I am writing with reference to the appeal for extension for installing scrubbers in the Cannabis farms in the Carpinteria Valley coming up for discussion in your meeting on March 10th. My family has been living across from the cannabis grows for the duration of the ongoing odor discussion. Specifically, in the La Mirada Estates area on Paquita Dr. Carpinteria

Last year my family was relieved to think that soon the unknown odors and air pollution emitting from the properties below us might finally be controlled. Our health has suffered. Our home value has suffered. Our quality of life has suffered. Now we arrive to March 2026 and learn that this might again come to no real change for the impacted residents.

Across the years I have followed the procedures- to report odor complaints as told to do by the Board of Supervisors and County Planners. I have tried to locate and contact who actually owns these businesses that often do not have corresponding business addresses. I have made phone calls to odor technicians early in the evaluation period. I have really tried my best to be patient with the wait and follow the procedures to report. In the process, I have lost so much confidence in the residents' ability to affect change.

I ask again. Please hold these operators to their responsibility to install scrubbers at this time as agreed. No loop holes.

Thank you for your consideration. It is time for this to resolve.

Thank you for all you are doing to mitigate the negative impacts of cannabis on Carpinteria.

I have known Carpinteria since my UCSB days in the late 60s. I have lived in Carpinteria with my family since 1990. I am 75 years old.

The rampant proliferation of cannabis production in our small beach town was ill-planned and uncontrolled. Outcries from community members regarding obnoxious odors and physical reactions from the particulates causing the odors were dismissed by the former County Supervisor as a "departure from reality".

I have a distinct and immediate negative reaction to the odors emitted during cannabis production. It is very real. Within seconds, even if the car windows are rolled up, I get head pressure and nausea. I have written letters in the past.

As recently as February 27, when I turned onto 192 from Nidever returning from Montecito, I was hit with the odor. I was surprised because I thought mitigation was in place and that I could use 192 again without any problem. But I encountered it three times as I continued home. I submitted an odor complaint to SB County PAD. Thank you for the means to do that.

More concerning to me than my personal response is the odor's potential effect on our high school students. I have often encountered the odor near the curve adjacent to Carpinteria High where my grandson is a senior.

Have proper studies been conducted on the cannabis odors drifting particulate into the schoolyard?

What message does it send to our students that this has been allowed to continue for so long?

And to what extent does it inure them to this psychoactive drug?

Please, this has gone on long enough. Do not allow any further extensions.

I ask you to deny all requested extensions. I ask you on behalf of our children and those of us who suffer from its unmitigated production.

In the bigger picture, I believe the county should be encouraging pot growers to move to a different crop. It was a terrible mistake to legalize marijuana in the first place, as research is showing just how dangerous it is.

Points worth considering:

- 1. Deny all requests for extensions** – the 8 requesting have had a year! to make changes to their Odor Abatement Plans (OAP).
2. Share your own personal quality of life issues and why the community is fed up **...enough is enough.**
3. *Autumn Brands* (3615 Foothill) and *Pacific Grown Organics* (5892 Via Real) are not on the list requesting extensions and have not installed the new tech; yet, they are not on the Agenda asking for an extension—what’s the story here?
4. The manufacturer suggests 10 Envinity units per acre (*already growers are looking to put less; we say No*); demand minimally 10 units per acre. **This is the only effective system!** Because the Land Use Provisions—*Chapter 35*—were only

minimally, changed we have no robust property line testing/monitoring, etc. SO, the only thing that **MIGHT** work is **PROVEN TECHNOLOGY**.

5. Of course, yes to the denial of Valley Crest's extension – they didn't start planning for this deadline till October 1, 2025. So what is the process for Valley Crest ending operations?

6. **Must require performance bonds** paid by March 18, 2026 for those that are asking for extensions.

