Irrigation Operations

Irrigation Disposal

- LCSD disposes of treated effluent by irrigation
- Water is distributed to off-site users as well as on-site (district owned pasture)
- Irrigated pasture on 263 acres



Pasture Operations

- Effluent originally used by sugar beet farmers
- LCSD acquired pasture in 1988 when Holly Sugar Factory closed
- Effluent redirected to pasture
- Operation involves labor to rotate irrigation piping, repairs, maintenance, etc.
- Pasture leased to cattle rancher (revenue = \$63,120/year based on \$20/acre)

Labor Contract

- Due to expense, these services have been hired out to labor contractors
- Labor force moves pipe daily (except Sunday) to the next row to be irrigated
- LCSD owns pipe, contractor provides labor, vehicle, and safety equipment
- Cost prohibitive to solid set (permanent) irrigation pipe (\$800,000) and still requires 1.5 FTE labor

Current Practice

- Current operation irrigates 3 fields.
 Reduced from 6 fields when supply to SM Airport in September 2005
- Generally have 1 worker per field
- Labor force consists of 1 lead worker and additional field workers as needed
- Existing 6 year contract expires December 31, 2007

- Based on 1 lead worker and 2 field workers at 6, 10 hours days per week
- Bid by the County Purchasing Division
- Also proposal mailed to 9 local labor contractors (8 in Santa Maria, 1 in Arroyo Grande

- No requirement to bid these services since not a "district project"
- For pricing purposes, services are bid per Purchasing Division practices
- Proposals mailed to local vendors September 12
- Advertised on internet
- Three responsive bids submitted
- Bids opened October 4
- Contract review by County Counsel, Auditor/Controller, and Risk Management

Company rate reflects overhead rate for health, liability, auto and worker's compensation insurance, bonding, uniforms, pick up, fuel, federal and state taxes, cell phones, safety equipment, radio, licensing, payroll, and administrative costs.

For comparison, 3 County Maintenance Worker I positions at step A would cost \$235,749 per year
