c) Determine that the above actions are government fiscal activities or funding mechanisms that do not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment and are therefore not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15378(b)(4) of the CEQA Guidelines.

- a) Approve, ratify and authorize the Chair to execute an Agreement for Services of Independent Contractor with **Good Samaritan Shelter** (a local vendor) to provide interim housing and support services for clients occupying units at the La Posada interim housing and support services location at 4500 Hollister Avenue, Santa Barbara, California (2nd District), for a total maximum contract amount of **\$4,080,440**, inclusive of \$94,640 for FY 23-24, \$1,328,600 for FY 24-25, \$1,328,600 for FY 25-26, and \$1,328,600 for FY 26-27, for the period from June 5, 2024 through June 30, 2027;
- b) Delegate to the Director of the Department of Behavioral Wellness or designee the authority to (i) suspend, delay, or interrupt the services under the Agreement for convenience per Section 20 of the Agreement, (ii) make immaterial changes to the Agreement per Section 26, (iii) amend staffing requirements per Exhibit A-1, (iv) reallocate funds between funding sources per Exhibit B-1, and (v) amend the program goals, outcomes, and measures per Exhibit E, all without altering the maximum contract Amount and without requiring the Board’s approval of an amendment of the Agreement, subject to the Board’s ability to rescind this delegated authority at any time; and
- c) Determine that the above actions are government fiscal activities or funding mechanisms that do not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant

physical impact on the environment and are therefore not a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to section 15378(b)(4) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Summary Text:

This item is on the agenda to request authorization for an Agreement with Good Samaritan Shelter (Good Samaritan), whereby Good Samaritan shall provide interim housing, support services, and program oversight and wraparound services for clients who are occupying temporary residential units at La Posada located at 4500 Hollister Avenue, Santa Barbara, California. The Department of Behavioral Wellness (BWell) will be utilizing Behavioral Health Bridge Housing grant funding to support 40 of the 80 units available for clients who meet program eligibility requirements. The term of the Agreement will begin on June 5, 2024 and shall continue until June 30, 2027, unless otherwise terminated in accordance with the provisions of the Agreement.

Background:

La Posada is a public-private collaboration between Dignity Moves, the County of Santa Barbara, and Good Samaritan Shelter, who will provide program oversight and wraparound services. Utilizing Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) grant funding, 40 of the 80 La Posada temporary residential units are reserved for BWell clients who are experiencing homelessness, with priority given to CARE (Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment) Program and other justice-involved participants. In alignment with BHBH program requirements and goals, referral sources include BWell programs, the courts, County law enforcement, and community-based organizations, and applicants will be screened for eligibility by the BWell Homeless Outreach Team Supervisor and the BHBH Program Manager. If referrals do not meet BHBH program eligibility, the Homeless Outreach Team Supervisor will connect clients with other emergency and interim housing opportunities.

Operations and services for the remaining 40 units not reserved for BWell clients will be funded by the County's allocation of Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Round 4 funds as well as BHBH funding. The HHAP Round 4 funding is administered by the Community Services Department and funds a separate agreement with Good Samaritan for operations and services at La Posada, which was approved by the Board on April 2, 2024.

La Posada Program Eligibility Criteria

Individuals must meet the following criteria:

- a) Qualifying clients will include individuals with a diagnosed mental illness and/or substance use disorders, or who are a CARE Program participant, and who are homeless (based on the following criteria):
 - i) An individual who lacks adequate nighttime residence;
 - ii) An individual with a primary residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used for habitation;
 - iii) An individual living in a shelter; or
 - iv) An individual exiting an institution (including incarceration) into homelessness. If exiting an institution, individuals are considered "homeless" if they were experiencing homelessness immediately prior to entering that institution, regardless of length of stay.

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Good Samaritan will provide approximately 50 BWell La Posada residents per Fiscal Year with behavioral health services on-site, including but not limited to (a) intensive case management for each client, (b) monitoring clients for physical health, dental, and vision issues, (c) assisting clients with personal hygiene, (d) assisting clients with access to community support and resources, including housing and employment services, (e) providing an evening meal, breakfast, shower, laundry, mail, and locker service included in each night's stay, for as long as the client is a resident at the Program, and (f) coordinating with the BWell Housing Assistance & Retention Team to begin the pre-application process for permanent supportive housing. The program shall accommodate each client for a length of stay for up to one year or until the client finds permanent supportive housing.

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) developed the BHBH Program to support bridge housing settings to address the immediate and sustainable housing needs of people experiencing homelessness who have serious behavioral health conditions, including a serious and persistent mental illness and/or substance use disorder.

Performance Measure:

Performance shall also be assessed in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit E of the Agreement (Program Goals, Outcomes and Measures). In addition, Contractor shall:

- a) Submit quarterly, yearly and final reports including, but not limited to, program success and challenges, number of clients served, linkages to primary and behavioral health care services, social service benefits obtained, service encounters, outreach efforts, and care coordination.
- b) Deliver site specific wraparound services to clients, including preparing clients for independent living and linkages to permanent supportive housing and tracking reasons for discharge.
- c) Coordinating intake and discharges with BWell staff, including the client's case manager.
- d) Participate in regular coordination meetings with BWell staff including Homeless Outreach, Crisis Services, and the BHBH Program Manager.

**AGREEMENT
FOR SERVICES OF INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR**

THIS AGREEMENT is made by and between the County of Santa Barbara, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereafter “County” or “Department”) and **Good Samaritan Shelter**, a California non-profit, with an address at P.O. Box 5908, Santa Maria, California 93457 (hereafter Contractor) wherein Contractor agrees to provide and County agrees to accept the services specified herein (hereafter Agreement).

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that it is specially trained, skilled, experienced, and competent to perform the special services required by County and County desires to retain the services of Contractor pursuant to the terms, covenants, and conditions herein set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE.

Director at phone number 805-681-5220 is the representative of County and will administer this Agreement for and on behalf of County. Sylvia Barnard at phone number 805-346-8185 is the authorized representative for Contractor. Changes in designated representatives shall be made only after advance written notice to the other party.

2. NOTICES.

Any notice or consent required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be given to the respective parties in writing, by personal delivery or facsimile, or with postage prepaid by first class mail, registered or certified mail, or express courier service, as follows:

or at such other address or to such other person that the parties may from time to time designate in accordance with this Notices section. If sent by first class mail, notices and consents under this section shall be deemed to be received five (5) days following their deposit in the U.S. mail. This

Notices section shall not be construed as meaning that either party agrees to service of process except as required by applicable law.

3. SCOPE OF SERVICES.

Contractor agrees to provide services to County in accordance with EXHIBITS A(s), E and F attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

4. TERM.

Contractor shall commence performance on June 5, 2024 and end performance upon completion, but no later than June 30, 2027 unless otherwise directed by County or unless earlier terminated.

5. COMPENSATION OF CONTRACTOR.

In full consideration for Contractor's services, Contractor shall be paid for performance under this Agreement in accordance with the terms of EXHIBIT B(s) attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

6. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

It is mutually understood and agreed that Contractor (including any and all of its officers, agents, and employees), shall perform all of its services under this Agreement as an independent Contractor as to County and not as an officer, agent, servant, employee, joint venturer, partner, or associate of County. Furthermore, County shall have no right to control, supervise, or direct the manner or method by which Contractor shall perform its work and function. However, County shall retain the right to administer this Agreement so as to verify that Contractor is performing its obligations in accordance with the terms and conditions hereof. Contractor understands and acknowledges that it shall not be entitled to any of the benefits of a County employee, including but not limited to vacation, sick leave, administrative leave, health insurance, disability insurance, retirement, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation and protection of tenure. Contractor shall be solely liable and responsible for providing to, or on behalf of, its employees all legally-required employee benefits. In addition, Contractor shall be solely responsible and save County harmless from all matters relating to payment of Contractor's employees, including compliance with Social Security withholding and all other regulations governing such matters. It is acknowledged that during the term of this Agreement, Contractor may be providing services to others unrelated to the County or to this Agreement.

7. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE.

Contractor represents that it has the skills, expertise, required clinical supervision, and licenses/permits necessary to perform the services required under this Agreement. Accordingly, Contractor shall perform all such services in the manner and according to the standards observed by a competent practitioner of the same profession in which Contractor is engaged. All products of whatsoever nature, which Contractor delivers to County pursuant to this Agreement, shall be prepared in a first class and workmanlike manner and shall conform to the standards of quality normally observed by a person practicing in Contractor's profession. Contractor shall correct or revise any errors or omissions, at County's request without additional compensation. Permits and/or licenses shall be obtained and maintained by Contractor without additional compensation.

8. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION.

Contractor certifies to County that it and its employees and principals are not debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for, participation in federal, state, or county government contracts, including but not limited to exclusion from participation from federal health care programs under Sections 1128 or 1128A of the Social Security Act. Contractor certifies that it shall not contract with a subcontractor that is so debarred, suspended, excluded, or ineligible.

9. TAXES.

Contractor shall pay all taxes, levies, duties, and assessments of every nature due in connection with any work under this Agreement and shall make any and all payroll deductions required by law. County shall not be responsible for paying any taxes on Contractor's behalf, and should County be required to do so by state, federal, or local taxing agencies, Contractor agrees to promptly reimburse County for the full value of such paid taxes plus interest and penalty, if any. These taxes shall include, but not be limited to, the following: FICA (Social Security), unemployment insurance contributions, income tax, disability insurance, and workers' compensation insurance.

10. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

Contractor covenants that Contractor presently has no employment or interest and shall not acquire any employment or interest, direct or indirect, including any interest in any business, property, or source of income, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required to be performed under this Agreement. Contractor further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall be employed by Contractor. Contractor must promptly disclose to the County, in writing, any potential conflict of interest. County retains the right to waive a conflict of interest disclosed by Contractor if County determines it to be immaterial, and such waiver is only effective if provided by County to Contractor in writing. Contractor acknowledges that state laws on conflict of interest apply to this Agreement including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act of 1974 (Gov. Code, § 81000 et seq.), Public Contract Code Section 10365.5, and Government Code Section 1090.

11. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS AND INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY.

County shall be the owner of the following items incidental to this Agreement upon production, whether or not completed: all data collected, all documents of any type whatsoever, all photos, designs, sound or audiovisual recordings, software code, inventions, technologies, and other materials, and any material necessary for the practical use of such items, from the time of collection and/or production whether or not performance under this Agreement is completed or terminated prior to completion. Contractor shall not release any of such items to other parties except after prior written approval of County. Contractor shall be the legal owner and Custodian of Records for all County client files generated pursuant to this Agreement, and shall comply with all Federal and State confidentiality laws, including Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) §5328; 42 United States Code (U.S.C.) § 290dd-2; and 45 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.), Parts 160 – 164 setting forth the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA). Contractor shall inform all of its officers, employees, and agents of the confidentiality provision of said laws. Contractor further agrees to provide County with copies of all County client file documents resulting from this Agreement without requiring any further written release of information. Within Privacy limitations, County shall have the unrestricted authority to publish, disclose, distribute,

and/or otherwise use in whole or in part, any reports, data, documents or other materials prepared under this Agreement.

Unless otherwise specified in Exhibit A(s), Contractor hereby assigns to County all copyright, patent, and other intellectual property and proprietary rights to all data, documents, reports, photos, designs, sound or audiovisual recordings, software code, inventions, technologies, and other materials prepared or provided by Contractor pursuant to this Agreement (collectively referred to as "Copyrightable Works and Inventions"). County shall have the unrestricted authority to copy, adapt, perform, display, publish, disclose, distribute, create derivative works from, and otherwise use in whole or in part, any Copyrightable Works and Inventions. Contractor agrees to take such actions and execute and deliver such documents as may be needed to validate, protect and confirm the rights and assignments provided hereunder. Contractor warrants that any Copyrightable Works and Inventions and other items provided under this Agreement will not infringe upon any intellectual property or proprietary rights of any third party. Contractor at its own expense shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless County against any claim that any Copyrightable Works or Inventions or other items provided by Contractor hereunder infringe upon intellectual or other proprietary rights of a third party, and Contractor shall pay any damages, costs, settlement amounts, and fees (including attorneys' fees) that may be incurred by County in connection with any such claims. This Ownership of Documents and Intellectual Property provision shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement.

12. NO PUBLICITY OR ENDORSEMENT.

Contractor shall not use County's name or logo or any variation of such name or logo in any publicity, advertising or promotional materials. Contractor shall not use County's name or logo in any manner that would give the appearance that the County is endorsing Contractor. Contractor shall not in any way contract on behalf of or in the name of County. Contractor shall not release any informational pamphlets, notices, press releases, research reports, or similar public notices concerning the County or its projects, without obtaining the prior written approval of County.

13. COUNTY PROPERTY AND INFORMATION.

All of County's property, documents, and information provided for Contractor's use in connection with the services shall remain County's property, and Contractor shall return any such items whenever requested by County and whenever required according to the Termination section of this Agreement. Contractor may use such items only in connection with providing the services. Contractor shall not disseminate any County property, documents, or information without County's prior written consent.

14. RECORDS, AUDIT, AND REVIEW.

- A. Contractor shall make available for inspection, copying, evaluation, or audit, all of its premises; physical facilities, or such parts thereof as may be engaged in the performance of the Agreement; equipment; books; records, including but not limited to beneficiary records; prescription files; documents, working papers, reports, or other evidence; contracts; financial records and documents of account, computers; and other electronic devices, pertaining to any aspect of services and activities performed, or determination of amounts payable, under this Agreement (hereinafter referred to as "Records"), at any time by County, Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), Department of General Services,

Bureau of State Audits, Health and Human Services (HHS), Inspector General, U.S. Comptroller General, or other authorized federal or state agencies, or their designees (“Authorized Representative”) (hereinafter referred to as “Audit”).

- B.** Any such Audit shall occur at the Contractor’s place of business, premises, or physical facilities during normal business hours, and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such Records. Contractor shall maintain Records in accordance with the general standards applicable to such book or record keeping and shall follow accounting practices and procedures sufficient to evaluate the quality and quantity of services, accessibility and appropriateness of services, to ensure fiscal accountability, and to properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of whatever nature claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Agreement, including any matching costs and expenses. All records must be capable of verification by qualified auditors.
- C.** This Audit right will exist for 10 years from: the close of the State fiscal year in which the Agreement was in effect or if any litigation, claim, negotiation, Audit, or other action involving the Records has been started before the expiration of the 10-year period, the Records shall be retained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues which arise from it, or until the end of the regular 10-year period, whichever is later.
- D.** Contractor shall retain all records and documents originated or prepared pursuant to Contractor's or subcontractor's performance under this Agreement, including beneficiary grievance and appeal records identified in 42 C.F.R. § 438.416 and the data, information and documentation specified in 42 Code of Federal Regulations Sections 438.604, 438.606, 438.608, and 438.610 for the 10-year period as determined in Section 14.C (Records, Audit, and Review).
- E.** If this Agreement is completely or partially terminated, the Records, relating to the work terminated shall be preserved and made available for the 10-year period as determined in Section 14.C (Records, Audit, and Review).
- F.** Contractor shall ensure that each of its sites keep a record of the beneficiaries being treated at each site. Contractor shall keep and maintain records for each service rendered, to whom it was rendered, and the date of service, pursuant to Welfare & Institutions Code Section 14124.1 and 42 C.F.R. Sections 438.3(h) and 438.3(u). Contractor shall retain such records for the 10-year period as determined in Section 14.C (Records, Audit, and Review).
- G.** Contractor may, at its discretion, following receipt of final payment under this Agreement, reduce its accounts, books and records related to this Agreement to microfilm, computer disk, CD ROM, DVD, or other data storage medium. Upon request by an Authorized Representative to inspect, audit or obtain copies of said records, the Contractor must supply or make available applicable devices, hardware, and/or software necessary to view, copy and/or print said records. Applicable devices may include, but are not limited to, microfilm readers and microfilm printers, etc.
- H.** The Authorized Representatives may Audit Contractor at any time if there is a reasonable possibility of fraud or similar risk.

- I. Contractor agrees to include a similar right of Authorized Representatives to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement.
- J. If federal, state or County audit exceptions are made relating to this Agreement, Contractor shall reimburse all costs incurred by federal, state, and/or County governments associated with defending against the audit exceptions or performing any audits or follow-up audits, including but not limited to: audit fees, court costs, attorneys' fees based upon a reasonable hourly amount for attorneys in the community, travel costs, penalty assessments and all other costs of whatever nature. Immediately upon notification from County, Contractor shall reimburse the amount of the audit exceptions and any other related costs directly to County as specified by County in the notification. The provisions of the Records, Audit, and Review section shall survive any expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- K. Contractor shall also comply with the Audit and Record Retention provisions set forth in EXHIBIT B and F to this Agreement.

15. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE.

Contractor agrees to the indemnification and insurance provisions as set forth in EXHIBIT C – Standard Indemnification and Insurance Provisions attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

16. NONDISCRIMINATION.

County hereby notifies Contractor that County's Unlawful Discrimination Ordinance (Article XIII of Chapter 2 of the Santa Barbara County Code) applies to this Agreement and is incorporated herein by this reference with the same force and effect as if the ordinance were specifically set out herein and Contractor agrees to comply with said ordinance. Contractor shall also comply with the nondiscrimination provisions set forth in EXHIBIT A-1 Statement of Work to this Agreement.

17. NONEXCLUSIVE AGREEMENT.

Contractor understands that this is not an exclusive Agreement and that County shall have the right to negotiate with and enter into contracts with others providing the same or similar services as those provided by Contractor as the County desires.

18. NON-ASSIGNMENT.

Contractor shall not assign, transfer or subcontract this Agreement or any of its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of County and any attempt to so assign, subcontract or transfer without such consent shall be void and without legal effect and shall constitute grounds for termination.

19. TERMINATION.

- A. **By County.** County may, by written notice to Contractor, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part at any time, whether for County's convenience, for nonappropriation of funds, or because of the failure of Contractor to fulfill the obligations herein.
 - 1. **For Convenience.** County may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part upon thirty (30) days written notice. During the thirty (30) day period, Contractor shall,

as directed by County, wind down and cease its services as quickly and efficiently as reasonably possible, without performing unnecessary services or activities and by minimizing negative effects on County from such winding down and cessation of services.