7. The testing on Genesis Air, a new system being proposed by 2 operators gets rid of 41% of the odor at the vents, while Envinity is able to get rid of 84% of the odor at the vents. It's cheaper than Envinity, but it is half as effective. **YES to Envinity, NO to Genesis**. Genesis actually sells a more expensive system using carbon, but that is not what is being proposed. Has Geosyntec or APCD made any ruling on this new system? The recommendation is that CP1 & Emmawood will need to install Genesis by May 18. (2 months).

8. The 4 operators who are asking to install a Byers carbon system will need their installation completed by Sept. 18 (6 months). What are the test results from this system?

9. Extensions for ongoing electrical upgrades are the only possible legitimate requests, *though one (G&K) has the most odor complaints in the county so a denial is in order and residents will be on their feet and cheering. WE can't wait another year!* Also even though Glass House (5601 Casitas Pass) installed some Envinity scrubbers as a result of an appeal, they only installed 6 per acre in 2 of his 3 greenhouses and now that it is operating again it is smelling.

10. When will vapor phase be terminated ? - now or only when installations of the Multi technology carbon filtration (MTCF) units are actually installed? We need NOW.

11. TOO MANY difficulties with the new complaint form for odor complaints and the generic response received. This is definitely not a simple phone app and discouraging residents from filing complaints.

12. Will P&D staff begin conducting inspections on March 19 for only those not requesting extensions?

13. March 18 was also a deadline for P&D to check that run-time meters were working and the ability of meeting the requirement of 4 D/T at the property line. Will that occur?

Unfortunately the meeting will be held in Santa Maria, but the Santa Barbara Board room on the 4th floor will be available at 105 E Anapamu St. Meeting in Santa Maria will be at the Administration Building Board Hearing Room located at 511 Lakeside Parkway. **It is always more effective to comment in person.**

But you can also participate via zoom but need to register.

Re: Recommendations for Extensions for Cannabis Operators

As a resident since 1973 in the Carpinteria Valley and a participant in numerous meetings regarding cannabis rules and regulations, it is very disheartening that 8 operators have applied for extensions to install MTCF equipment for odor control set by the Board of Supervisors last year and I urge you to deny them all. They all applied for 12 month extensions, which fortunately is only being recommended for two of the growers.

1. In 2021 all of these growers signed a contract with the Coalition promising that they would install carbon scrubbers.
2. I agree that Valley Crest's request for an extension should be denied due to their late start.
3. A very concerning issue is that the machines being recommended are not as effective as the Envinity product and really haven't been tested, so why are they being approved? After 8 years Carpinterians deserve the best equipment. That is the Envinity with 10 machines per acre. Unfortunately, Glass House at 5701 Casitas Pass agreed to a lesser number at a Planning Commission meeting a few years ago and since they've started cultivating again, there are substantial odor issues again.
4. After reading the detailed requests for extensions, 2 operators CP1 and Emmawood are planning to install Genesis Air machines. In the test that was done in July, the Genesis Air machines were shown to be only 41% effective in reducing odor at the vents, compared to 84% that the Envinity test shows. Just because it is cheaper, the county should not agree to these. In fact, Autumn Brands that didn't apply for an extension submitted their revised OAP sometime before the deadline for applying for extensions and though I have asked to see the OAP, it was still under review as of last week. What does Geosyntec or APCD say about the effectiveness of this machine. How can the Supervisors agree to this 2 month extension without knowing their effectiveness?
5. The recommendation for 3 operators was to give them 6 months, but again for an unproven system - Byers Carbon. I know a few years ago Byers did develop a system for Farmlane on Cravens Lane, but where are the results of their effectiveness? These 3 operators haven't even submitted their revised OAPs yet.
6. I do see that Bosim and G&K have possibly the only legitimate reason for a 12 month extension because of problems with Edison.
7. Unfortunately G&K has promised for years they would install carbon scrubbers. Their operation on Foothill Rd. has received the most complaints of any operation. They haven't even submitted a purchase order for the Envinity machines.
8. **If the Board wants to permit these extensions, the cannabis operators need to provide a sizable performance bond by March 18th for the completion dates. These operators have delayed, delayed for such a long time in their commitment to the community to solve the odor issue. These performance bonds need to show that the installation of the MTCF machines work before releasing the bond.**
9. Vapor phase misting was to be eliminated by March 18, 2026. If any extensions are allowed, this requirement needs to be examined.

