Permanently reduce Sheriff's Department funding to support a long term average jail population of approximately 550.

Reduce general funding for our Sheriff's Department by up to \$26.7 million and 165 FTEs to bring our Sheriff Department budget in line with comparable counties.

Reduce Sheriff's Department funding for traditional policing that doesn't reduce recidivism. Rethink plans for \$28M to refurbish the South County Jail. Reduce footprint to about 200 jail beds. Repurpose funds to build transitional housing to help stabilize eligible jail residents' re-entry into our community. Build a separate assessment center to screen and divert those who are appropriate for community-based alternatives.

Fund seed money to study a possible Civilian Oversight Commission to help assure Sheriff Department transparency and accountability, and deter police misconduct.

Board of Supervisors,

I am writing today as a member of the Santa Barbara Eastside community, a mother, and a full time worker for a low income housing community.

Santa Barbara county has long known that incarceration rates disproportionately affect Black and Brown community members, which has only served to further the socio-economic divides within the county, which persist in housing, education, employment, healthcare, and elsewhere. The treatment of the community by the sheriff's office is especially telling, I have met sheriff deputies who have treated myself and the residents of my neighborhood poorly, far worse than any SB Police Department officers.

The county board has long touted their commitment to restoring and uplifting the community, so why exactly, is more than \$255million or 68.3% of the County's current public safety budget invested into the punishment of that community? Supervision, prosecution, and policing and incarceration of community members, all of which create additional trauma and reinforce cycles of poverty, thereby decreasing public safety. The research on this is extensive and clear.

Law Enforcement has not been preventing crime, in fact the Eastside is suffering greatly from gun violence and petty theft, while some residents suffer from drug addiction with absolutely no tangible assistance of counseling and health care, just the threat of incarceration—which is not a solution for assistance and rehabilitation.

All these things point to what we already know are the largest influences on "crime": Poverty and Trauma. Never in my five plus years of residency and work in this neighborhood, has law enforcement, or anyone from the county actually done anything to help.

I urge the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors to make the following changes for the 2021-2022 fiscal year:

1. Reduce Sheriff's Office funding by a *minimum* of \$26.7million and 165 FTE's this year. The Jail population has been consistently declining, and investment in the community is desperately needed. Our sheriff's office receives approximately 26.7 million dollars more than any other comparable county,

Invest the \$26.7million in:

1. Community-based organizations and initiatives led by folks who have similar identities and life experiences to those who are most impacted by the criminal legal system in order to utilize alternatives to incarceration, true community-based diversion programs that are not affiliated with law enforcement or criminal legal institutions, and more practical and effective transitional services for individuals in custody. Examples of appropriate community-based allocations include funding for:

- Healing Justice Santa Barbara's partnership with the Healing Center at UCSB's Hosford Clinic which provides Black community members with free culturally competent and trauma informed professional mental health services.
