

128 new COVID-19 cases reported in SB County

Santa Barbara County reported 128 new COVID-19 cases Friday. Four cases were in the South Coast corridor, which includes Montecito, Summerland and Carpinteria. The other 124 cases were pending. Thirteen patients are recovering in county hospitals. Another three are recovering in intensive care units. The total number of COVID-19 cases in the county is 8,687. Of those, the highest number, 24, was in Santa Barbara and surrounding areas, according to the Public Health Department. In Santa Maria, and neighboring Orcutt had seven cases. Elsewhere, 16 cases were reported in the nearby Mission Hills and Vandenberg Villages. Three cases were in the North County areas that include Stropoc, Camarillo, Garey, Guadalupe, New Cuyama and Gaviota. Nineteen cases were in Isla Vista. Santa Ynez Valley

Missouri is the latest state to join a lawsuit challenging the Biden administration's decision to allow California to impose its own emissions standards, and vehicle emissions standards. Led by Republican Attorney General Eric Schmitt, Missouri joined 16 other states Friday in a lawsuit filed with the U.S. District Court in St. Louis, Missouri, challenging the Biden administration's decision to allow California to set its own emissions standards. The Clean Air Act had allowed California to enact its own emissions standards if granted a waiver by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency reinstating the California rule.

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\$18 minimum wage campaign collects 1 million signatures for California initiative

After reaching \$18 an hour, the minimum wage would be tied to the CPI-W. Currently, the state's minimum wage is \$15 for large employers and \$14 for smaller employers.

The California initiative would raise the minimum wage to \$18, announced Thursday they had collected over 1 million signatures. The initiative would enact a law to raise the minimum wage at different rates for employers with 25 or more workers or 25 or fewer workers. For employers with 25 or more workers, the minimum wage would reach \$18 on Jan. 1, 2025. For employers with 25 or fewer workers, the minimum wage would reach \$18 on Jan. 1, 2026.
