- b) Determine that the above actions are government funding mechanisms or other government fiscal activities, which do not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment and are therefore not projects under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to section 15378(b)(4) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Summary Text:

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This item is on the agenda to request that the Board approve a First Amendment to the Pacific Pride Foundation (PPF) Fiscal Years 2023-2027 Agreement of Services to suspend Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training and ADP Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal services, instate Syringe Services Program (SSP) services; add the FY 24-25 Federal Award Identification Table; add Programs Goals, Outcomes & Measures for Syringe Services Program (SSP); and reduce the total contract maximum amount by \$71,558 for a revised total contract maximum amount of **\$280,442**.

Background:

On October 4, 2022, the Santa Barbara County Department of Behavioral Wellness (BWell) Alcohol and Drug Program (ADP) released a Request for Proposal (RFP) for Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Trainings, Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Program Services, and Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Early Intervention Services. PPF was selected to provide countywide Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Trainings, Opioid Overdose Prevention, and Reversal Program Services for FY 2023-2027. The contract was authorized by the Board of Supervisors on June 27, 2023.

New Substance Use Block Grant (SUBG) authorized services, as of October 1, 2024, permit further expansion and enhancement of Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction services, by leveraging Syringe Services Programs. Pacific Pride Foundation will provide a comprehensive county-wide Syringe Services Program (SSP) to assist with reducing the risk and spread of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), viral hepatitis, tuberculosis (TB) and other sexually transmitted diseases (STD's); and to reduce the risk and occurrence of opioid overdose for People Who Inject Drugs (PWID).

Santa Barbara County and Pacific Pride Foundation have mutually agreed to refocus services by terminating the funding for Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Program services to Pacific Pride Foundation effective September 30, 2024. The Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Program Services will be replaced with the new comprehensive Syringe Services Program effective October 1, 2024 via Pacific Pride Foundation's already established and successful syringe exchange program. The SSP will include the distribution of Naloxene and Opioid Overdose Prevention training to individuals receiving SSP services. The larger community level distribution of Naloxene is now being managed through the State Department of Health Care Services Naloxene Distribution Project. The SSP services must be provided by an approved Syringe Exchange program. Pacific Pride Foundation is currently the only Safe Syringe Exchange program in Santa Barbara County that has been approved by the California Department of Public Health. Pacific Pride Foundation has a proven track record of success with the SSP program. New performance measures for syringe exchange are described below and will be monitored throughout the term of the contract.

Performance Outcomes:

Pacific Pride Foundation did not successfully meet the goals outlined in Exhibit E for the Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training. PPF organizational changes and staff vacancies that have now been rectified contributed to the unmet goals and expectations outlined in the Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Statement of Work for FY 22-23 and FY 23-24. Therefore, BWell is terminating the funding of those services to Pacific Pride Foundation effective September 30, 2024. The existing Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Program Services will be replaced with the new comprehensive Syringe Services Program effective October 1, 2024. New performance measures for syringe exchange are described below and will be monitored throughout the term of the contract. BWell will continue to provide Cultural Competency trainings through different trainers in alignment with identified Department goals as outlined in the Cultural Competency Plan.

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Performance Measures:

Performance shall be assessed in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit E of the Amendment (Program Goals, Outcomes and Measures). The yearly program goals for Safe Syringe Program (SSP) Services are:

- a) Distribute sterile needles and Naloxene/Narcan at a minimum of six (6) events per month.
- b) Refer a minimum of 50% of clients to SUD, MAT, MH primary care services, and HIV and viral hepatitis testing and treatment, as indicated/appropriate.
- c) Provide a minimum of six (6) harm reduction trainings, including HIV and viral hepatis risk reduction counseling, and Naloxene/Narcan training and education to clients at SUD treatment programs.
- d) Document and report implementation of SSP program components through completion of a quarterly report.

Key_Contract_Risks:

As with any contract funded by Federal sources, there is a risk of future audit disallowances and repayments. The risk to Behavioral Wellness is limited as BWell contracts include language requiring contractors to repay any amounts disallowed in audit findings, minimizing financial risks to County.

