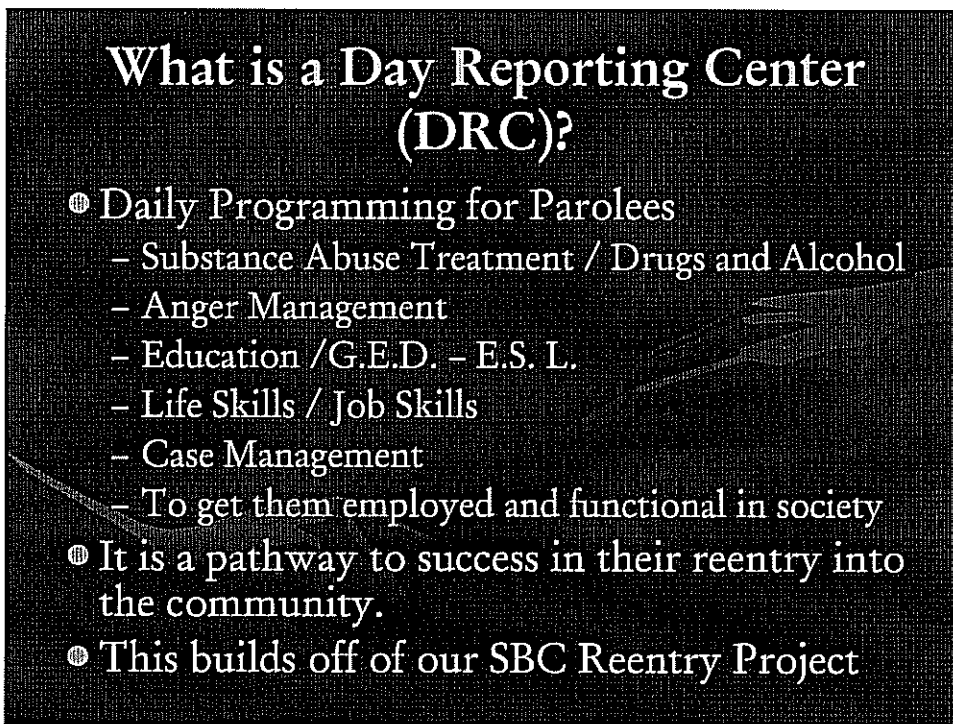
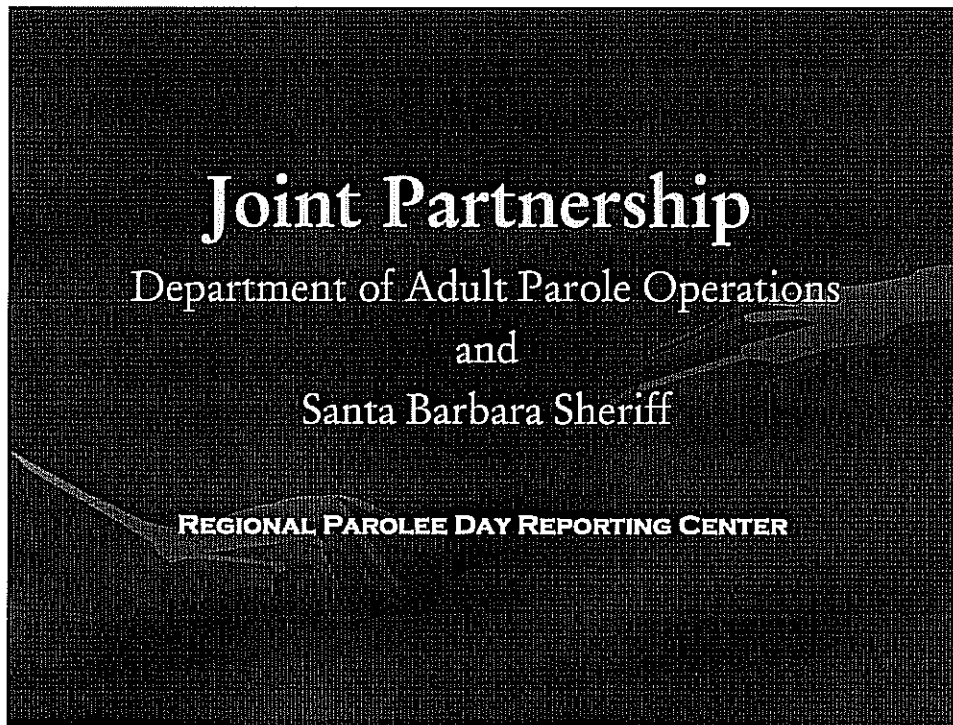




Why a Day Reporting Center?

- In 2008, 1064 Parolees were released to Santa Barbara County:
 - i.e. they are already coming here
- Unprepared to reenter society
 - From minimal daily decisions to hundreds
- Minimal Services are currently received:
 - \$200 less the cost of a bus ticket

Impact of Recidivism by State Parolees “It’s a local problem”

- Impact of new offenses
 - Physical damage
 - Emotional damage
 - Financial damage
 - Reduced quality of life
- Additional Governmental Costs
 - Direct
 - Indirect
- Jail overcrowding exacerbated

We Can Reduce Recidivism

- ④ SB County Reentry Project
- ④ 37% reduction in 1-year recidivism vs. random Control Group
- ④ CDCR's only real hope to reduce prison population and costs is to reduce recidivism.
- ④ CDCR wants to expand our Project via DRC
- ④ Best practices of Reentry Project incorporated into DRC
- ④ We expect comparable results.
 - If we succeed, CDCR will replicate this new DRC model throughout the State.

Operational Concept

- ④ Provide two State funded Day Reporting Centers
 - Santa Maria Area
 - Santa Barbara Area
- ④ Sheriff Oversight
 - Improved communication between Parole & Law Enforcement
 - SBC Reentry Steering Committee Oversight
- ④ Operated by a private vendor or non-profit agency
- ④ Anticipated Timetable

Santa Barbara County Responsibilities

- ④ Administer and oversee the program, and subcontractor.
 - Provide quality control
 - Verify achieving goals
- ④ Cost recovery from CDCR:
 - 30 % - existing Sheriff's Custody Lieutenant \$ 52,000
 - 25 % - existing Accountant III \$ 31,000
 - 5 % - Admin Office Pro. III \$ 5,000
 - Admin fee and other costs \$ 21,000
 - Total \$109,000**
- ④ Subcontractor costs (Reimbursed by State)

Future Benefit/Opportunity

- ④ Provides structure to add a County Day Reporting Center
 - Add-on subcontract for a County DRC program
- ④ A County DRC was recommended by:
 - National Institute of Corrections Justice System Assessment - April 2006
 - Blue Ribbon Commission on Jail Overcrowding Recommendations, February 2008