10. All existing operations not asking for extensions were supposed to verify their run-time meters and ability to meet the 4 D/T threshold by March 18, 2026. These 2 items aren't even on today's agenda. When will this be verified?

11. It is stated that on March 19th P&D will begin inspections - will this be for all, even those with approved extensions?

12. Pacific Grown Organics does not have MTCF machines, what are they planning to do?

13. Will Autumn Brands have Genesis installed by March 18th?

14. I have tried the new complaint link - it's not easy to use and the only follow-up I have received is that this complaint will be logged. I thought a phone app was being investigated.

Please protect Carpinteria's residents and insist on the best possible MTCF equipment before approving any extensions. Growers have had a year to comply.

As I sit here on Sunday evening, March 8, 2026, I'm once again attempting to put thoughts on paper. It has been 8 years now that we've been dealing with cannabis issues. Yes, 8 years, throughout which we've been dealing with sickeningly noxious odors, irritating lighting issues, and just plain bad neighbors. Our family has dealt with severe health issues due to cannabis and noxious masking odors, lost revenue, and an incredible impact on our quality of life. Simply put, no one should have to live like this. It's just not ok.

I am resentful! I am irritated! Instead of enjoying the evening with my family, I am, as usual, smelling the hideous odors emanating from Valley Crest, our immediate neighbors. And I am taking the time to once again write a letter expressing our frustration, sadness, and irritation with the current situation.

Seriously? Valley Crest is now asking for an extension of time to do what they have known is the best and right thing for our community? While we continue to deal with their impact on the community, they simply thumb their nose at us! They make absolutely no effort to mitigate odor, nor do they respond to our complaints.

They work after hours, they have yet to install motion detector lights, we live next to what appears to be a fully lit industrial park! Much of the time, their blackout curtains are simply not used, or there is a problem with them, or WHATEVER..

The odor is constant. It is unpleasant to constantly be aware of this and to be asked to file complaints. This is no way to live .. we finally felt as if we had a date.. March 2026 wherein something would be done to mitigate all of this, and now we find ourselves writing yet another letter, taking the day off from work to drive to Santa Maria to testify yet once more in what we feel is fruitless.

The new odor complaint form is a challenge. Neighbors have simply stopped trying to figure it out. There's very little follow through and county resources are stretched thin. Evenings, early mornings and weekends seem to be the time when the odor is at its worst, no surprise, there is no monitoring in the middle of the night, nor on the weekends.

We've had enough! Please do the right thing and make these people install proper scrubbers, the scrubbers that have been proven effective. Make them install the proper number per acre and keep them in good working order. We are asking for Envinity scrubbers at 10 units per acre.

When these bad characters would rather pay a penalty rather than do the right thing, there is something truly wrong with the system.

All of us do our part to keep the Carpinteria community safe and healthy for our residents, yet the cannabis folks are allowed to run rough shod over all of us 8 years!! SERIOUSLY?? When is enough enough?

Why can't something be done about this? It's the same old same old.

Please, do the right thing. Represent the people of Carpinteria! NO extensions!

To The Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors,

I was overjoyed when last March you unanimously voted to require cannabis growers to install carbon filter scrubbers. After years of writing letters, filing appeals, and speaking during public comment at Santa Barbara County meetings I finally felt heard. I saw a light at the end of the tunnel and believed that by March of 2026 the skunk like odors that emanated from many of the cannabis grows in my neighborhood would no longer be a concern.

Now, I know I was being naive when I believed that the cannabis growers would take the March 18th, 2026 deadline seriously and would do everything in their power to install carbon filter scrubbers by the deadline. I truly believed that the threat of losing their business licenses would be enough of a deterrent to compel them to comply by the deadline. Unfortunately, that is not the case. The cannabis growers continue to drag their feet, on installing carbon filter scrubbers in their greenhouses, by asking for extensions.