2. For Nonappropriation of Funds.

- i. The parties acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is dependent upon the availability of County, State, and/or federal funding. If funding to make payments in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement is not forthcoming from the County, State and/or federal governments for the Agreement, or is not allocated or allotted to County by the County, State and/or federal governments for this Agreement for periodic payment in the current or any future fiscal period, then the obligations of County to make payments after the effective date of such non-allocation or non-funding, as provided in the notice, will cease and terminate.
- ii. As permitted by applicable State and Federal laws regarding funding sources, if funding to make payments in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement is delayed or is reduced from the County, State, and/or federal governments for the Agreement, or is not allocated or allotted in full to County by the County, State, and/or federal governments for this Agreement for periodic payment in the current or any future fiscal period, then the obligations of County to make payments will be delayed or be reduced accordingly or County shall have the right to terminate the Agreement. If such funding is reduced, County in its sole discretion shall determine which aspects of the Agreement shall proceed and which Services shall be performed. In these situations, County will pay Contractor for Services and Deliverables and certain of its costs. Any obligation to pay by County will not extend beyond the end of County's then-current funding period.
- iii. Contractor expressly agrees that no penalty or damages shall be applied to, or shall accrue to, County in the event that the necessary funding to pay under the terms of this Agreement is not available, not allocated, not allotted, delayed or reduced.

- 3. For Cause.** Should Contractor default in the performance of this Agreement or materially breach any of its provisions, County may, at County's sole option, terminate or suspend this Agreement in whole or in part by written notice. Upon receipt of notice, Contractor shall immediately discontinue all services affected (unless the notice directs otherwise) and notify County as to the status of its performance. The date of termination shall be the date the notice is received by Contractor, unless the notice directs otherwise.

- B. By Contractor.** Should County fail to pay Contractor all or any part of the payment set forth in EXHIBIT B(s), Contractor may, at Contractor's option terminate this Agreement if such failure is not remedied by County within thirty (30) days of written notice to County of such late payment.

C. **Upon Termination.** Contractor shall deliver to County all data, estimates, graphs, summaries, reports, and all other property, records, documents or papers as may have been accumulated or produced by Contractor in performing this Agreement, whether completed or in process, except such items as County may, by written permission, permit Contractor to retain. Notwithstanding any other payment provision of this Agreement, County shall pay Contractor for satisfactory services performed to the date of termination to include a prorated amount of compensation due hereunder less payments, if any, previously made. In no event shall Contractor be paid an amount in excess of the full price under this Agreement nor for profit on unperformed portions of service. Contractor shall furnish to County such financial information as in the judgment of County is necessary to determine the reasonable value of the services rendered by Contractor. In the event of a dispute as to the reasonable value of the services rendered by Contractor, the decision of County shall be final. The foregoing is cumulative and shall not affect any right or remedy which County may have in law or equity.

20. SUSPENSION FOR CONVENIENCE.

The Director of the Department of Behavioral Wellness or designee may, without cause, order Contractor in writing to suspend, delay, or interrupt the services under this Agreement in whole or in part for up to 120 days. County shall incur no liability for suspension under this provision and suspension shall not constitute a breach of this Agreement.

21. SECTION HEADINGS.

The headings of the several sections, and any Table of Contents appended hereto, shall be solely for convenience of reference and shall not affect the meaning, construction or effect hereof.

22. SEVERABILITY.

If any one or more of the provisions contained herein shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, then such provision or provisions shall be deemed severable from the remaining provisions hereof, and such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision hereof, and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

23. REMEDIES NOT EXCLUSIVE.

No remedy herein conferred upon or reserved to County is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy or remedies, and each and every such remedy, to the extent permitted by law, shall be cumulative and in addition to any other remedy given hereunder or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity or otherwise.

24. TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE.

Time is of the essence in this Agreement and each covenant and term is a condition herein.

25. NO WAIVER OF DEFAULT.

No delay or omission of County to exercise any right or power arising upon the occurrence of any event of default shall impair any such right or power or shall be construed to be a waiver of any such default or an acquiescence therein; and every power and remedy given by this Agreement to County shall be exercised from time to time and as often as may be deemed expedient in the sole discretion of County.

26. ENTIRE AGREEMENT AND AMENDMENT.

In conjunction with the matters considered herein, this Agreement contains the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and there have been no promises, representations, agreements, warranties or undertakings by any of the parties, either oral or written, of any character or nature hereafter binding except as set forth herein. This Agreement may be altered, amended or modified only by an instrument in writing, executed by the parties to this Agreement and by no other means. Each party waives their future right to claim, contest or assert that this Agreement was modified, canceled, superseded, or changed by any oral agreements, course of conduct, waiver or estoppel. Requests for changes to the terms and conditions of this Agreement after April 1 of the Fiscal Year for which the change would be applicable shall not be considered. All requests for changes shall be in writing. Changes shall be made by an amendment pursuant to this section. Any amendments or modifications that do not materially change the terms of this Agreement (such as changes to the Designated Representative or Contractor's address for purposes of Notice) may be approved by the Director of the Department of Behavioral Wellness or designee. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Santa Barbara must approve all other amendments and modifications.

27. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.

All representations, covenants and warranties set forth in this Agreement, by or on behalf of, or for the benefit of any or all of the parties hereto, shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of such party, its successors and assigns.

28. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW.

Contractor shall, at its sole cost and expense, comply with all County, State and Federal ordinances; statutes; regulations; orders including, but not limited to, executive orders, court orders, and health officer orders; policies; guidance; bulletins; information notices; and letters including, but not limited to, those issued by the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) now in force or which may hereafter be in force with regard to this Agreement. The judgment of any court of competent jurisdiction, or the admission of Contractor in any action or proceeding against Contractor, whether County is a party thereto or not, that Contractor has violated any such ordinance, statute, regulation, order, policy, guidance, bulletin, information notice, and/or letter shall be conclusive of that fact as between Contractor and County.

29. CALIFORNIA LAW AND JURISDICTION.

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any litigation regarding this Agreement or its contents shall be filed in the County of Santa Barbara, if in state court, or in the federal district court nearest to Santa Barbara County, if in federal court.

30. EXECUTION OF COUNTERPARTS.

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts and each of such counterparts shall for all purposes be deemed to be an original; and all such counterparts, or as many of them as the parties shall preserve undestroyed, shall together constitute one and the same instrument.

31. AUTHORITY.

All signatories and parties to this Agreement warrant and represent that they have the power and authority to enter into this Agreement in the names, titles and capacities herein stated and on behalf of any entities, persons, or firms represented or purported to be represented by such entity(ies), person(s), or firm(s) and that all formal requirements necessary or required by any state and/or federal law in order to enter into this Agreement have been fully complied with. Furthermore, by entering into this Agreement, Contractor hereby warrants that it shall not have breached the terms or conditions of any other contract or agreement to which Contractor is obligated, which breach would have a material effect hereon.

32. SURVIVAL.

All provisions of this Agreement which by their nature are intended to survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement shall survive such termination or expiration.

33. PRECEDENCE.

In the event of conflict between the provisions contained in the numbered sections of this Agreement and the provisions contained in the Exhibits, the provisions of the Exhibits shall prevail over those in the numbered sections.

34. COMPLIANCE WITH PRIVACY LAWS.

Contractor shall, at its sole cost and expense, comply with all applicable healthcare privacy and data security authorities including, but not limited to, those authorities specified in EXHIBIT A-1 now in force or which may hereafter be in force and shall develop and maintain comprehensive patient confidentiality policies and procedures, provide annual training of all staff regarding those policies and procedures, and demonstrate reasonable efforts to secure written and/or electronic data.

35. COURT APPEARANCES.

Upon request, Contractor shall cooperate with County in making available necessary witnesses for court hearings and trials, including Contractor's staff that have provided treatment to a client referred by County who is the subject of a court proceeding. County shall issue subpoenas for the required witnesses upon request of Contractor.

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

EXHIBIT A-1

STATEMENT OF WORK:

INTERIM HOUSING AND SUPPORT SERVICES

1. **PROGRAM SUMMARY.** Contractor shall provide interim housing and housing support services at the La Posada Tiny Home Village at 4500 Hollister Avenue, Santa Barbara, California (hereafter the “Program”) as described in Section 3 (Services) below to Department of Behavioral Wellness (Behavioral Wellness or BWell) for referred clients who have severe mental illness or substance use disorder and are homeless or are at risk of homelessness as more fully described in Section 5 (Clients) below.

2. **PROGRAM GOALS.**

The goals of the Program are to:

- A. Provide housing supports services to assist clients with transition from homelessness to independent living and maintaining stable housing with the goal of moving residents to permanent supportive housing; and
- B. Provide onsite case management and other supportive services, including independent living skill building, peer support, housing navigation, sober coaches, transportation and care coordination.

3. **SERVICES.**

A. **Interim Housing Units.** Contractor shall provide daily, reserved tiny home units at the La Posada Tiny Home Village for clients. The number of units the Contractor shall reserve for clients is detailed in *EXHIBIT B-1 MH Schedule of Rates and Contract Maximum*. Contractor shall serve approximately 50 clients per each County Fiscal Year during the term of this Agreement.

