated their Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs) and Public Works Department Operations Centers (DOCs) in response to the emergency. Authorities ordered evacuations in several counties and local agencies worked around the clock to remove debris to allow roads to reopen and to clear drainage channels. Overflows and flooding damaged various public facilities throughout the seven-county area. Water and sanitation districts and reservoirs in San Diego County released water due to the record rainfall accumulations. Heavy storm run-off caused Lake Elsinore in Riverside County to overflow, threatening 20 homes and harming gravesites at the local cemetery. The Santa Paula Airport in Ventura County incurred significant damage as a result of the raging Santa Clara River, which eroded one side of the airport so rapidly that buildings fell into the river.

The OES Southern Regional Emergency Operations Center at Los Alamitos and the State Operations Center at OES headquarters in Sacramento were activated and provided support 24-hours a day for the duration of the storms. The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) provided technical assistance to affected local governments. In addition to these support services, the state provided 168 employees (14 hand crews with 12 employees per crew) from the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CDF) and California Department of Corrections (CDC) to directly assist local government flood-fighting efforts.

Three highways were closed for varying lengths of time during the storms and 16 highways remained closed throughout the storms because of damage during the January storms. The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) continues to secure emergency contracts and to make repairs to the highways on a 24-hour basis. Caltrans estimates an additional \$119 million in new road damage. Numerous local roads in the counties and cities were flooded and

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had mudflows, necessitating many emergency responses. Road conditions in the San Bernardino and Riverside mountains isolated hundreds of people and Amtrak suspended train service north of Los Angeles to Santa Barbara because of fears that the tracks had been undermined by the storms.

Mudflows and land slippages continue to be a problem for communities throughout Southern California, including Laguna Beach, Anaheim, Mission Viejo, La Jolla, Oceanside, city of San Diego, Chino Hills, Carlsbad, city of Los Angeles, Highland Park, Monterey Park, and numerous other areas. Residents in the La Conchita community in Ventura County, where a landslide killed 10 people in the January 2005 storms, were evacuated again and warned by the county of the extreme danger that continues as a result of storm-triggered, continuing land movement. The United States Geological Survey issued a Landslide and Debris Flow Advisory for Southern California, warning residents of the continued threat of land slippage that began as a result of the January storms. In addition to mudflows and land slippages, sinkholes have also caused problems, the most deadly one taking two lives in Sun Valley.

As you are aware, the current event was preceded by a series of rainstorms that began on or about December 28, 2004, and ended around January 11, 2005. Those storms ultimately cost the lives of 33 people. Seven counties, including six in this request, received a federal major disaster declaration, FEMA-1577-DR-CA, on February 4, 2005. This storm series added another 18 inches of rain to the 17 inches that fell during the previously declared event, producing the wettest winter in Southern California since 1890.

Since these new storms occurred almost a month after the closure of the incident period for FEMA-1577-DR, we realize that simply extending the incident period for that event to include the new storms is an unlikely possibility. In reviewing this new event, however, FEMA should consider that the new damages, extreme ground saturation, mudflows and land slippages have further compounded an already critical situation that continues to tax the resources of Southern California counties and the state.

This new event should not be viewed in isolation, but, rather, as yet another in a series of deadly storms that has inundated Southern California since late December. Furthermore, these same counties, with the exception of Orange and Kern, dealt with the effects of the 2003 Southern California Wildfires (FEMA-1498-DR) and the bark beetle epidemic. Residents in these now saturated burn areas face imminent danger of further flooding and debris and mudflows. Although I realize that damages assessed in several of the counties may not meet FEMA's county per capita indicators for a public assistance declaration, I urge you to recognize that the proximity and cumulative effects of the two series of storms has not allowed for sufficient recovery and that supplemental federal disaster assistance is vital to aid recovery efforts.

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In addition to the wildfires and the bark beetle epidemic, California is still recovering from the San Simeon Earthquake (FEMA-1505-DR) that struck in late December 2003, and the Jones Tract Levee Break (FEMA-1529-DR) that occurred in June 2004. During the past year, the state also requested and received 21 Fire Management Assistance Grants from FEMA, 34 U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) declarations, and 33 designations from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Although federal assistance has provided much relief, the state's share for these recent federal disasters is more than \$54,000,000.

