Dear Park Commission Members,

Since the issue of beach parking fees at county parks was first raised in late 2010, the Summerland Citizens Association (SCA) has taken a proactive approach in reviewing the implications for Summerland. An SCA sub-committee was formed, and meetings have been held. Letters and proposals were sent to the County Parks Commission and to Supervisor Carbajal. A request for a formal meeting to address Lookout Park revenue options has been on the table with Parks since August, 2011. Based on the findings of its sub-committee, the Summerland Citizens Association Board does not support charging for beach parking at Lookout Park.

We believe that Summerland presents a unique situation in terms of the proposed parking fee charges and does not fall into a "one size fits all" construct for collecting beach access fees. Lookout Park, unlike any other county park, is intimately located within a community of homes and businesses. Summerland proper - where Lookout Park is situated - is characterized by closely packed business and homes on small lots, with little off-street parking. Crowded, very narrow streets already pose access problems for motorists, fire and emergency response. Currently, on summer week-ends beach overflow parking spills onto Wallace Avenue, Evans and into the post office parking lot. Parking problems will reach critical mass with completion, this summer, of the Parking and Circulation Project which among other improvements adds a bike lane along Lillie Avenue. Most recently, the Board of Supervisors approved adding additional handicap spaces along Lillie Avenue. The business community now has fewer parking spaces then they had prior to this project's implementation. Charging for parking at Lookout Park will only exacerbate the community's increasingly serious parking problems as more beach goers, hoping to avoid the fees, park for extended periods of time on Summerland's business and residential streets.

Summerland merchants stand to be heavily impacted by the imposition of such fees. Our commercial district, and the taxes it generates for the state and county, stands to lose additional revenue should parking become any more difficult than it is today. In our letter to Parks in November 2011, we suggested that a business model be developed and analyzed to determine if enough revenue could be generated from Lookout Park's 77

parking spaces in the three-month summer period to offset the initial outlay for equipment and ongoing monitoring of the parking area for compliance.

The Summerland Citizens Association request the opportunity to review the County Parks business case that outlines the costs and revenue projections associated with implementing and administering a beach parking fee program in Summerland. The SCA would also suggest that, if the business case does not already contain a 'loss of revenue factor' for Summerland business, one be applied to offset the sales tax revenues lost when customers are unable to find a place to park as a result of beach goers parking for extended periods of time in front of local businesses.

We understand County Parks need to generate revenues and the SCA Board, representing the community, is supportive of other efforts in this regard. In our November letter, we proposed several alternative revenue-generating opportunities seemingly more appropriate to the situation in Summerland. Again we will recap those suggestions:

In addition to the already-existing dog wash concession and soft drink machine, there is the possibility for:

- Concession stands for rentals or purchase of beach related items and kayaks.
- Licensed food trucks popular fast-food options today and easy to move in at peak times.
- Licensed surf camps, yoga and exercise or junior lifeguard classes in the park or beach.
- Promotion of the park as a fee-paid venue for weddings, reunions and parties during park hours.
- Use of the abandoned park ranger area, which offers dramatic ocean views, for feepaid special events and/or staging area for commercial uses, including film locations and catalog shots.

The residents of Summerland have a special relationship with Lookout Park. It is heavily used for Summerland School gatherings, community potlucks, birthday parties and picnics. With limited open space available in town, Lookout Park is our de facto town park. Imposing parking fees, places an additional tax upon Summerland residents who are Lookout Park's most regular year-round users. Summerland residents and visitors should not have to pay for coastal access.

We recognize that the County must find revenue sources to keep parks available for public use. We also know that each county park has a direct impact on its surrounding neighborhood. The SCA Board suggests that beach fee parking is not the best solution for Lookout Park. The Board through its sub-committee has made it clear that we are willing to work with County Parks to determine an alternative revenue generating solution for Lookout Park that will meet the needs of both the County and the community. We request the opportunity to do so.



While I do understand the difficult position the City finds itself, as revenue streams dwindle and expenses continue to rise, I feel very strongly that imposing a parking fee at local beaches is the wrong approach. It seems that some of the other options considered but voted down by the Supervisors was short-sighted, not only the possibility an increased 'bed' tax, but more appropriately, a minor tax on each barrel of oil drawn from the Santa Barbara reserves. (Even Texas—TEXAS!--takes a 4.6% tax for every barrel extracted; Alaska imposes a fee of 50.2% and North Dakota 14.3%--see http://www.ncsl.org/issues-research/budget/state-energy-revenues-update.aspx.) Imposing a fee on oil and gas extraction seems like the most reasonable approach, and one I strongly urge you to reconsider.