FIRST AMENDMENT

TO THE AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES OF INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT to the Agreement for Services of Independent Contractor, referenced as <u>BC #23-040</u> (hereafter First Amendment), is made by and between the **County of Santa Barbara** (County or Department) and **Pacific Pride Foundation** (Contractor), for the continued provision of services specified herein.

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that it is specially trained, skilled, experienced, and competent to perform the special services required by County, and County desires to continue to retain the services of Contractor pursuant to the terms, covenants, and conditions herein set forth;

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors authorized the County to enter into an Agreement for Services of Independent Contractor with Pacific Pride Foundation on June 27, 2023, referred to as BC 23-040, (hereafter Agreement) for the provision of county-wide Alcohol and Drug Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training and Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Program Services for a total maximum contract amount not to exceed \$352,000, inclusive of \$88,000 per fiscal year, for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2027; and

WHEREAS, this First Amendment to the Agreement suspends Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training services effective September 30, 2024; suspends ADP Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Services effective September 30, 2024, instates Syringe Services Program (SSP) services effective October 1, 2024, adds the FY 24-25 Federal Award Identification Table to Exhibit B-3; adds Programs Goals, Outcomes & Measures for Syringe Services Program (SSP); and reduces the total contract maximum amount by \$71,558 for a revised total contract maximum amount of \$280,442, inclusive of \$88,000 for FY 23-24, \$68,484 for FY 24-25, \$61,979 for FY 25-26, and \$61,979 for FY 26-27, for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2027.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, terms, and conditions contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

I. Delete the header of <u>Exhibit A-2</u>, <u>Statement of Work: ADP Outreach & Targeted Cultural Competency Trainings</u> and replace with the following:

EXHIBIT A-2 STATEMENT OF WORK: ADP OUTREACH & TARGETED CULTURAL COMPETENCY TRAININGS JULY 1, 2023- SEPTEMBER 30, 2024

II. Delete the first paragraph of <u>Section 3. Services</u> of <u>Exhibit A-2</u>, <u>Statement of Work:</u>
<u>ADP Outreach & Targeted Cultural Competency Trainings</u> and replace with the following:

- 3. SERVICES. Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training services will be provided from July 1, 2023, through September 30, 2024. These services will include county-wide outreach and prevention services through trainings on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning and others (LGBTQ+) issues. Outreach and Targeted Cultural Competency Training services shall include the following:

- 3. SERVICES. Opioid Overdose Prevention and Reversal Services will be provided from July 1, 2023, through September 30, 2024. These services shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
- V. Add Exhibit A-4, Statement of Work: ADP Syringe Service Program (SSP) October 1, 2024 -June 30, 2027 as follows:

EXHIBIT A-4 STATEMENT OF WORK: ADP SYRINGE SERVICE PROGRAM (SSP) OCTOBER 1, 2024 – JUNE 30, 2027

1. PROGRAM SUMMARY. Pacific Pride Foundation (CONTRACTOR) will provide a comprehensive county-wide Syringe Services Program (SSP) to assist in reducing the risk and spread of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), viral hepatitis, tuberculosis (TB) and other sexually transmitted diseases (STD's); and, to reduce the risk and occurrence of opioid overdose for People Who Inject Drugs (PWID).

The Program will be headquartered at:

608 Anacapa Street, Suite A1, Santa Barbara, CA 93101

2. PROGRAM GOALS.

A. Reduce the risk of acquiring and transmitting blood born and sexually transmitted disease, reduce Opioid Overdose, and reduce stigma associated with People Who Inject Drugs (PWID) through the use and implementation of SSP harm reduction practices.

SSP will serve as a connection point for access to long-term primary care and behavioral health treatment, by providing referrals to primary care programs and programs who provide evidenced-based Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment including Medications for Addiction Treatment (MAT).

