That the Board of Supervisors:

Adopt the attached resolution authorizing the Chief Probation Officer to submit, sign, and accept the Juvenile Mentally Ill Offender Crime Reduction (MIOCR) application in the amount of \$1,000,000 for the period January 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008 to the State Corrections Standards Authority (CSA).

Counties applying for the Juvenile MIOCR grant funding must submit a resolution from the Board of Supervisors that includes, at a minimum, the authorization and assurances outlined in the attached resolution. While not necessary to secure the resolution in time to submit it with the grant application, the CSA must have a resolution on file before executing a grant agreement.

Background:

The legislature passed AB1811 which established Adult and Juvenile offender MIOCR grant programs and allocated \$22,295,500 to each program. These grants support local efforts to reduce recidivism and promote long-term stability among mentally ill offenders (Chapter 48, Statutes of 2006). Proposed projects must use a treatment model that has proved effective in reducing the involvement of the mentally ill in the justice system. Grant funds must be used to increase funding and may not supplant funds that have been appropriated for the same purposes.

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Approximately 45% of the 1,050 Santa Barbara County juvenile wards on active probation receive services from ADMHS counselors, therapists or doctors. This percentage increases to 59% for Juvenile Hall detainees and 84% for Camp wards. Presently 25% of Santa Maria Juvenile Hall (SMJH) detainees and 33% of Camp wards receive psychotropic medication. As medication needs of the juveniles continue to grow, Probation estimates of this demand were revised and budget allocations increased an additional \$90,000 for a total of \$150,000 to cover the costs of psychotropic medication for FY06-07.

The majority of these juveniles receive little or no mental health support or services in the community. Often when released from the juvenile facilities or placement, these minors discontinue their psychotropic medication. Off medication, their behavior becomes unstable and they are at great risk of returning to the juvenile justice system. There is great need to support the family and the juvenile in successful transitioning back to the community.

MIOCR funding will establish three Intensive Intervention Teams (IIT), one each in Santa Maria, Lompoc and Santa Barbara. Each MIOCR ITT will include a Senior Deputy Probation Officer, Mental Health Clinician, Child Family Specialist and Aftercare Juvenile Institutions Officer. Early screening and assessment will insure that minors needing an immediate high level intervention and mental health services are referred to the MIOCR IIT. The team will provide immediate crisis intervention services, facilitate access to existing community services, provide non-traditional services, build family strengths and build family skills in accessing community resources. IIT MIOCR staff responsibilities augment the current system and provide a continuity of care for mentally ill juvenile offenders by filling gaps in assessment and treatment, insuring equity in service delivery, and providing comprehensive services to mentally ill youth at critical junctures in the juvenile justice system.

The Probation Department developed this grant application working collaboratively with representatives from the Sheriff's Department, the Alcohol, Drug and Mental Health Services Department, the County Education Office, the Department of Social Services, and the Santa Maria Police Department.

Performance Measures:

The performance measures and data collection for the Juvenile MIOCR program will be specified by the CSA funding agency. It is expected that by implementation of this MIOCR program, minors will have more supervision contacts, fewer minors will be sent to expensive group home placements, and more minors will successfully complete their probation. It is anticipated that two performance measures would be attached to this project:

75% of the youth enrolled in the MIOCR program will graduate successfully from the program.

75% of youth involved in the MIOCR program will not have a new felony or misdemeanor arrest with six months of MIOCR program completion.

<u>Fiscal Narrative</u>: If the \$1,000,000 Juvenile MIOCR grant is awarded to Santa Barbara County, start-up is planned for April 2007 with the grant continuing through June 2008. Both Alcohol, Drug and Mental Health Services Department (ADMHS) staff and community based organizations (CBO's) staff will be providing Medi-Cal reimbursable services to some of the grant clients. The Probation Department staff will be providing some qualifying Federal Title IV-E reimbursable services.

The required 25 % match consists of a pro-rata of Probation and ADMHS administration/overhead costs that are part of each department's respective annual County Auditor-Controller certified Indirect Cost Rate Proposal (ICRP).

This grant does not cause the County General Fund contribution to increase.

Facilities Impacts: ADMHS and the Probation Department plan to use existing facilities.

Staffing Impact(s):

Legal Positions: FTEs: 7

ADMHS will need to add three fulltime Mental Health Practitioners. The Probation Department will need to add three fulltime Senior Deputy Probation Officers and one fulltime Juvenile Institutions Officer – Aftercare.