But even if the City opts to bypass this obvious revenue stream, imposing a fee on residents to enjoy our local beaches should be a measure of absolute last resort. The Santa Barbara community is, overall, a healthy community, thanks to wonderful walking, hiking and biking trails, as well as free beach access where many of our residents go to walk, run, or exercise with our dogs. If fees are imposed on residents, this will be felt by lower-income residents more intensely, and will ultimately lead to a less healthy population, which, in turn, will drive up health costs. This move is ill-considered at best, and has the potential of significantly negatively impacting the overall health—both physical and mental--of our community.

When I first moved to Santa Barbara in 2004, the first place I 'discovered' was Hendry's Beach. I knew no one when I arrived, but within a few short days I met several wonderful people while walking along the beautiful coastline at Hendry's, many of whom I continue to count as dear and wonderful friends. And thanks to those connections I met the man who is now my husband. But if there had been a parking fee at that time, given my finances, I doubt that I would've gone to Hendry's more than a few times. Hendry's remains my favorite beach, and I chose to remain in Santa Barbara because of the white-washing that such a place affords. It doesn't matter if you're down to your last dime, or a multimillionaire: a beautiful beach that is accessible to all is a great equalizer, and is one of the many facets of Santa Barbara that makes this place so special.

Thanks to my husband, paying a fee to park at the beach would no longer be a 'make-or-break' scenario for me, but for many others it could mean an end to their primary outlet for working off stress, staying fit, and meeting folks from all walks of life. If the Supervisors cannot see fit to impose a minor tax on oil production, then I suggest that they float an increased tax on properties whose value exceeds \$1 million (and yes, that would affect me). Let those of us who can best afford it bear the brunt; not those of us who whose struggles to cope with the high costs of living in the area have only been exacerbated by our floundering economy. A Santa Barbara comprised of only the wealthy is not a Santa Barbara I wish to be part of.

Please read into the record.

Esteemed Commissioners,

As the former Director of the County Parks Department, I am intimately aware of the fiscal challenges that have plagued the organization for over 5 years. In my tenure with the County, we were proactive and creative in addressing reduced budgets while increasing and developing popular programs and absorbing cuts without having to lay off staff. During that time, beach parking fees were initially discussed.

At that time, fees were discussed in the context of generating revenue to offset the cost of the beach preservation plan for Goleta Beach. Now, with Goleta Beach 2.0 as the official plan for the beach, I am not aware of any plan that exists that will address the cost of implementing this plan, which I believe is in excess of \$8 million. Initial fee discussions focused on Goleta and Hendry's Beach only with revenues generated by these fees used to implement this plan and assist in operational costs for the Parks Department. From what I now understand, parking fees are being discussed for all County beaches with the revenues going into the General Fund.

My questions and comments relate to the impacts this will have for many communities. Summerland for example. Fees will only push traffic into already congested streets that are in close proximity to the beach. Surf Beach access is also an Amtrak stop. How can the County charge for parking for those taking the train? Is the loss of parking at Goleta Beach due to GB 2.0 taken into account in the revenue projections? How about loss of revenue for the beach concessions at Hendry's and GB? Butterfly Beach will be significantly impacted with traffic and crowds since there is no way to charge for parking there and those that can't afford parking and wanting to drink on the beach will have this as their only option. With the County Beaches being the only ones that allow alcohol, you will see an increase in alcohol related activities there. Finally, the County budget challenges is structural in nature with the next fiscal year projected at \$16-19 million deficit. Fees will not come anywhere near close to solving this problem.

I would humbly suggest that fees be limited to Hendry's and Goleta Beach with accommodations for those going to the restaurants. Fees be designated to a special fund to be used to pay for the implementation of 2.0 with remaining funds placed into a capital account for needed park improvements such as the access road to Toro Canyon Park, road to Guadalupe Dunes, etc. These two improvements alone were projected to cost in excess of \$650,000 in 2010. Lastly, include a sunset clause of 8-10 years with any extension requiring a ballot measure of the County residents to extend. Such a recommendation by the Commission to the Board of Supervisors would be a good compromise and show independence and leadership by Commissioners. Short of that, I would respectfully ask the Commission to not recommend increases.