B. **Housing Wraparound Support Services.** Contractor shall provide housing wraparound support services to clients occupying tiny home units at the La Posada Tiny Home Village including, but not limited to:

- 1. Intensive case management for each client;
- 2. Monitor clients for physical health, dental, and vision issues;
- 3. Assist clients with personal hygiene;
- 4. Assist clients with access to community supports and resources including housing and employment services;
- 5. Provide an evening meal, breakfast, shower, laundry, mail, and locker service with each night’s stay for as long as the client is a resident at the La Posada Program;
- 6. Coordinate with the Behavioral Wellness Housing Assistance & Retention Team (HART) to begin the pre-application process for permanent supportive housing;

7. Work with clients to support developed goals for encouraging clients to transition to the least restrictive housing appropriate to the client's needs; and

8. Provide weekly case management clinical care coordination.

4. OPERATIONS.

A. **Service Location.** Contractor shall provide housing wraparound support services to clients on-site at the La Posada Program located at 4500 Hollister Avenue, Santa Barbara, California.

5. CLIENTS.

A. Contractor shall provide tiny homes as detailed in *EXHIBIT B-1 Schedule of rates and Contract Maximum - MHS* and the services described in Section 3 herein to individuals who have been screened and referred by Behavioral Wellness.

B. Qualifying clients will include individuals with a diagnosed mental illness and/or substance use disorders, or who are a Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Program participant, who are homeless based on the following criteria:

1. An individual who lacks adequate nighttime residence;

2. An individual with a primary residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used for habitation;

3. An individual living in a shelter; or

4. An individual exiting an institution (including incarceration) into homelessness. If exiting an institution, individuals are considered "homeless" if they were experiencing homelessness immediately prior to entering that institution, regardless of length of stay.

6. LENGTH OF STAY.

A. The Program shall accommodate each client for a length of stay for up to one year with any additional time needed to be negotiated on a case-by-case basis. The suitability of permanent supportive housing and the client's appropriateness for the Program are determined by the Behavioral Wellness Homeless Services Case Manager and the Behavioral Wellness Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) Program Manager. Contractor shall accommodate clients for the length of stay determined by Behavioral Wellness. Any discharges shall be coordinated with BWell.

7. ADMISSION PROCESS.

A. All referrals of County clients will be coordinated through Behavioral Wellness' designated staff to include, but not be limited to, Homeless Services Team Supervisor and the BHBH Program Manager.

B. Behavioral Wellness staff shall notify Contractor of client referrals either by telephone, in person, or by secure email.

C. Contractor shall provide on-site staff to admit clients during normal operating hours. Contractor shall coordinate with the Behavioral Wellness Homeless Services Case

Manager, who shall be available on a regularly scheduled basis, as well as for emergencies. In emergencies, Contractor staff will call or page the County Homeless Outreach Worker on duty. County staff will provide liaison, linkage (when appropriate), assessment/evaluation, and crisis services. After hours' crisis services are to be referred to the County Assessment Team.

- D. In the case of an aggressive, violent, or acutely intoxicated Behavioral Wellness client, or client unable to follow Program rules, the Program staff will notify the Behavioral Wellness Homeless Services Case Manager immediately of the situation and will advise of any action taken to ensure the safety and well-being of the client, other clients, volunteers, and staff.
 - E. In the case of assaultive risk factors, side effects requiring medical attention or observation, behavioral symptoms presenting possible health problems, or any behavioral symptom that may compromise the appropriateness of the placement, the Program staff will notify the Behavioral Wellness Homeless Services Case Manager immediately of the situation and will advise of any action taken to ensure the safety and well-being of the client, other clients, volunteers, and staff.
 - F. Contractor shall immediately notify the Behavioral Wellness Director or designee, regardless of whether the client has a case file (episode) open with the County, should any of the following events occur: death, fire setting, police involvement, media contact, any behavior leading to potential liability, and any behavioral symptom that may compromise the appropriateness of the placement.
8. **STAFFING.** Contractor shall adhere to the Program staffing requirements outlined below. Changes to these requirements do not require a formal amendment to this Agreement but shall be agreed to in writing by the Director of the Department of Behavioral Wellness or designee and shall not alter the Maximum Contract Amount.
- A. Program staff shall consist of:
 - 1. 3.0 Full-time equivalent (“FTE”) Program Staff to assist clients with daily tasks, provide program information, collaborate with site staff, monitor and record client issues, assist in crisis situations, assist with food coordination, and other assigned duties.
 - 2. 0.5 FTE Site Supervisor to provide management and supervision of the La Posada site, including ensuring effective and efficient functioning of the program, maintaining high quality standards of care, and creating a safe and supportive environment for residents and staff.
 - 3. 1.5 FTE Case Managers to conduct assessments, individualized service planning, connection to employment services, health and wellness goals, and addressing all service needs to stabilize clients and assist them with skill building necessary to transition to permanent supportive housing.
 - 4. 1.0 FTE Transporter to provide transportation services for residents to ensure they arrive at scheduled appointments and are able to obtain necessary living supplies, such as medications, groceries, etc.

5. 2.0 FTE Sober Coaches to provide specialized support and guidance to individuals who need support with the challenges or sobriety and help facilitate a smooth transition from homelessness to independent living.
 6. 1.0 FTE Substance Use Case Manager to conduct assessments and care coordination for substance use treatment, provide interventions, referrals and treatment alternatives and assist with stabilization and the transition to independent living.
 7. 0.5 FTE Mental Health Case Manager to conduct assessments, individualized service planning, connection to employment, develop health and wellness goals, and address other needs necessary to transition into interim housing with the goal of moving into permanent supportive housing.
 8. 0.5 FTE Housing Navigator to provide case management, including, but not limited to, assessments and service planning, assisting with obtaining social services benefits, and connecting clients to permanent supportive housing opportunities.
 9. 0.35 FTE Program Director to provide overall management and supervision of the La Posada site, ensuring the program has resources necessary to effectively and efficiently meet client needs, while maintaining high quality standards of care, in a safe and supportive environment for residents and staff.
9. **PERFORMANCE.** Contractor shall adhere to all all applicable provisions of law or contract(s) that are now in force or which may hereafter be in force, including all applicable provisions of the following, all of which are incorporated by this reference:
- A. The County Mental Health Plan (MHP), Contract No. 22-20133 between the County and the State Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), available at <http://countyofsb.org/behavioral-wellness>;
 - B. The Department of Behavioral Wellness Steering Committee Vision and Guiding Principles, available at <https://www.countyofsb.org/274/Behavioral-Wellness>;
 - C. California's Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) and regulations applicable to the MHSA at California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Sections 3100 through 3995; and
 - D. California Code of Regulations Title 9, Division 1.
 - E. To the extent there is a conflict between federal or state law or regulation and a provision in this Agreement, Contractor shall comply with the federal or state law or regulation and the conflicting Agreement provision shall no longer be in effect.
10. **SITE STANDARDS.**
- A. Contractor shall develop and maintain a written disaster plan for the Program site and shall provide annual disaster training to staff that addresses, at a minimum: emergency staffing levels for the continuation of services under the Program, patient safety, facility safety, safety of medication storage and dispensing medication, and protection of client records, as required by this Agreement.
 - B. Behavioral Health Bridge Housing shelter and interim housing sites must meet the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) habitability standards and, when possible and as

applicable, should also meet Continuum of Care (CoC) Housing Quality Standards (HQS).

11. CONFIDENTIALITY.

- A.** Contractor agrees, and Contractor agrees to require its employees, agents, or subcontractors to agree, to maintain the confidentiality of patient records pursuant to: Title 42 United State Code (USC) Section 290 dd-2; Title 42 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 2; Title 42 CFR Section 438.224; 45 CFR Section 96.132(e), 45 CFR Parts 160, 162, and 164; Title 22 California Code of Regulations (CCR) Section 51009; Welfare & Institutions Code (W&IC) Section 14100.2; Health and Safety Code (HSC) Sections 11812 and 11845.5; Civil Code Sections 56 – 56.37, 1798.80 – 1798.82, and 1798.85; Exhibit D(F), Section 14 (Confidentiality of Information) of the MHP (Contract No. 22-20133); Section 5 (Confidentiality of Information) of the County’s BHBH grant agreement with AHP, Subcontract Agreement ID: 20456-CA-BHBH-556-BHBH-SANTA-BARBARA-COUNTY-01, and the Section 34 (Compliance with Privacy Laws) of this Agreement, as applicable. Patient records must comply with all appropriate State and Federal requirements.
- B.** Contractor shall ensure that no list of persons receiving services under this Agreement is published, disclosed, or used for any purpose except for the direct administration of services under this Agreement or other uses authorized by law that are not in conflict with requirements for confidentiality contained in the preceding codes.
- C.** Contractor shall comply with Exhibit F to the MHP (Contract No. 22-20133) to the extent Contractor is provided Personal Health Information (“PHI”), Personal Information (“PI”), or Personally Identifiable Information (PII”) as defined in Exhibit F of the MHP from County to perform functions, services, or activities specified in this Agreement.
- D.** Contractor shall make itself and any subcontractors, employees or agents assisting Contractor in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement, available to County or DHCS at no cost to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative proceedings being commenced against County, DHCS, its directors, officers or employees based upon claimed violations of privacy, involving inactions or actions by Contractor, except where Contractor or its subcontractor, employee or agent is a named adverse party.
- E.** Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement for any reason, Contractor shall return or destroy all PHI, PI and PII accessed in a database maintained by County, received by Contractor from County, or acquired or created by Contractor in connection with performing functions, services, or activities specified in this Agreement on behalf of County that Contractor still maintains in any form, and shall retain no copies of such PHI, PI or PII. If return or destruction is not feasible, Contractor shall notify County of the conditions that make the return or destruction infeasible, and County and Contractor shall determine the terms and conditions under which Contractor may retain the PHI, PI or PII. Contractor shall continue to extend the protections of Exhibit F of the MHP

to such PHI, PI and PII, and shall limit further use of such data to those purposes that make the return or destruction of such data infeasible. This paragraph shall also apply to Department PHI, PI and PII that is in the possession of subcontractors or agents of Contractor.

