PROJECT HISTORY



- Summer 2005 Santa Maria City Council and S.B. County Board of Supervisors approve a total of \$150k in TDA funding for a pilot farmworker vanpool program.
- Feb. 2007 County receives \$70k in planning funds from Caltrans AWTP.
- July 10, 2007 Board approves agreement with SMOOTH to provide vanpool pilot program services for the County.
- Oct. 23, 2007 Board approves purchase of 9 vans from Kings County and submittal of application of implementation funding from Caltrans AWTP.
- 1st AWTP vanpool enters service on January 2, 2008.
- March 25, 2008 Board approves purchase of 9 additional vans.
- July 8, 2008 Board Recommendation: receive progress report and consider approval of contract amendments with SMOOTH.



PROJECT OVERVIEW

AWTP is based on a successful vanpool program developed by Kings County over 6 years ago.

- Purpose is to test if the Kings County vanpool model can be replicated in other areas of the State.
- County AWTP start-up funding came from:
 --\$100k S.B. County -- \$50k City of S.M. --\$70k
 Caltrans
- The County's program is now entirely funded through a \$3.1 million Caltrans grant (expires July 2010). No local public funding is currently being used.

PROJECT OVERVIEW (cont.)



- Benefits of AWTP include:
 - Reducing the number of unlicensed drivers on the road;
 - Reducing the number of uninsured vehicles on the road;
 - Improving air quality; and
 - Using energy more efficiently.
- As with Kings County, vans are used primarily from February through October. As agricultural production declines in the winter months, van usage is also expected to decline.
- To date there have been no accidents or traffic tickets associated with operating the program.



DRIVER REQUIREMENTS

Driver eligibility determined by:

- Possession of a valid CA Drivers License
- Clean driving record through a Motor Vehicle Report
- Criminal background check
- Physical exam
- 2-3 hour training and orientation

ELIGIBLE DRIVER RECRUITMENT STATUS

18 Eligible Drivers Recruited

-2 ACTIVE VAN POOLS ON THE ROAD (Average 8 passengers each)

1 Driver Fully Qualified - Scheduled for August Grape Harvest

1 Driver Fully Qualified - Waiting for Dept. of Labor Clarification (DOL Classification of "Supervisor" versus "Crew Leader")

2 Drivers In Process

5 Active Drivers - Returned Keys After Starting Van Pool

1 Driver - Laid Off 6/30 - 14 Yrs. with same employer - Employer sited "economy"

Transportación Para El Campesino

3 Drivers - Passengers reluctant to pay Fare structure / Under paying

1 Driver - Too many driver responsibilities / "flakey" passengers

2 Withdrew After Completing Screening Process

1 Driver - Could not develop ridership; stated private car pools charge less

1 Driver - Too many driver responsibilities/changed mind

4 Withdrew While Being Processed

1 Driver - Would/Could not attend physical exam or Orientation

3 Drivers - Length of Background Check Process-lost Interest; changed mind

1 Disqualified - Received Adverse Background Check

SUMMARY OF SMOOTH OUTREACH EFFORTS Transportación Para El Campesino

- Over 7,400 brochures / fliers distributed

Assumptions:

- > Each van contains 8 passengers paying a \$6 fare during 20 days each month; and
- Gas will cost \$5.50/gallon

With between 15 and 25 vanpools in operation, passenger fares may pay for approximately 50% of the program expenses.

Revenues and expenses may be impacted by a decline in activity during the winter months.

If the program achieves a 50% fare box recovery ratio, it may be possible to continue some type of vanpool efforts in the future.



TRANSIT GRANTS

- Existing State/Federal transit funding sources for ongoing capital and operations costs often require a local match
- The Job Access Reverse Commute (JARC) program helps fund transit for low income individuals to travel to jobs in suburban or rural areas in the State.
- It will provide up to 80% of the funding needed for capital expenses and up to 50% of the costs associated with operating a transit system.



<u>OPTIONS FOR FUTURE VAN USE</u>

- Local jurisdictions are NOT forced into a permanent commitment to farm worker vanpools.
- If feasible at a certain scale, jurisdictions would be encouraged to try and maintain the program
- Caltrans staff would assist the County in obtaining State/Federal transit funds to help pay for ongoing capital and operating costs.



OPTIONS FOR FUTURE VAN USE (cont.)

- If the AWTP was discontinued, jurisdictions are encouraged to evaluate other transportation needs and to use the vans purchased through the State's AWTP for those purposes.
- Caltrans staff would assist the County in obtaining State/Federal transit funds to help pay for ongoing capital and operating costs for any vanpool program.



OPTIONS FOR FUTURE VAN USE (cont.)

Examples of Potential Local Uses:

- Santa Maria and Santa Barbara medical facilities;
- North County commuters traveling to job centers in the South Coast. Example: alleviate overcrowding on Lompoc to Goleta/S.B. CAE routes.
- Capacity relief for the Guadalupe Flyer which has had 90-100 new passengers/day for the last 2 months.



SMOOTH CONTRACT AMENDMENT

- Revise end date of contract to June 30, 2010
- Increase amount of contract by \$800,000 for services, supplies, materials and equipment provided by SMOOTH
- Defines ownership of equipment