I am writing to express my families strong objection to placing fees on parking at the county beaches. It is our belief that the fees would drive beach access to other locations such as downtown Summerland, Isla Vista, Santa Claus lane, Miramar, Butterfly, Biltmore, Mesa Lane, Shoreline Park neighborhood. While not clarified in your report the city of santa barbara has many free access points including the ledbetter lot for much of the year.

We would quit frequenting the restaurants at AB and Goleta. We would not attend environmental educational programs and events at Arroyo Burro. We would no longer show up for beach cleanups which we have done for over 15 years.

We believe that the estimates in the staff report of a net gain of \$700,000 are VERY optimistic and not attainable. The County Parks tried charging fees at Goleta Beach in the late 1970's after Prop. 13 was put into effect and it was quickly shut down as the costs far exceeded the projections. Furthermore, who would enforce these parking programs. The Park Rangers have been reduced and would 2 FTE contract workers be able to cover Guadalupe Dunes to Rincon 365 days a year and have legal authority to issue citations?

It would seem that there are better ways to close the gap in revenues. We would very much support raising the bed tax to 12%, as residents of the city of santa barbara we have seen the growth in occupancy tax revenues. Increase the oil excise tax. Look for more cuts in operating costs.

I would like to express my oppostion to the beach fee proposal. I would also like answers for the following questions:

- 1. To avoid the fee, many persons will attempt to park in the adjacent neighborhoods. This will result in attempts to restrict parking there by requesting special permits. Permit enforcement may require additional staff to process permits and will surely require more visits from parking enforcement staff. Has this been considered in the cost of the operations?
- 2. Will there be a charge for bicycles? Construction of bicycle posts will be an added expense. Has this been factored into the costs?
- 3. A fee would probably discourage volunteer activity. Work being done by volunteers would have to be replaced by paid staff. How many staff hours will be required to replace this free labor?
- 4. If parking meters are to be used, have they been tested in a beach environment with consideration of the effects of salt air corrosion? Has vandalism in similar beach communities been considered? Has the County Parks department factored in future maintenance costs for equipment to be intstalled?
- 5. For the Arroyo Burro Beach, has the commission considered the option of allowing parking on Los Positas or Cliff Drive for persons who do not wish to pay for parking?
- 6. Has the Santa Barbara Bicycle Coalition been involved in the planning process?
- 7. Are any funds collected through beach fees directed to improving the quality of the beach experience either directly or through such entities that seek to improve water quality such as water flows from creeks? If not, why not?
- 8. Is there any funding to increase public transportation to these beaches beyond that which is currently scheduled?
- 9. Should there be an environmental impact report on this project? Is the cost of even preparing a negative declaration being factored in the initial capital costs?

I think the Parks Commission should be prepared to answer these questions before proceding on this project. At the very minimum, if this project is approved, fees collected should go directly to beach maintenance and improvement and not put into a general county fund or the even the general Parks Commission budget.

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From the Archive: 1961 parking woes at

City Hall has been squeezing every penny out of Los Angeles motorists in recent years, approving hundreds of new parking meters and repeatedly jacking up parking fines.

But one corner of Los Angeles has managed to buck the tide, convincing the City Council not just to remove hundreds of meters but to reduce rates by up to half on the machines that

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be doubled from one hour to two.

community and nearby Wilmington.

The campaign to remove the meters was launched in 2009, after Los Angeles officials - urgently looking for cash quadrupled the cost of parking in downtown San Pedro, from 25 cents to a dollar an hour. The backlash from merchants and neighborhood leaders was strong and swift. The change was driving away customers in the middle of a recession, they

"The city gets quite a lot of money from writing tickets and philosophically, it doesn't want to lose that," said Andrew Silver, owner of the Whale & Ale in San Pedro. "I understand that it brings money into the city. But it's disastrous in terms of generating more retail sales, more sales tax revenue and more employment."

The protests quickly reached then-Harbor area Councilwoman Janiec Halm, who has since been elected to Congress. Parking meters became an issue in the election this year to replace her, with the top candidates pledging to address merchant complaints.

