Recommendations:

Alignment with Board Strategic Plan:

The recommendations are primarily aligned with Goal #7: A County Government that is Accessible, Open, and Citizen-Friendly.

Executive Summary and Discussion:

The Grand Jury Report on detention facilities is mandated each year with findings and recommendations regarding detention facilities within the County per California Penal Code 919 (b). The report contains a total of 2 Findings that affect the County. The Grand Jury Report requires responses from 3 of the County's departments: Probation, Sheriff and the Board of Supervisors.

It is recommended that the Board agree with both of the Findings. Details are outlined in Attachment (1). The recommended board actions are aligned with the Sheriff and Probation departments' responses.

Mandates and Service Levels:

The grand jury report was released on June 1, 2005. In accordance with California Penal Code Section 933(b), the governing body of the agency (Board of Supervisors) must respond within 90 days after issuance of the Grand Jury report. Consequently, the Board of Supervisors' responses must be finalized and transmitted to the Presiding Judge of the Courts no later than Thursday, September 1, 2005. Consideration of the recommended Board response within the administrative agenda on August 9, 2005 will allow the Board additional time, if necessary, to discuss and adopt a response. Section 933c requires that comments to Grand Jury Findings and Recommendations be made in writing.

Fiscal and Facilities Impacts:

There are no fiscal or facilities impacts from the proposed recommendations.

Special Instructions:

The response of the Board of Supervisors must be transmitted to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court no later than Thursday, September 1, 2005. The Clerk of the Board is requested to return the signed letter to Jennie Esquer, County Administrator's Office, for distribution to the Superior Court. The signed letter, written responses and a 3 1/2" computer disc with the response in a Microsoft Word file must be forwarded to the grand jury.

SANTA BARBARA COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT AND DETENTION FACILITIES

INTRODUCTION

The following report highlights the inspections made by the 2004-2005 Grand Jury of the police departments, Sheriff's Stations and detention facilities within Santa Barbara County. Under California Penal Code 919(b), the Jury is mandated to inquire into the conditions and management of all detention facilities.

These facilities are grouped into four areas of operation: Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Department Custody Facilities, Municipal Police Departments, Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Stations, as well as the County Probation Department Facilities. (Federal facilities are not included in this report.)

METHOD OF INQUIRY

The Grand Jury visited each of the facilities listed in this report in the fall of 2004 and the new Santa Maria Juvenile Hall in early 2005. Deputies, police officials and staff on site at the time of the visits were interviewed and each facility was inspected by two or more members of the Jury. All Jury observations are as of the time of our visits.

Santa Barbara County has four cities that contract law enforcement services with the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Department: Carpinteria, Goleta, Buellton and Solvang. Contract cities choose to pay for Sheriff's Department Deputies to enforce the law within their city limits in lieu of establishing their own police departments. These departments will be covered under the Sheriff's Department Stations section below. Of the four, Carpinteria is the only one to formerly have had a police department; the other three have always contracted with the County for protection. Contracting with the County saves the city money and ensures the city the expertise from a large and experienced department, especially in the case of a major crime.