12. CULTURAL COMPETENCE.

- A. Report on Capacity.** Contractor shall report on its capacity to provide culturally competent services to culturally diverse clients and their families upon request from County, including:
1. The number of Bilingual and Bicultural staff (as part of the quarterly staffing report), and the number of culturally diverse clients receiving Program services; and
 2. Efforts aimed at providing culturally competent services such as trainings provided to staff, changes or adaptations to service protocol, community education/outreach, etc.
- B. Communicate in Preferred Language.** At all times, the Contractor's Program(s) shall be staffed with personnel who can communicate in the client preferred language, or Contractor shall provide interpretation services, including American Sign Language (ASL).
- C. Bilingual Staff for Direct Service Positions.** Contractor will strive to fill direct service positions with bilingual staff in County's threshold language (Spanish) that is reflective of the specific needs of each region. Contractor percentage goals are calculated based on U.S. Census language data by region: Santa Barbara service area (including Goleta and Carpinteria) – 30%; Santa Maria service area (including Orcutt and Guadalupe) – 48%; Lompoc service area (including Buellton and Solvang) – 33%.
- D. Cultural Considerations When Providing Services.** Contractor shall provide services that consider the culture of mental illness, as well as the ethnic and cultural diversity of clients and families served. Any materials provided to the public must also be printed in Spanish (threshold language).
- E. Services and Programs in Spanish.** Services and programs offered in English must also be made available in Spanish, if clients identify Spanish as their preferred language, as specified in subsection B above.
- F. Measurable Outreach.** As applicable, a measurable and documented effort must be made to conduct outreach to and to serve the underserved and the non-served communities of Santa Barbara County.

- G. Proficiency Testing.** Contractor shall establish a process by which Spanish speaking staff who provide direct services in Spanish or interpretive services are tested for proficiency in speaking, reading, and writing Spanish language.

13. NOTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.

- A.** Contractor shall immediately notify Behavioral Wellness Quality Care Management (QCM) Division at 805-681-4777 or by email at BWELLQCM@sbcbswell.org in the event of:
1. Known serious complaints against licensed/certified staff;
 2. Restrictions in practice or license/certification as stipulated by a State agency;
 3. Other action instituted which affects staff's license/certification or practice (for example, sexual harassment accusations); or
 4. Any event triggering Incident Reporting, as defined in *Behavioral Wellness Policy and Procedure #4.004, Unusual Occurrence Incident Reporting*.
- B.** Contractor shall immediately contact the Department of Behavioral Wellness Compliance Hotline (805-884-6855) should any of the following occur:
1. Suspected or actual misappropriation of funds under Contractor's control
 2. Legal suits initiated specific to the Contractor's practice;
 3. Initiation of criminal investigation of the Contractor; or
 4. Breach of Privacy Laws.
- C.** For clients receiving direct services from both Behavioral Wellness and Contractor staff, Contractor shall immediately notify the client's Behavioral Wellness Case Manager or other Behavioral Wellness staff involved in the client's care, or the applicable Regional Manager should any of the following occur:
1. Side effects requiring medical attention or observation;
 2. Behavioral symptoms presenting possible health problems; or
 3. Any behavioral symptom that may compromise the appropriateness of the placement.
- D.** Contractor may contact bwellcontractsstaff@sbcbswell.org for any contractual concerns or issues.
- E.** "Immediately" means as soon as possible but in no event more than twenty-four (24) hours after the triggering event. Contractor shall train all personnel in the use of the Department of Behavioral Wellness Compliance Hotline (Phone number: 805-884-6855).

14. REPORTS.

- A. Statistical Reports.** Contractor shall maintain records and make statistical reports monthly or as required by County Advocates for Human Potential (AHP), and the State Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) or applicable agency, on forms provided by either agency to include but not limited to the following information:
1. Number of beds used daily;
 2. Demographics of clients;
 3. Client Referral Source;
 4. Client census, including date of entry, exit, and reason for program exit; and
 5. Length of stay.
- B. Annual Mandatory Training Report.** Contractor shall submit evidence of completion of the Mandatory Trainings identified in the Section regarding Training Requirements on an annual basis to the County Systems Training Coordinator. Training materials, competency tests, and sign-in sheets shall be submitted for each training no later than June 15th of each year unless requested earlier by County.
- C. Additional Reports.**
1. Contractor shall maintain records and make statistical reports as required by County and AHP (grant administrator), DHCS or other government agency, on forms provided by or acceptable to the requesting agency.
 2. In addition to reports required under this Agreement, upon County's request, Contractor shall make additional reports as required by County concerning Contractor's activities as they affect the services hereunder. County will be specific as to the nature of information requested and allow thirty (30) days for Contractor to respond.

15. COLLABORATIVE MEETINGS.

Behavioral Wellness shall conduct a Collaborative Meeting at least annually, and more frequently, if needed, with Contractor to collaboratively discuss programmatic, fiscal, and contract matters.

16. TRAINING REQUIREMENTS.

- A.** Contractor shall ensure that all staff completes mandatory trainings including through attendance at County-sponsored training sessions as available. The following trainings must be completed at hire and annually thereafter;
1. Behavioral Wellness Code of Conduct;
 2. Consumer and Family Culture;
 3. Cultural Competency; and
 4. HIPAA Privacy and Security.

17. NONDISCRIMINATION.

A. State Nondiscrimination Provisions.

- 1. No Denial of Benefits on the Basis of Protected Classification.** During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor and its subcontractors shall not deny this Agreement's benefits to any person on the basis of any ground protected under state law including race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, military and veteran status, or other protected category and will not use any policy or practice that has the effect of discriminating on such basis.
- 2. No Discrimination on the Basis of Health or Protected Classification.** Consistent with the requirements of applicable federal law, such as 42 Code of Federal Regulations, sections 438.3(d)(3) and (4), and state law, the Contractor shall not, on the basis of health status or need for health care services, discriminate against Medical eligible individuals in Santa Barbara County who require an assessment or meet medical necessity criteria for specialty mental health services. Nor shall Contractor engage in any unlawful discriminatory practices in the admission of beneficiaries, assignments of accommodations, treatment, evaluation, employment of personnel, or in any other respect on the basis of race, color, gender, gender identity, religion, marital status, national origin, age, sexual orientation, or mental or physical handicap or disability.
- 3. No Discrimination against Handicapped Persons.** The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (codified at 29 U.S.C. § 794), prohibiting exclusion, denial of benefits, and discrimination against qualified individuals with a disability in any federally assisted program or activity, and shall comply with the implementing regulations Parts 84 and 85 of Title 45 of the C.F.R., as applicable.
- 4. Determination of Medical Necessity.** Notwithstanding other provisions of this section, the Contractor may require a determination of medical necessity pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Sections 1820.205, 1830.205 and/or 1830.210, prior to providing covered services to a beneficiary.
- 5. No Discrimination under State Law.** Contractor shall ensure that the evaluation and treatment of employees and applicants for employment are free of such discrimination. Contractor and subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code § 12900 et seq.), the regulations promulgated thereunder (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 2, § 11000 et seq.), the provisions of Article 9.5, Chapter 1, Part 1, Division 3, Title 2 of the Government Code (Gov. Code §§ 11135-11139.5), and the regulations or standards adopted by the awarding state agency to implement such article. Contractor shall permit access by representatives of the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the awarding state agency upon reasonable notice at any time during normal business hours, but in no case less than 24 hours' notice, to such of its books, records, accounts, and all other sources of information and its facilities as said Department or Agency shall require to ascertain compliance with this clause. Contractor and its subcontractors shall give written notice

of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreement. (See Cal. Code Regs., tit. 2, § 11105.)

B. Federal Nondiscrimination Provisions.

1. The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment on the basis of any ground protected under federal law including race, color, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap or disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era. The Contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that qualified applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and career development opportunities and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the Federal Government or DHCS, setting forth the provisions of the Equal Opportunity clause, Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the affirmative action clause required by the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 (38 U.S.C. § 4212). Such notices shall state the Contractor's obligation under the law to take affirmative action to employ and advance in employment qualified applicants without discrimination based on their race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era and the rights of applicants and employees.
2. The Contractor will, in all solicitations or advancements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era.
3. The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice, to be provided by the Federal Government or the State, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Contractor's commitments under the provisions herein and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
4. The Contractor will comply with all provisions of and furnish all information and reports required by Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 (38 U.S.C. § 4212) and of the Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 C.F.R. part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

5. The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 C.F.R. part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to its books, records, and accounts by the State and its designated representatives and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
 6. In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the requirements of the provisions herein or with any federal rules, regulations, or orders which are referenced herein, this Agreement may be cancelled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further federal and state contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 C.F.R. part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
 7. The Contractor shall include the provisions of Sections 14(B)(1) through 14(B)(7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 C.F.R. part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or 38 U.S.C. Section 4212 of the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the Director of the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs or DHCS may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance provided, however, that in the event the Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation by a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by DHCS, the Contractor may request in writing to DHCS, who, in turn, may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State and of the United States.
- C. **Subcontracts.** The Contractor shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this Agreement (Sections 14 and 19, respectively) in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.

18. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.

- A. Contractor agrees to hold harmless the State and beneficiaries in the event the County

cannot or does not pay for services performed by the Contractor.

- B.** The Contractor will not discriminate against beneficiaries on the basis of health status or need for health care services, pursuant to 42 C.F.R. § 438.6(d)(3).
- C.** Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state law, particularly the statutes and regulations incorporated by reference herein. Contractor agrees to comply with any changes to these statutes and regulations that may occur during the contract period and any new applicable statutes or regulations, but either the County or Contractor may request consultation and discussion of new or changed statutes or regulations, including whether contract amendments may be necessary.
- D.** Contractor agrees to comply with the provisions of Exhibit F (Behavioral Health Bridge Housing Program Grant Funding Requirements) attached hereto.

GENERAL FINANCIAL PROVISIONS- MHS

(Applicable to the program described in Exhibit A-1
With attached *Exhibit B-1* MH (Schedule of Rates and Contract Maximum)

For Contractor services to be rendered under this Agreement, Contractor shall be paid the Maximum Contract Amount reflected in section II below and Exhibit B-1 MH (Schedule of Rates and Contract Maximum) at the rate specified in Exhibit B-1-MH.

I. PAYMENT FOR SERVICES.

A. Payment for services shall be made upon Contractor's satisfactory performance, based upon the scope and methodology contained in Exhibit A(s) as determined by County. Payment for services shall be based upon the expenses as defined in Exhibit B-1 MH (Schedule of Rates and Contract Maximum). Invoices submitted for payment that are based upon Exhibit B-1 MH must contain sufficient detail and provide supporting documentation to enable an audit of the charges.

B. Non-Medi-Cal Billable Services. County recognizes that the services provided by Contractor's Program, described in Exhibit A(s), are not reimbursable by Medi-Cal, and such services will be reimbursed by other County, State, and Federal funds to the extent specified in Exhibit B-1 MH and pursuant to Paragraph I.A of this Exhibit B MHS. Funds for these services are included within the Maximum Contract Amount.

II. MAXIMUM CONTRACT AMOUNT.

The Maximum Contract Amount of this Agreement shall not exceed **\$4,080,440**, inclusive of \$94,640 for FY 23-24, \$1,328,600 for FY 24-25, \$1,328,600 for FY 25-26, and \$1,328,600 for FY 26-27, and shall consist of County, State, and/or Federal funds as shown in Exhibit B-1-MHS and subject to the provisions in Section I (Payment for Services). Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event shall County pay Contractor more than this Maximum Contract Amount for Contractor's performance hereunder without a properly executed amendment.

III. ACCOUNTING FOR REVENUES.

A. Internal Procedures. Contractor shall maintain internal financial controls which adequately ensure proper billing and collection procedures. Contractor shall pursue payment from all potential sources in sequential order, with Medi-Cal as payor of last resort. All fees paid by or on behalf of patients/clients receiving services under this Agreement shall be utilized by Contractor only for the delivery of service units specified in the Exhibit A(s) and B-1 to this Agreement. This Agreement does not preclude the Contractor from pursuing or obtaining additional funding to cover the cost of unmet services expenses under this Agreement.

IV. BILLING AND PAYMENT PROCEDURES AND LIMITATIONS.

A. Submission of Claims and Invoices.

Monthly, Contractor shall submit to County's Behavioral Wellness Fiscal Division an invoice or certified claim on the County treasury for the service performed over the period specified. Invoices must include the Agreement number, the number of bed days billed, the actual bed days utilized by client, and the rate.

In addition, Contractor shall submit an accompanying monthly Behavioral Wellness bed occupancy census report to include the first, last name and date of birth of the client with the occupancy rate. County's representative shall evaluate the quality of the service performed, and if found to be satisfactory, shall initiate payment processing. County shall pay invoices or claims for satisfactory work within thirty (30) days of presentation.

B. Withholding of Payment for Non-submission of Service Data and Other Information.

If any required invoice or report(s) is not submitted by Contractor to County within the time limits described in this Agreement or if any such information is incomplete, incorrect, or is not completed in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement, then payment shall be withheld until County is in receipt of complete and correct data.

Contractor agrees that it shall be solely liable and responsible for all data and information submitted to the County and submitted by the County to the State on behalf of Contractor.

2. The Program Contract Maximums specified in Exhibit B-1-MHS and this Exhibit B MH are intended to cover services during the entire term of the Agreement, unless otherwise specified in Exhibit A(s) to this Agreement (such as time-limited or services tied to the school year). Under no circumstances shall Contractor cease services prior to June 30 due to an accelerated draw down of funds earlier in the Fiscal Year. Failure to provide services during the entire term of the Agreement may be considered a breach of contract and subject to the Termination provisions specified in the Agreement.

C. Monthly Review. The Director or designee shall review the monthly claim(s) and invoices to confirm accuracy of the data submitted. With the exception of the final month's payment under this Agreement, County shall make provisional payment for approved claims within thirty (30) calendar days of the receipt of said claim(s) and invoice by County subject to the contractual limitations set forth in this Agreement and all exhibits hereto.

D. Overpayments. If the Contractor discovers an overpayment, Contractor must notify the County in writing of the reason for the overpayment. Any overpayments of contractual amounts must be returned via direct payment within 30 calendar days to the County after the

date on which the overpayment was identified. County may withhold amounts from future payments due to Contractor under this Agreement or any subsequent agreement if Contractor fails to make direct payment within the required timeframe.

- E. **No Waiver.** County's failure to discover or object to unsatisfactory work or billings prior to or after payment will not constitute a waiver of County's right to require Contractor to correct such work or billings, or seek any other legal remedy.

V. **FINANCIAL REPORTS.**

- A. **Audited Financial Reports.** Each year of the Agreement, the Contractor shall submit to County a copy of their audited annual financial statement, including management comments. This report shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the report is received by Contractor.
- B. **Single Audit Report.** If Contractor is required to perform a single audit and/or program specific audit, per the requirements of OMB Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements of Federal Awards, (45 CFR Part 75), Contractor shall submit a copy of such single audit to County within thirty (30) days of receipt.

VI. **AUDITS, AUDIT APPEALS AND POST-AUDIT FINAL SETTLEMENT.**

- A. **Audit by Responsible Auditing Party.** At any time during the term of this Agreement or after the expiration or termination of this Agreement, in accordance with State and Federal law including but not limited to WIC Section 14170 et seq., authorized representatives from the County, State or Federal governments (Responsible Auditing Party) may conduct an audit or site review of Contractor regarding the mental health services/activities provided under this Agreement.
- B. **Settlement.** Settlement of the audit findings will be conducted according to the Responsible Auditing Party's procedures in place.. Such settlement will take place when the State initiates its settlement action which customarily is after the issuance of the audit report by the State and before the State's audit appeal process. However, if the Responsible Auditing Party stays its collection of any amounts due or payable because of the audit findings, County will also stay its settlement of the same amounts due or payable until the Responsible Auditing Party initiates its settlement action with County. If an audit adjustment is appealed then the County may, at its own discretion, notify Contractor but stay collection of amounts due until resolution of the State administrative appeals process.
- C. **Invoice for Amounts Due.** County shall issue an invoice to Contractor for any amount due to the County after the Responsible Auditing Party issues an audit report. The amount on the County invoice is due by Contractor to County thirty (30) calendar days from the date of the invoice.
- D. **Appeal.** Contractor may appeal any such audit findings in accordance with the audit appeal process established by the Responsible Auditing Party performing the audit.





EXHIBIT C

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

(For All Contracts With Good Samaritan)

INDEMNIFICATION

CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend (with counsel reasonably approved by COUNTY) and hold harmless COUNTY and its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers from and against any and all claims, actions, losses, damages, judgments and/or liabilities arising out of this Agreement from any cause whatsoever, including the acts, errors or omissions of any person or entity and for any costs or expenses (including but not limited to attorneys' fees) incurred by COUNTY on account of any claim except where such indemnification is prohibited by law. CONTRACTOR'S indemnification obligation applies to COUNTY'S active as well as passive negligence but does not apply to COUNTY'S sole negligence or willful misconduct.

NOTIFICATION OF ACCIDENTS AND SURVIVAL OF INDEMNIFICATION PROVISIONS

CONTRACTOR shall notify COUNTY immediately in the event of any accident or injury arising out of or in connection with this Agreement. The indemnification provisions in this Agreement shall survive any expiration or termination of this Agreement.

INSURANCE

CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain for the duration of this Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the CONTRACTOR, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

A. Minimum Scope of Insurance

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

1. **Commercial General Liability (CGL):** Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products-completed operations, personal & advertising injury, with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate.
2. **Automobile Liability:** Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if CONTRACTOR has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.

3. **Workers' Compensation:** Insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.
4. **Professional Liability:** (Errors and Omissions) Insurance appropriate to the CONTRACTOR'S profession, with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

If the CONTRACTOR maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the COUNTY requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by the CONTRACTOR. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the COUNTY.

B. Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

1. **Additional Insured** – COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the CONTRACTOR'S insurance at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; **and** CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).
2. **Primary Coverage** – For any claims related to this contract, the CONTRACTOR'S insurance coverage shall be primary insurance primary coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the CONTRACTOR'S insurance and shall not contribute with it.
3. **Notice of Cancellation** – Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the COUNTY.
4. **Mutual Waiver of Workers' Compensation Subrogation Rights** – Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, COUNTY hereby releases and waives unto CONTRACTOR, including its officers, directors, employees and agents, and CONTRACTOR hereby releases and waives unto COUNTY, including its officers, directors, employees and agents, all rights to claim damages for any workers' compensation injury, loss, cost or damage to persons, as long as the amount of such injury, loss, cost or damage has been paid either to or by COUNTY, CONTRACTOR, or any other person, firm or corporation, under the terms of any

workers' compensation policy of insurance. Each party shall have its Workers' Compensation policy endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the other party for all work performed by the either party, its officers, directors, employees and agents. **Each party shall provide the other party with the required insurance endorsement that amends the workers' compensation insurance policy.**

5. As respects all workers' compensation policies of insurance carried or maintained pursuant to this Agreement and to the extent permitted under such policies, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR, each waive the insurance carriers' rights of subrogation. For purposes of this provision, insurance proceeds paid to either party shall be deemed to include any deductible or self-insurance retention amount for which that party is responsible. A party's failure to obtain or maintain any insurance coverage required pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall not negate the waivers and releases set forth herein, as long as the insurance that the party failed to obtain or maintain would have covered the loss or damage for which the party is waiving its claims.
6. **Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention** – Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the COUNTY. The COUNTY may require the CONTRACTOR to purchase coverage with a lower deductible or retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention.
7. **Acceptability of Insurers** – Unless otherwise approved by Risk Management, insurance shall be written by insurers authorized to do business in the State of California and with a minimum A.M. Best's Insurance Guide rating of "A- VII".
8. **Verification of Coverage** – CONTRACTOR shall furnish the COUNTY with proof of insurance, original certificates and amendatory endorsements as required by this Agreement. The proof of insurance, certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the COUNTY before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the CONTRACTOR'S obligation to provide them. The CONTRACTOR shall furnish evidence of renewal of coverage throughout the term of the Agreement. The COUNTY reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.
9. **Failure to Procure Coverage** – In the event that any policy of insurance required under this Agreement does not comply with the requirements, is not procured, or is canceled and not replaced, COUNTY has the right but not the obligation or duty to terminate the Agreement. Maintenance of required insurance coverage is a material element of the Agreement and failure to maintain or renew such coverage or to provide evidence of renewal may be treated by COUNTY as a material breach of contract.

10. **Subcontractors** – CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and CONTRACTOR shall ensure that COUNTY is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.

11. **Claims Made Policies** – If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis:

- i. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- ii. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of contract work.
- iii. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the CONTRACTOR must purchase “extended reporting” coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.

12. **Special Risks or Circumstances** – COUNTY reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Any change requiring additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits must be made by amendment to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR agrees to execute any such amendment within thirty (30) days of receipt.

Any failure, actual or alleged, on the part of COUNTY to monitor or enforce compliance with any of the insurance and indemnification requirements will not be deemed as a waiver of any rights on the part of COUNTY.

- B. Contractor shall comply with all County and Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) Program requirements including, but not limited to, the County's Request for Applications, the County's BHBH Program Plan, and all applicable local, state, and federal laws, regulations, and guidance, that are now in force or may hereafter be in force.
- C. Contractor shall comply with all terms and conditions of the Subcontract Agreement, Subcontract Agreement ID: 20456-CA-BHBH-556-BHBH-SANTA-BARBARA-COUNTY-01, between the County and Advocates for Human Potential, Inc. (AHP), the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS)' administrator for the BHBH Program including, but not limited to, those specified in this Exhibit F (Behavioral Health Bridge Housing Program Grant Funding Compliance), and any amendments thereto, which are or shall be available at www.bridgehousing.Buildingcalhhs.com or upon request.

1. Contractor acknowledges and agrees to comply with all applicable numbered provisions of Attachment B of County's BHBH grant agreement with AHP, Subcontract Agreement ID: 20456-CA-BHBH-556-BHBH-SANTA-BARBARA-COUNTY-01, including, but not limited to the following numbered provisions: 1 (Travel and Per Diem Reimbursement), 2 (Site Inspection), 3 (Intellectual Property Rights), 5 (Confidentiality of Information), 6 (Documentation, Publications, and Written Reports), 7 (Subcontract Requirements), 11 (Progress Payment Withholds), 15 (Prohibited Use of State Funds for Software), 16 (Insurance Requirements), 17 (Procurement Rules), 18 (Equipment/Property Ownership/Inventory/Disposition), 20 (Suspension or Stop Work Notification), 21 (Public Communications), and 22 (Audit and Record Retention).

- D. **Data Collection and Reporting.** Contractor shall comply with all data collection and reporting requirements of the County, AHP, or DHCS applicable to Contractor's performance under this Agreement and shall use data systems to facilitate BHBH grant evaluation as directed by Behavioral Wellness.
- E. **Debarment and Suspension.** Contractor represents and certifies that neither Contractor nor any of its principals is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible nor voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency from participating in transactions. Any change in the debarred or suspended status of the Contractor during the life of this Agreement will be reported

immediately to County and AHP. Contractor shall incorporate this Debarment and Suspension certification into any subcontract that it may enter into as a part of this Agreement.

F. Intellectual Property.

1. Ownership.

- a. Except where DHCS has agreed in a signed writing to accept a license, DHCS shall be and remain, without additional compensation, the sole owner of any and all rights, title and interest in all Intellectual Property, from the moment of creation, whether or not jointly conceived, that are made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement.
- b. For the purposes of this Agreement, Intellectual Property means recognized protectable rights and interest such as: patents, (whether or not issued) copyrights, trademarks, service marks, applications for any of the foregoing, inventions, trade secrets, trade dress, logos, insignia, color combinations, slogans, moral rights, right of publicity, author's rights, contract and licensing rights, works, mask works, industrial design rights, rights of priority, knowhow, design flows, methodologies, devices, business processes, developments, innovations, good will and all other legal rights protecting intangible proprietary information as may exist now and/or here after come into existence, and all renewals and extensions, regardless of whether those rights arise under the laws of the United States, or any other state, country or jurisdiction.
- c. For the purposes of the definition of Intellectual Property, "works" means all literary works, writings and printed matter including the medium by which they are recorded or reproduced, photographs, art work, pictorial and graphic representations and works of a similar nature, film, motion pictures, digital images, animation cells, and other audiovisual works including positives and negatives thereof, sound recordings, tapes, educational materials, interactive videos and any other materials or products created, produced, conceptualized and fixed in a tangible medium of expression. It includes preliminary and final products and any materials and information developed for the purposes of producing those final products. Works does not include articles submitted to peer review or reference journals or independent research projects.
- d. In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor will exercise and utilize certain of its Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this Agreement. In addition, under this Agreement, Contractor may access and utilize certain of DHCS' Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this Agreement.

Except as otherwise set forth herein, Contractor shall not use any of AHP's or DHCS' Intellectual Property now existing or hereafter existing for any purposes without the prior written permission of DHCS. Except as otherwise set forth herein, neither the Contractor nor DHCS shall give any ownership interest in or rights to its Intellectual Property to the other party. If during the term of this Agreement, Contractor accesses any third-party Intellectual Property that is licensed to DHCS, Contractor agrees to abide by all license and confidentiality restrictions applicable to DHCS in the third-party's license agreement.

- e. Contractor agrees to cooperate with AHP and/or DHCS in establishing or maintaining DHCS' exclusive rights in the Intellectual Property, and in assuring DHCS' sole rights against third parties with respect to the Intellectual Property. If the Contractor enters into any agreements or subcontracts with other parties in order to perform this Agreement, Contractor shall require the terms of the agreement(s) to include all Intellectual Property provisions. Such terms must include, but are not limited to, the subcontractor assigning and agreeing to assign to DHCS all rights, title and interest in Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by the subcontractor, Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement, or any subcontract entered into by Contractor.
- f. Contractor further agrees to assist and cooperate with AHP and/or DHCS in all reasonable respects, and execute all documents and, subject to reasonable availability, give testimony and take all further acts reasonably necessary to acquire, transfer, maintain, and enforce DHCS' Intellectual Property rights and interests.

2. Retained Rights/License Rights.

- a. Except for Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement, Contractor shall retain title to all of its Intellectual Property to the extent such Intellectual Property is in existence prior to the effective date of this Agreement. Contractor hereby grants to DHCS, without additional compensation, a permanent, non-exclusive, royalty free, paid-up, worldwide, irrevocable, perpetual, non-terminable license to use, reproduce, manufacture, sell, offer to sell, import, export, modify, publicly and privately display/perform, distribute, and dispose Contractor's Intellectual Property with the right to sublicense through multiple layers, for any purpose whatsoever, to the extent it is incorporated in the Intellectual Property resulting from this Agreement, unless

Contractor assigns all rights, title and interest in the Intellectual Property as set forth herein.

- b. Nothing in this provision shall restrict, limit, or otherwise prevent Contractor from using any ideas, concepts, know-how, methodology or techniques related to its performance under this Agreement, provided that Contractor's use does not infringe the patent, copyright, trademark rights, license or other Intellectual Property rights of DHCS or third party, or result in a breach or default of any provisions of this Agreement or result in a breach of any provisions of law relating to confidentiality.