The area's new councilman, Joe Buscaino, has worked to eliminate hundreds of less frequently used meters on the outskirts of the San Pedro and Wilmington business districts. The city would lose only \$45,000 per year by dumping the meters, once reduced maintenance costs are considered, he

Buscaino said his district was competing with other communities — Torrance, Long Beach and Rancho Palos Verdes, among others - where parking is offered free at shopping malls and elsewhere. "We're surrounded by business-friendly cities, and one of the reasons people weren't spending money were the parking meter rates," he said.

Buscaino's initiative also cut the rates of the remaining meters in downtown San Pedro from one dollar to 75 cents an hour in some places and 50 cents in others. Parking also will be free in two city-owned lots, and the amount of time shoppers and others can leave vehicles at metered spaces will

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The Harbor area retreat on parking meters and fees comes just weeks after council members voted to hike parking fines for the sixth time in seven years. And though San Pedro and Wilmington will be losing meters, other neighborhoods will be getting more.

Additional meters are planned for Westchester and Palms, where business owners have complained that motorists tie up parking spots all day.

Buscaino said his colleagues have already approached him about installing the surplus meters in

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their districts.

Dear Supervisor --,

The proposed new parking fees at County beaches are inappropriate in that they disproportionally impact the least affluent members of our community. Children in particular are suffering from Nature Disorder, a failure to experience, understand and connect with nature. Beaches are one of the best places for people of all classes to recreate. (As in Re Create) In an economy of vanished vacation budgets this becomes a particularly cruel tax.

I would further point out how quickly The Board gave away millions to hotels in forgone bed taxes, a fiscally nasty precedent that other hotel projects will undoubtedly be entitled to. Bailing out Montecito developers at County beach goers expense is both abusive and elitist.

My name is Ben Mottau and I am a SB resident and a surfer, and I wanted to voice my opinion about the proposed beach fees in SB County.

- 1. I oppose their implementation
- 2. I think SB public beaches are an invaluable public good
- 3. I think charging \$8 is unfair and will just push people to park in unsafe places and cause undo traffic congestion and other issues

I think \$8 is quite steep for the day use of SB beaches, it's what State Parks charge and I think it ends up as more of an impediment than anything else. I recognize there is a cost of maintaining beaches and those who use them should not necessarily be able to ride on the funding of everyone else, but in our county, I would argue, most use the beach or benefit in some way.

I would love to avoid having to pay any fee at all, period, but understand pressures to get revenue any way possible. Taking the free access away from those who are strapped financially is unfair, and the beach is one of the last "free" options for people to enjoy. At Rincon in particular, you could even see people starting to park on the street and then walking in, making those cars prime for vandalism and theft that the lots help prevent.

I think the following are the potential alternatives, and list them in my order of preference:

- 1. No fees
- 2. Any fee scenario needs to include the option for an annual pass at a reasonable rate of at most \$100/year
- 3. Any daily charge should be capped at \$2/day like at C Street must have that annual pass

An annual pass has the added benefit of the County essentially getting an upfront loan and makes budgeting easier to gauge, as well as provide the opportunity for you to make money on the float if properly invested.

Simply put, the beach is and always has been a huge part of our life.

My family is a prime example of one who will not be able to visit the beach nearly as often if the parking fees are implemented. We are a family who currently cannot afford to belong to a health club, but get our exercise from beach visits where we run, swim, surf, and play together. *Please* do not make the decision to charge those of us who are already working so hard to live in this town. *Please* do not make me have to add beach fees to my monthly budget. When my kids ask me if we can go to the beach, *please* do not put me in a position where my answer has to be, "sorry guys, not today-we don't have the money to visit the beach."

My name is Peter Laraway and my wife Julia and I have lived in Santa Barbara for nearly 30 years. I have worked in Carpinteria for 21 years. We have 3 kids and we all love the beaches of Santa Barbara — we go to Arroyo Burro and Goleta beaches all the time. I'm sure you're heard from many others their strong opposition to the beach parking fees and I share their feelings. This plan has been floated in the past and it's been good that it never happened. However, working in Carpinteria just a couple minutes away I've used the Rincon lot for many years and I have some concerns should fees be established.

- 1. Fees should not slow things down. I would be willing to buy a pass but expect be able to park without waiting in a line of cars. I, as well as many of my colleagues here at work, go to Rincon during the lunch hour to swim, walk, exercise or surf. With limited time available it is critical to me that the fees don't mean wasted time.
- 2. An annual pass should be available to all the parks.
- 3. County residents should have preferential prices for passes since they pay the bulk of Park budget.

