- Started in 1986 w/ one student
- Now operated by 6 classes of ~200 students
- 6,000 ft² facility opened in 2002
 - Original exhibits 20+ years old



Program Overview - Demographics

- 7,000+ visitors last school year
 - Historically underserved populations
 - **Hispanic/Latino:** Lompoc 65.5%, Santa Maria 76%
 - Below poverty level: Lompoc 17.3%, Santa Maria 14.5%
 - Title 1 schools









Project Background • •

- Santa Ynez River Watershed
- Disruptions over past century (bridges, barriers, dam)
 - Fed primarily by water treatment plant and runoff



Wetlands are a vital natural resource

- Improve water quality
- Diverse natural habitat
 - Natural carbon sink
- Protect coast from flooding and erosion
 - Recreation and education

- Phase 3 Aquarium CTE Education Center










Cal Coastal Wetlands Exhibit • 6

- Allows safe interaction between guests & animals








Educational Opportunities
