State Mandate



- Integrated Waste Management Act passed in 1989 (AB 939)
- Requires
 - Diversion of 25% by 1995
 - Diversion of 50% by 2000
 - Maintain 50% diversion level
- Consideration of raising the required diversion level

1990s:

- Documented recycling rate of 11%
- Three bin curbside recycling program
- Grinding green waste at the South Coast Recycling & Transfer Station
- Extensive public outreach programs





- 1995: Documented recycling rate of 30%
- 1997: Implemented three-stream collection including commingled recyclables, green waste, and trash



- 2000: Began processing C&D at County facilities




- 2000: Documented recycling rate of 59%
- 2003: Mandatory commercial recycling program implemented (99.7% are recycling)




County at Estimated 64% Diversion Level




County's Diversion Level

- ◆ Forefront of the State top 10%
 - Innovative programs
 - Cooperative partnerships
 - Responsive public



County's Diversion Level

- Other jurisdictions in County
 - Low of 47% in Buellton and Guadalupe
 - High of 61% in Carpinteria



Future Programs for Board Consideration

Near-Term

- CollectionAgreements
- C&D Recycling Program
- Gain 1 to 3 diversion percentage points



Future Programs for Board Consideration



Long-Term

- Future Facilities (MJSWTG)
- Gain greater than 67% diversion level

Collection Agreements

- Develop one can service rate for South Coast
- Evaluate weekly collection of commingled recyclables
- Expand recyclables collection to ranches



C&D Recycling Program



- Implement C&D recycling program
 - Umbrella recycling requirement of 50%
 - Tie in service provided by unscheduled haulers who typically haul C&D waste
 - Return to your Board in May with detailed proposal

Future Facilities

- MJSWTG prepared Countywide Long-Term Management Plan – approved in '04
- Need new facility to process disposed waste to attain higher diversion level
- Conducting evaluation of potential facilities
- Need for regional participation
- Return to Board with costs and diversion levels associated with alternatives



Future Facilities (MJSWTG)



- Expand hhw collection capacity at UCSB
- Participate in feasibility study of siting a local MRF
- Evaluate emissions testing of conversion technologies
- Project phasing of conversion technology
 - Constructing a dirty MRF
 - Constructing a conversion technology or cocomposting facility


 County has implemented a variety of innovative recycling programs

Current diversion level of 64%

- Near-term opportunities may increase diversion level by 1-3%
 - Staff seeks Board approval to evaluate these

- Long-term possibilities include new processing facilities that will allow greater than 67% diversion
 - Alternatives being evaluated and staff will return to your Board with information when available