SUMMERLAND CITIZEN'S ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE PARKS COMMISSION SPECIAL MEETING BEACH FEE PARKING @ LOOKOUT PARK 7/24/2012

BACKGROUND:

Since the possibility of beach fee parking at ocean front county parks was first suggested in late 2010 the SCA has taken a pro-active approach in reviewing the implications on Summerland and developing alternative ideas for Lookout Park. An SCA committee was formed, meetings have been held with frequently changing representatives from County Parks, letters and proposals have been developed and sent to the county parks department and Supervisor Carbajal, and a request for a formal meeting to address Lookout Park revenue options has been on the table with County parks since August 2011.

SUMMERLAND SITUATION ANALYSIS:

Lookout Park, unlike any other county park, is located in a small community of homes and small businesses. There are residents immediately adjacent to the park on both the eastern and western end. The park is bordered by the 101 and the ocean to the north and south. Parking is limited on the county park property and often on summer week-ends the residents along Wallace and Evans as well as businesses and the US Post Office on Lillie and Ortega Hill Rd see overflow parking that spills over on to our small public streets. Streets that already have extremely limited parking.

Adding to this has been the impact of a county project that put in sidewalks along the Lillie Ave/Ortega Hill Rd corridor, created a bike lane and as part of the process, eliminated a large number of public parking spaces. In addition to overflow parking from Lookout Park we frequently witness cars of bicycle riders who utilize the limited parking to leave their car for the day prior to setting off for a day of bike riding. Public parking in Summerland, particularly in the summer months and on week-ends, is difficult at best.

In Summerland the commercial district, and the taxes it generates for the state and county, stand to lose even more revenue should parking become any more difficult than it is today. We suggested, in our letter of November 2011, that a business model be developed and analyzed to determine if enough revenue could be generated from Lookout Park's 77 parking spaces in the 3 month summer period to offset the infrastructure requirements necessary to install the equipment and monitor the lot for compliance. Especially if beach fee parking ends up resulting in a loss of tax revenue to the county from the local business community.

PROPOSAL:

For all of the reasons outlined above, the community feels strongly that imposing beach fee parking at Lookout Park would only result in encouraging beach visitors to park their cars along the commercial and residential streets that are already impacted by a limited number of spaces. We understand and support that our county parks need to create revenue and in fact proposed several alternative revenue raising opportunities for the park in our letter of November of 2011. All of these alternatives are much more appropriate to the situation in Summerland. Here is what was communicated to the County Parks department in November, 2011:

PROPOSAL Continued from page 1:

In addition to the already existing dog wash concession and soft drink machine there is the possibility for:

- -Concession stands for rentals or purchase of beach related items and kayaks.
- -Licensed food trucks, quite popular today and easier than permanent concession stands to move in and out of a location at peak times
- -Licensed surf camps, yoga and exercise or junior lifeguard classes in the park or beach
- -Promotion of the park as a fee paid venue for weddings, reunions and parties during park hours
- -Use of the abandoned park ranger area and the western end of the park for fee paid special events and/or staging areas for commercial uses during park hours including film locations or catalog shots.
- -The wide open western area of the park is underutilized and due to it's proximity to existing restrooms is a very viable area to develop for special event rentals.

CONCLUSION:

We recognize that the County must find revenue sources to keep our parks available for public use. Each county park has a direct impact on the surrounding neighborhood in which is it located. It is our belief that the right answer for each park is not a cookie cutter, one size fits all solution. By working with the local community we feel certain that the most appropriate options can be found to meet the needs of both the county and the community in each situation.

What will become of our beaches? Will only the rich and tourists get to enjoy them, since the rest of us cannot and will not pay for our usual walk of 20 to 30 minutes once or twice a day? at a cost of \$2 or 3 a pop. Dear Supervisors and Park Commission personnel,

I am a Santa Barbara Native and 3 generations before me have lived here. I do not support fees of any kind for parking at the county beaches of Goleta Beach, Arroyo Burro, Lookout Point, Loons Point, or Rincon Point. If you implement any sort of parking fee, you will be changing the small town beach community feel that is so attractive to all who live and visit here.