- 3. SERVICES. Syringe Services Program (SSP) will be provided from October 1, 2024, through June 30, 2027. These services will include a minimum of six (6) SSP events monthly providing countywide safe needle exchange services, screening and referrals for treatment, risk reduction counseling and education. SSP services will include Opioid Overdose education and outreach including the distribution of opioid antagonist medications such as Naloxone. The SSP target population will include People Who Inject Drugs (PWID). SSP services shall include the following:
 - A. CONTRACTOR will operate a safe needle exchange program to include the distribution of a minimum of 30,000 sterile needles and the collection of 25,000 used needles. Contractor will target PWID via street outreach using a Health Utility Vehicle (HUV) to reach vulnerable populations with limited access to resources; contractor will offer needle exchange and needle collection services via a minimum of six (6) dedicated service dates, times and locations throughout Santa Barbara County on a monthly basis; and, contractor will use social media and web-based communication to provide education, awareness, and information on the availability of safe needle exchange services.
 - **B.** CONTRACTOR will provide screening, risk reduction counseling, and referrals for treatment of HIV, viral hepatitis and other STD's to a minimum of 150 unique individuals annually. Contractor will distribute condoms to support safer sex and reduce the risk of acquiring and transmitting HIV, viral hepatitis and other STD's. Contractor will provide services county wide via HUV, onsite at SUD treatment provider locations, and via dedicated service dates, times and locations. Contractor will use social media and web-based communication to advertise availability of services.
 - C. SSP will serve as a connection point for access to long-term primary care and behavioral health treatment, by providing referrals to a minimum of 50% of individuals receiving SPP services for primary care programs and programs who provide evidenced-based Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment including Medications for Addiction Treatment (MAT).
 - **D.** CONTRACTOR will provide Opioid Overdose education and risk reduction counseling to PWID and other populations at risk of opioid overdose to a minimum of 100 clients at SUD treatment programs.
 - E. CONTRACTOR will distribute Naloxone to support the prevention of opioid overdose and will provide opioid overdose counseling, education and outreach via HUV to a minimum of 250 persons. Contractor will use social media and web-based communication to advertise the availability of services.
- 4. CLIENTS. CONTRACTOR shall target the following populations: People Who Inject

Drugs (PWID), populations at risk of spreading and/or acquiring HIV, viral hepatitis, Tuberculosis, (TB) or other sexually transmitted diseases (STD's), clients of SUD treatment programs, and persons at risk of Opioid Overdose.

5. REPORTS

- A. SSP Services CONTRACTOR shall collect and submit data on a quarterly basis to include but not be limited to the following:
 - 1. Number of Sterile Syringes distributed;
 - 2. Estimated Number of Used Syringes returned for safe disposal;
 - 3. Number of unique persons served;
 - 4. Number of participants receiving SSP services;
 - 5. Number of persons referred for SUD treatment;
 - 6. Number of persons referred for MAT treatment;
 - 7. Number of persons served onsite at the SUD treatment program;
 - 8. Number of persons referred to primary care;
 - 9. Number of persons referred to mental health;
 - 10. Number of persons referred for HIV testing;
 - 11. Number of persons who received HIV risk reduction counseling;
 - 12. Number of persons referred for viral hepatitis testing;
 - 13. Number of persons who received viral hepatitis risk reduction counseling;
 - 14. Number of referrals to HIV and/or viral hepatitis treatment;
 - 15. Number of persons provided Narcan;
 - 16. Number of known overdose reversals;
 - 17. Number of persons who received Naloxone/Narcan training and education.

6. STAFFING REQUIREMENTS.

- **A.** CONTRACTOR will employ direct service staff who:
 - 1. Are bilingual in County's threshold language, Spanish;
 - 2. Have competency with PWID populations; and
 - 3. Are trained, competent and proficient in delivering Syringe Services Program (SSP) services.
- **B.** CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all direct service staff complete required training per Santa Barbara County Behavioral Wellness Policy 5.008 Mandatory Trainings.
- VI. Delete <u>Section II. Maximum Contract Amount</u> of <u>Exhibit B, Financial Provisions ADP</u> and replace with the following:

II. MAXIMUM CONTRACT AMOUNT.

The Maximum Contract Amount of this Agreement shall not exceed \$280,442, inclusive of \$88,000 for fiscal year 2023–2024, \$68,484 for FY 2024-2025, \$61,979 for FY 2025-2026, and \$61,979 for FY 2026-2027, and shall consist of COUNTY, State, and/or Federal funds as shown in Exhibit B-1-ADP. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event shall COUNTY pay CONTRACTOR more than this Maximum Contract Amount for CONTRACTOR's performance hereunder without a properly executed amendment.
