






#### **New COVID-19 Case Count by Month**






#### **Number of SARS-CoV-2 Tests Conducted Per Month**






#### Percent of SARS-CoV-2 Test Results Per Month




#### Cumulative Community COVID-19 Case Count on a Biweekly Basis






# Comparison of COVID-19 Cases, Hospitalizations, Deaths to SBC Population by Age






#### COVID-19 Cases by 10 Year Age Group





# Comparison of COVID-19 Cases, Hospitalizations, Deaths to SBC Population by Gender








## Comparison of COVID-19 Cases, Hospitalizations, Deaths to SBC Population by Race/Ethnicity


Santa Barbara County Population by Race/Ethnicity (N=460,444)


COVID-19 Cases by Race/Ethnicity, as of 9/30/20 (N=8,199)




















#### **COVID-19 Cases by Occupation Type**





#### COVID-19 case count per capita by region






# Transmission, Symptomology, and Length of Hospitalization




#### **Transmission Status of COVID-19 cases**






#### Symptomology of COVID-19 Cases





#### Hospitalization of COVID-19 Cases Length of Stay per Visit



# Conclusions and Recommendations



#### Conclusions

- 1. From March through September: 8,199 cases of COVID-19 reported in SBC
- 2. SBC saw a wave of cases in the summer
  - Number of cases and testing positivity peaked in July
  - May be associated with the reopening of sectors and summer holidays
- 3. Majority of cases was working adults (18-29 and 30-49 years old)
- 4. Hispanic/Latinos have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 in Santa Barbara County



#### Conclusions

- 5. Most common occupation of COVID-19 cases is farmworking/agriculture
- 6. Frontline staff (healthcare, laborers/unskilled, and restaurant/bar or food preparation workers) also represent a large number of cases.
- 7. North County unincorporated areas and City of Santa Maria have the highest rates of disease, surpass the County average case rate.
- 8. Of cases with known transmission status, the majority were close-contact.



#### Recommendations

- 1. Partner with employment sectors and a post-secondary schools to mitigate the spread of disease among 20-year olds
- 2. Increase prevention messaging to 20-year olds
- 3. Monitor health needs and risks among senior population
- 4. Partner with employment sectors to slow spread of infection among front-line (agricultural, laborers, unskilled, restaurant, bar, and food prep) workers.
  - Support staff who need to quarantine or isolate
  - Reinforce social distancing and masking in these job sectors



#### Recommendations

- 5. Limit gatherings
- 6. Partner with CDPH for additional prevention strategies to mitigate sustained and/or repeated outbreaks in congregate settings
- 7. Continue outreach and prevention efforts in regions with the highest case rates
- 8. Monitor cases among youth and young adults as school resumes
- 9. Monitor mental health needs and promote community mental health resources







#### Santa Barbara County 7-day Average Adjusted\* Case Rate per 100,000 Community Residents