Many people can not afford any parking fees; you will be discriminating against those who struggle to live in Santa Barbara, the young, the elderly on fixed incomes, single parents, and everyone in between. Teachers will not be able to take students to the beach. Teenagers will stay home and play video games instead of getting the benefits of exercise and communing with nature as they don't have the money to pay for parking. Your staff states that you may clear \$500,000 per year and exclude 25% of your "customers." That's right they use the term "customers" not residents or visitors.

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

In recent weeks it has been learned that Santa Barbara County, in California is considering a move to begin charging for parking at it's County Beach Parks.

Times are tough, right? And one must preserve the bottom line of the City and County Corporations right?

Well, yes, but let's take a short look at beach access. What beach access is for many users, is a historically vetted and well known means of approaching the Ocean and that part of widely held, common and public property which exists from the mean high tide line on out to Sea. I am writing in opposition of the proposed beach use parking fees for Goleta Beach, Arroyo Burro, Lookout Point, Loons Point, and Rincon Point.

It appears that the county is lacking funds, and is looking to generate income from public beach resources. I have heard that the projected income from beach parking fees would be around \$500K per year.

I understand the County's position. There is a budget to fulfill and no funds from the State. Perhaps there is another solution to this dilemma, a "win-win". I propose we cut expenses instead of instigating new fees. I am sure you have heard this "austerity" argument before. It may be time to act on it.

In particular, I would like to focus on lawns in County Parks. Lawns provide significant recreational value, though they are very resource intensive. Furthermore, amny lawn areas sit unused for a large majority of the time, so the money spent to maintain them is in effect poured down the drain to the ocean. I propose we reduce the lawn area in the County by 10%, which would free up the \$500,000 in funds. Reducing lawns by 20% would be better, but lets start here perhaps. See below for my calculations, and please edit if inaccurate.

I was unable to find accurate information on the acreage of lawns in SB County, but I will estimate/assume there are around 1000 acres of turf in SB County (25% of the 8000 acres of parks). The average lawn costs around \$1000/acre/year to maintain (source: http://www.lawntimes.com/showthread.php?t=6767). This only includes labor and materials (fertilizer, herbicide, etc) to care for the lawn, not the water.

Lawns use around 500,000 to 1,500,000 gallons of water per acre per year (source: California Economic Policy Vol.2, No.2., http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/archives/parsons/turf/publications/water.html). So this means that 1000 acres of turf in SB County parks consume around 10 million gallons of water per year (average 1 million gallons per acre).

The rate that I could find for recreational water use was around \$3/HCF in SB County. At this rate, a 1 acre lawn lawn consuming 1,000,000 gals per year (= 10,000 HCF) costs \$30,000/acre/year FOR WATER ONLY to a private party (?).

The COST to deliver state water is around \$1500/acre foot, or around \$.40/HCF X 10,000 = \$4000/acre COST (source: http://www.santabarbaraca.gov/Resident/Water/FAQ/FAQs.htm). (I was unable to find data for non-state water cost.)

So we are looking at 1000 acres, at a cost of \$5,000/acre/year (\$1000/ac/yr maintenance + \$4000/ac/yr for water). Therefor by my calculations it costs the county roughly \$5 million per year to maintain the lawns in the parks. (Is there a budget item for this?)

If we cut out 10% of the lawn area county-wide, we would potentially SAVE \$500,000 dollars per year. (Is my data accurate?)

Is this enough to cover the income projected for the imposition of beach use fees, while promoting our wise use of water and resources in the County?

To Whom it may concern:

I heard recently that there is a plan or decision to charge for parking at some county beach parks. I wanted to discuss the specific needs of birdwatchers, since these are different to those of most users. Most birders visiting somewhere like Goleta Beach typically just stop by for 15-20 minutes. This location is sufficiently good for birds to justify being there much longer. Depending on the fee model, charging for parking could basically eliminate birding at these sites for the following reasons:

- 1. Parks (e.g. state parks or county ones like Cachuma) tend to charge a high flat fee (like \$5-8) to get into the park. While this may be OK for a family visiting for several hours, it doesn't work for a lone birdwatcher who wants to check the area quickly. So unless the area justifies a 3-4 hour birding stop, the flat fee basically eliminates birders (I never go to Cachuma or Jalama for example).
- 2. Therefore we definitely need a fee structure that works for short visits. Something like \$1 for half an hour is a lot more palatable.
- 3. The other option that can help is a relatively low-cost annual pass in the \$30-45 range like the Forest Adventure Pass. I used to use this for the State parks like El Capitan and Refugio Beach until they jacked up the price to \$70 and \$100+. Now I don't visit these parks regularly and if I do, I just park outside and walk in.