Santa Barbara Counties Planning and Development Staff's recommendation that 7 of the 8 extension requests be granted is extremely disappointing. It is difficult to express in words my anger and frustration that the skunk like odors may remain for another year. It has been almost 5 years since the cannabis growers, many of whom are now requesting an extension, signed an agreement with the Santa Barbara Coalition for Responsible Cannabis, to install the best odor control technology available. Those growers didn't keep their promise and we continue to suffer from the malodors. What is the purpose of having an agreement and a deadline if there is no accountability and no enforcement?

Please improve our quality of life by holding the cannabis growers accountable. The growers have had a year to comply with the March 18th deadline and NO extensions are acceptable!

Dear Board of Supervisors -

My family has farmed in the Carpinteria Valley for 6 generations. This community is a wonderful place. The residents of Carpinteria deserve to breathe air that is free of odor. We deserve peaceful enjoyment of our outdoor spaces. We deserve to know that our property values are not being compromised by cannabis businesses who do not care about their neighbors.

For the past 8 years, the cannabis growers have been allowed to operate without proper regulations. When my children were pre-teens they asked me what the smell was and why it wouldn't go away. My 2 daughters are now both in college, and the smell has not gone away. That is a long time to wait for a remedy.

For years I have attended meetings and hearings, written letters, spent hours filing the online complaint forms without response. I have even been forced into filing a lawsuit against 2 facilities down Casitas Pass Road from me, one of which is now a Class-Action lawsuit. All of this has been infuriating, time consuming, and frankly a waste of my valuable time. Nothing has changed. Finally, 51 weeks ago, residents of Carpinteria were relieved that the cannabis facilities would finally be held accountable and required to update odor abatement plans and implement multi-technology carbon filtration (MTCF) or equivalent, for cannabis odor control at existing indoor cannabis operations. Hooray! A DEADLINE of March 18, 2026. We thought we were finally being heard and the County would do the right thing for the residents of Carpinteria.

It is unacceptable that extensions would be granted. The complaints of hardship, equipment delays and electrical upgrades are exaggerated and a gross abuse of the system. Earnest efforts to take care of OAPs in a timely manner have not been made. It is also completely unacceptable that the Genesis system, which is only 41% effective, would be allowed. The only acceptable solution is the 84% effective Envinity system, installed at 10 units per acre as recommended. Genesis is not equivalent in quality or effectiveness and should not be allowed,

It is time for the Supervisors to put the community first, and to stand up for the citizens of Carpinteria.

Eight years ago, a decision was made to not only allow, but encourage cannabis production in the Carpinteria Valley.

The ramifications of that decision have been slowly played out and the unintentioned affects have been extremely detrimental and continue to accumulate.

The Board of Supervisors may have made their initial decisions with inadequate information, but over the last several years it has become crystal clear that cannabis production as is currently practiced has been a blight on the Carpinteria image, an ongoing nuisance and an actual hazard to many of the people living in the Carpinteria Valley. Furthermore rather than improving the counties financial picture the cannabis production machine has cost the taxpayers of our county millions to date with no end in sight. This current reality will continue to adversely effect all of us unless the Board has the political will, expertise, empathy, and resolve to move ahead in a decisive manner.

As many other letter writers have pointed out, it is another frustrating irony that once again the majority of the cannabis growers are attempting to circumvent, evade and directly ignore the proper course of action. All agree that the installation of Envinity scrubbers at a density of 10 units per acre is the proper next step and attempting to put in other types of units at other densities is not acceptable.

Making the decision to honor the Boards pervious decision and time line is the minimum that we should expect from our elected officials. This will not make up for the negative impacts that cannabis production has had on the Carpinteria Valley, but it will put us on the path to some improvement in what has been an expensive, embarrassing example of poor public policy with a clear cut enrichment of the few make possible by the trampling of the rights of the many.