Besides these federally recognized events, the state of California experienced other localized disasters including flash-flooding in Inyo County, a devastating fire in Shasta County, and flooding in Southern California in October of 2004. Counties have also borne significant costs associated with the outbreak of the Exotic Newcastle Disease, Mexican fruit fly infestation, and the West Nile Virus that has now spread from Southern California to Northern California.

Based on the above conditions, I have determined that this event is of such severity and magnitude that effective response and recovery efforts are beyond the current capabilities of the state and the affected local governments and that supplementary federal assistance is necessary.

PDA results for Public Assistance are tabulated in Enclosure A. Estimates of assistance for Individual Assistance are summarized in Enclosure B. Our best estimate for other federal assistance programs is summarized in Enclosure C. I certify that for this major disaster, the state and local governments will assume all applicable non-federal share of costs required by the Stafford Act. Total state and local expenditures for federal Public Assistance are expected to exceed \$14 million, in accordance with the table in Enclosure D.

Accordingly, I am specifically requesting Individual Assistance, including the Individuals and Households Program (IHP), Crisis Counseling, Disaster Unemployment Assistance, Public Assistance, Hazard Mitigation and any other Stafford Act programs as appropriate for the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Ventura. In addition, the state requests implementation of the U.S. Small Business Administration disaster loan program and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Emergency Loan Program.

Understanding that there is no set threshold for recommending Individual Assistance, I am aware that certain factors may contribute to a review of a request from the state. Given the recent history of storm activity in the area, the traumatic nature of storm-related deaths, the extremely low rate of insurance in some of the most severely affected communities, and the lack of similar state programs, has led me to request implementation of individual assistance programs for this disaster. Because the effects of this storm are so widespread and pursuant to FEMA's Response and Recovery Directorate Policy 9122.1, *Designation of Counties for Major Disaster*

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Declarations, I am also requesting that FEMA include individual assistance for contiguous counties.

In addition, I anticipate the need for debris removal, which poses immediate threat to lives, public health, and safety. Pursuant to Sections 407 and 502 of the Stafford Act (42 U.S.C. The §5173(b) and 5192), the state agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the United States of America for any claims arising from the removal of debris for this disaster. The state agrees that debris removal from public and private property will not occur until the landowner signs an unconditional authorization for the removal of debris.

I have designated Mr. Henry R. Renteria, Director of OES, as the State Coordinating Officer for this request. He will coordinate with FEMA to complete damage assessments and may provide further information or justification on my behalf.

Disaster Proclamation for Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, Santa Barbara, and Ventura Counties

PROCLAMATION
by the
Governor of the State of California

I, ARNOLD SCHWARZENEGGER, Governor of the State of California, find that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist within the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, Santa Barbara, and Ventura Counties, as a result of a continuing series of severe rainstorms in that area. The series of storms brought unusually heavy rains that caused flash floods, mudslides, sinkholes, the accumulation of debris, washed out and damaged roads, damaged and destroyed homes and businesses, and the loss of human life. Each succeeding storm has exacerbated the conditions and need for state assistance caused by the earlier storms. The counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Ventura have requested state assistance. Because the magnitude of this disaster exceeds the capabilities of the services, personnel, equipment and facilities of each county, I find these counties to be in a state of emergency, and under the authority of the California Emergency Services Act, set forth at Title 2, Division 1, Chapter 7 of the California Government Code, commencing with section 8550, I hereby proclaim that a State of Emergency exists within the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Ventura. Further, because of the statewide impact to the highway infrastructure, this proclamation will also include Santa Barbara County.

Pursuant to this proclamation, I hereby direct all agencies of the state government to utilize and employ state personnel, equipment and facilities for the performance of any and all necessary activities to alleviate this emergency in accordance with the State Emergency Plan. My previous Executive Order (S-1-05) for the earlier storms shall remain in effect under this proclamation.

I FURTHER DIRECT that as soon as hereafter possible, this proclamation be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this proclamation.