Dear Supervisors, Dear County Parks Department,

As a local resident who regularly frequents Hendry's Beach, I am dismayed by the proposed beach parking fees. It isn't so much the amount of money I would have to pay, though that does matter, it is more that going to the beach is about unwinding and getting off the clock, so having to keep an eye on one's watch or risking a ticket defeats the purpose, which is to relax. Besides, the fees would result in people parking on nearby streets, which in turn would irk residents, so soon special neighborhood permits would be needed, along with more enforcement, adding up to a bureaucratic nightmare and little net income.

Recognizing that our local government needs revenue, I have a proposal that I believe would result in significant net income AND make beach goers grateful: How about installing Tar-Off towelette dispensers at local beaches? With the amount of natural seepage that occurs, walking away from the beach without black tar spots on one's feet is almost impossible. Residents would happily pay \$1 for the opportunity to wipe off. A family of four coming to the beach in one car would only result in one parking fee, but in four pairs of feet needing cleanup, so the dollars could add up pretty quickly, especially if a sign made clear that income from the dispensers goes to beach maintenance.

No enforcement would be needed, just someone to service the dispensers and empty the trash.

As an added benefit, instead of a bunch of angry constituents, our local elected officials would have the voters' goodwill. Doesn't that sound like a win-win proposal?

In representing two organizations, we many times find ourselves supporting common positions, which is the case for opposing charging fees at our county beach parks. The Boys & Girls Clubs throughout the county now has ten sites with over 5000 youth members and their families attending yearly. The Chamber of Commerce has close to 400 member businesses and organizations with an estimate of 15,000 employees in southern Santa Barbara County.

The Boys & Girls Clubs provides field trips to our local county beaches throughout the year from Carpinteria to Lompoc as a free service to these youngsters. In some cases, this opportunity is the only time they will visit our California coastline and experience what comes natural to most of us. If the Boys and Girls Clubs would have to pay daily for our trips to enjoy Mother Nature, we would not have the financial needs to support. And passing on the fee to our members is not possible. Close to 60% of these member families are at or below the poverty line. If I could put this in real terms, we charge a nominal \$20 a year for membership. Some of these families can't afford these fees and work it off or pay monthly as it is a true hardship to their limited finances.

We also know that a lot of our families do try to enjoy their county beaches within their communities on both weekends and weekdays. As Santa Barbara City lots and State Beaches continue to charge fees, and are unaffordable to many, the beauty of having our County Parks is the legacy of great locations, family amenities, and free and ample parking. This common theme transcends all individuals and families, including our employee base represented by all the Chambers throughout our county. The feeling of a pride of ownership prevails for all who have enjoyed the benefits and have already paid for the privileges that we have entrusted to our government to manage these pubic assets.

To even consider asking those that can least afford it to scratch together money that they don't have; or ask our taxpaying citizens to pay again for services already baked into our societal cost is questionable. The citizens didn't produce this imbalanced budget, but do feel they entrusted elected representatives to balance all goods and services of county government with a sustainable revenue budget. Don't continue to raise the cost of living on the backs of all working citizens as the path of least resistance. - a parking fee would require the country to hire a parking management company which generally requires a 3-7 %percentage of the generated net revenue, plus the hiring of a supervisor with benefits and two part-time rangers
- the written agenda states the purpose of these beach fees is to "create new revenue streams to support operations and generate maintenance" yet the use of this revenue is not required to be spent on beach expenses.
- Arroyo Burro Beach has 193 parking stalls, 34% of which would need to be eliminated to facilitate fee collection

Other Considerations:

- •parking fees would be an additional resident tax
- •impact on the only other option- parking in small residential neighborhood
- discourages customers to Boathouse restaurant and concession stand
- •a decrease in number of parking places means parking exemptions needed for utility vehicles and restaurant delivery trucks which further decreases parking possibilities
- •parking fee disenfranchises many in our community- residents in general, in particular our youth who have so few recreational options
- if actual beach maintenance cost is the issue, many in community organizations would volunteer for this need