3. Copyright.

- a. Contractor agrees that for purposes of copyright law, all works [as defined in section 1.F.1.c above] of authorship made by or on behalf of Contractor in connection with Contractor's performance of this Agreement shall be deemed "works made for hire." Contractor further agrees that the work of each person utilized by Contractor in connection with the performance of this Agreement will be a "work made for hire," whether that person is an employee of Contractor or that person has entered into an agreement with Contractor to perform the work. Contractor shall enter into a written agreement with any such person that: (i) all work performed for Contractor shall be deemed a "work made for hire" under the Copyright Act and (ii) that person shall assign all right, title, and interest to DHCS to any work product made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement.
- b. All materials, including, but not limited to, visual works or text, reproduced or distributed pursuant to this Agreement that include Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement, shall include DHCS' notice of copyright, which shall read in 3mm or larger typeface: "© [Enter Current Year e.g., 2023, etc.], California Department of Health Care Services. This material may not be reproduced or disseminated without prior written permission from the California Department of Health Care Services." This notice should be placed prominently on the materials and set apart from other matter on the page where it appears. Audio productions shall contain a similar audio notice of copyright.

4. Patent Rights.

- a. With respect to inventions made by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement, which did not result from research and development specifically, included in this Agreement's scope of

work, Contractor hereby grants to DHCS a license as described under section 1.F.2 above for devices or material incorporating, or made through the use of such inventions.

- b. If such inventions result from research and development work specifically included within this Agreement's scope of work, then Contractor agrees to assign to DHCS, without additional compensation, all its right, title, and interest in and to such inventions and to assist DHCS in securing United States and foreign patents with respect thereto.

5. Third-Party Intellectual Property.

- a. Except as provided herein, Contractor agrees that its performance of this Agreement shall not be dependent upon or include any Intellectual Property of Contractor or third party without first: (i) obtaining AHP and DHCS' prior written approval; and (ii) granting to or obtaining for AHP and DHCS, without additional compensation, a license, as described in section 1.F.2 above, for any of Contractor's or third-party's Intellectual Property in existence prior to the effective date of this Agreement. If such a license upon these terms is unattainable, and AHP and DHCS determines that the Intellectual Property should be included in or is required for Contractor's performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall obtain a license under terms acceptable to AHP and DHCS.

6. Warranties.

- a. Contractor represents and warrants that:
 - a. It is free to enter into and fully perform this Agreement.
 - b. It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for its performance of this Agreement.
 - c. Neither Contractor's performance of this Agreement, nor the exercise by either party of the rights granted in this Agreement, nor any use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, import, export, modification, public and private display/performance, distribution, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement will infringe upon or violate any Intellectual Property right, non-disclosure obligation, or other proprietary right or interest of any third-party or entity now existing under the laws of, or hereafter existing or issued by, any state, the United States, or any foreign country. There is currently no actual or threatened claim by any such third party based on an alleged violation of any such right by Contractor.

- d. Neither Contractor's performance nor any part of its performance will violate the right of privacy of or constitute a libel or slander against any person or entity.
- e. It has secured and will secure all rights and licenses necessary for Intellectual Property including, but not limited to, consents, waivers, or releases from all authors of music or performances used, and talent (radio, television, and motion picture talent), owners of any interest in and to real estate, sites, locations, property or props that may be used or shown.
- f. It has not granted and shall not grant to any person or entity any right that would or might derogate, encumber, or interfere with any of the rights granted to DHCS in this Agreement.
- g. It has appropriate systems and controls in place to ensure that state funds will not be used in the performance of this Agreement for the acquisition, operation, or maintenance of computer software in violation of copyright laws.
- h. It has no knowledge of any outstanding claims, licenses or other charges, liens, or encumbrances of any kind or nature whatsoever that could affect in any way Contractor's performance of this Agreement.
- i. DHCS makes no warranty that the intellectual property resulting from this agreement does not infringe upon any patent, trademark, copyright, or the like, now existing or subsequently issued.

7. Intellectual Property Indemnity.

- a. Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless AHP and DHCS and its licensees and assignees, and its officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, successors, and users of its products, ("Indemnitees") from and against all claims, actions, damages, losses, liabilities (or actions or proceedings with respect to any thereof), whether or not rightful, arising from any and all actions or claims by any third party or expenses related thereto (including, but not limited to, all legal expenses, court costs, and attorney's fees incurred in investigating, preparing, serving as a witness in, or defending against, any such claim, action, or proceeding, commenced or threatened) to which any of the Indemnitees may be subject, whether or not Contractor is a party to any pending or threatened litigation, which arise out of or are related to (1) the incorrectness or breach of any of the representations, warranties, covenants or agreements of Contractor pertaining to Intellectual Property; or (2) any Intellectual Property infringement,

or any other type of actual or alleged infringement claim, arising out of DHCS' use, reproduction, manufacture, sale, offer to sell, distribution, import, export, modification, public and private performance/display, license, and disposition of the Intellectual Property made, conceived, derived from, or reduced to practice by Contractor or DHCS and which result directly or indirectly from this Agreement. This indemnity obligation shall apply irrespective of whether the infringement claim is based on a patent, trademark or copyright registration that issued after the effective date of this Agreement. DHCS reserves the right to participate in and/or control, at Contractor's expense, any such infringement action brought against DHCS.

- b. Should any Intellectual Property licensed by the Contractor to DHCS under this Agreement become the subject of an Intellectual Property infringement claim, Contractor will exercise its authority reasonably and in good faith to preserve DHCS' right to use the licensed Intellectual Property in accordance with this Agreement at no expense to DHCS. DHCS shall have the right to monitor and appear through its own counsel (at Contractor's expense) in any such claim or action. In the defense or settlement of the claim, Contractor may obtain the right for DHCS to continue using the licensed Intellectual Property; or replace or modify the licensed Intellectual Property so that the replaced or modified Intellectual Property becomes non-infringing provided that such replacement or modification is functionally equivalent to the original licensed Intellectual Property. If such remedies are not reasonably available, DHCS shall be entitled to a refund of all monies paid under this Agreement, without restriction or limitation of any other rights and remedies available at law or in equity.
- c. Contractor agrees that damages alone would be inadequate to compensate AHP or DHCS for breach of any term of this section 1.F (Intellectual Property) by Contractor. Contractor acknowledges AHP and/or DHCS would suffer irreparable harm in the event of such breach and agrees AHP and/or DHCS shall be entitled to obtain equitable relief, including without limitation an injunction, from a court of competent jurisdiction, without restriction or limitation of any other rights and remedies available at law or in equity.

8. Federal Funding.

- a. In any agreement funded in whole or in part by the federal government, DHCS may acquire and maintain the Intellectual Property rights, title, and ownership, which results directly or indirectly from the agreement; except as provided in 37 Code of Federal Regulations part 401.14; however, the federal government

shall have a non-exclusive, nontransferable, irrevocable, paid-up license throughout the world to use, duplicate, or dispose of such Intellectual Property throughout the world in any manner for governmental purposes and to have and permit others to do so.

9.Survival.

- a. The provisions set forth herein shall survive any termination or expiration of this Agreement.

G. Audit and Record Retention.

1. Contractor agrees to maintain and preserve, until three years after termination of County's BHBH grant agreement with AHP, Subcontract Agreement ID: 20456-CA-BHBH-556-BHBH-SANTA-BARBARA-COUNTY-01, and final payment from AHP to County, to permit DHCS or any duly authorized representative, to have access to, examine or audit any pertinent books, documents, papers, and records related to this subcontract and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records
2. Contractor and/or its subcontractor shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, accounting procedures and practices, sufficient to properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of whatever nature claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Agreement, including any matching costs and expenses. The foregoing constitutes "records" for the purpose of this provision.
3. Contractor's and/or subcontractor's facility or office or such part thereof as may be engaged in the performance of this Agreement and its records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, audit, and reproduction.
4. Contractor agrees that AHP, DHCS, the Department of General Services, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representatives including the Comptroller General of the United States shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. Contractor agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, the Contractor agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement. (Government Code Section 8546.7, Public Contract Code (PCC) Sections 10115 et seq., California Code of Regulations Title 2, Section 1896.77) The Contractor shall comply with the above and be aware of the penalties for violations of fraud and for obstruction of investigation as set forth in PCC Section 10115.10.
5. Contractor and/or its subcontractor shall preserve and make available its records (1) for a period of six years for all records related to Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise (DVBE) participation (Military and Veterans Code Section 999.55), if this Agreement involves DVBE participation, and

three years for all other contract records from the date of final payment under this Agreement, and (2) for such longer period, if any, as is required by applicable statute, by any other provision of this Agreement, or by subparagraphs (a) or (b) below.

- a. If this Agreement is completely or partially terminated, the records relating to the work terminated shall be preserved and made available for a period of three years from the date of any resulting final settlement; or
 - b. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the expiration of the three-year period, the records shall be retained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues which arise from it, or until the end of the regular three-year period, whichever is later.
6. Contractor and/or its subcontractor may, at its discretion, following receipt of final payment under this Agreement, reduce its accounts, books and records related to this Agreement to microfilm, computer disk, CD ROM, DVD, or other data storage medium. Upon request by an authorized representative to inspect, audit or obtain copies of said records, the Contractor and/or its subcontractor must supply or make available applicable devices, hardware, and/or software necessary to view, copy and/or print said records. Applicable devices may include, but are not limited to, microfilm readers and microfilm printers, etc.
7. Contractor shall, if applicable, comply with the Single Audit Act and the audit requirements set forth in 2 C.F.R. § 200.501 (2014).
