## **Recommended Actions:**

That the Board of Supervisors:

Reaffirms the ongoing existence of local emergency due to environmental impacts, response and recovery costs from the Tea Fire.

#### Background:

On November 13, 2008, the Director of Emergency Services proclaimed that a State of Emergency existed due to threats posed by the Tea Fire. The Tea Fire ultimately consumed approximately 1,940 acres and preliminary damage estimates are that approximately 211 residences in both the city and the county were destroyed. As a result of this damage, Governor Schwarzenegger proclaimed a State of Emergency; which remains in effect. On November 18, 2008, President Bush declared a major disaster for the southern California wildfires; including Santa Barbara County; which also remains in effect.

The Tea Fire has, like the Gap and Zaca Fires preceding it, caused environmental damage that now poses significant public health and safety risks. The Tea Fire's 1,940 acres of damage has resulted in approximately 67% of the Sycamore Canyon watershed being burned. This often steep and rocky

watershed then empties into the lower eastside of the City of Santa Barbara. Professional staff have voiced very strong concerns over the flooding and debris potentials for this winter.

Because the Tea Fire has occurred close to the 2008-2009 rainy season, staff of the Santa Barbara County Flood Control District have already initiated multiple projects in an attempt to reduce the significant threats posed. These projects include the clearing of debris basins, channel clearing and other actions which staff believe are immediately necessary to protect the public. Working cooperatively with the staff of the City of Santa Barbara staff continue to initiate other projects that are determined vital in reducing the flood threat.

#### Narrative:

Costs for the Annual Maintenance Plan work located in the burned watershed area were included in the Adopted 2008-09 Budget under the Maintenance cost center of the Water Resources Division of the Public Works Department as shown on page D-336 in the budget book. However, costs for the additional watershed response work caused by the Tea Fire were not included in the Adopted Budget for this Fiscal Year. Flood Control will be returning to the Board to approve a budget revision to allocate costs from designations once estimated costs of the work are known.

Because the Tea Fire is a State proclaimed emergency and a Federally Declared Disaster some of these project costs may be reimbursable through the State Office of Emergency Services and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Additionally, staff have been in contact with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) regarding federal funding that may become available for the initial work. Cost sharing for the local share of the costs for mitigation measures would be shared with the City of Santa Barbara.

WHEREAS, on November 18, 2008, this Board ratified, by resolution, the November 13, 2008 Proclamation of Local Emergency by the Director of Emergency Services with regards to the Tea Fire;

WHEREAS, on November 14, 2008, Governor Schwarzenegger Proclaimed a State of Emergency for the County of Santa Barbara due to the Tea Fire;

WHEREAS, since November 14, 2008 additional significant fires have burned in the Counties of Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino, and those Counties also have been proclaimed to be in a State of Emergency by Governor Schwarzenegger. On November 19, 2008, President George W. Bush executed a Presidential Declaration of Major Disaster for the counties of Santa Barbara, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino;

WHEREAS, Section 8630 of the Government Code provides in part that the body declaring a local emergency shall review, at least every fourteen days until such local emergency is terminated, the need for continuing the local emergency and shall proclaim the termination of such local emergency at the earliest date that conditions warrant;

WHEREAS, conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property continue within this County, as a result of the Tea Fire which was ignited on November 13, 2008. There have been 23 injuries from smoke inhalation, 3 burn injuries, 231 residences destroyed, 9 residences damaged and 1,940 acres burned. As of November 20,

2008, the fire was 100% contained. There continues to be conditions of disaster and extreme peril to the safety of persons and property in the County, known and unknown, because of the extensive burn damage and the significant threat of flooding during this winter rainy season;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Santa Barbara, that there is a need to continue the proclamation of the Tea Fire Local Emergency. The Tea Fire Local Emergency shall continue in place and be reviewed by this Board at least every fourteen days until it is terminated.
