Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Grand Jury Reports and Wellpath's healthcare services in the jail.

Please accept restatement of NAMI and Families Act!'s Recommendations of September 12th as in the attached:

- 1) That In light of the recent Grand Jury report on deaths in the jail of persons with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders, the availability of 24/7 mental health services in the jail is critical to the safety of inmates. The Dept. of Behavioral Wellness does not have the adequate bandwidth to provide overnight coverage, along with other programs of primary care and backup Mobile Crisis has pledged to provide as availability permits.
- 2) That continuity of medication must be a priority and must be assured, despite staffing shortages, lest inmates suffer serious decompensation resulting in crisis.
- 3) That oversight as defined when the original Wellpath contract was put in place be restored.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed year long extension of CFMG/Wellpath's contract for healthcare services in the jail.

In light of the recent Grand Jury report on deaths in the jail of persons with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders, we believe the availability of 24/7 mental health services in the jail is critical to the safety of inmates. It is the comment we've heard most often from colleagues and the community. We've been told on-call, overnight access to treatment in crisis, including medication in emergency, is within the existing scope of Wellpath's contract and responsibility. This being the case, such care should always be available when needed. Someone in mental health crisis in the jail should never have to wait overnight for a medical/mental health crisis response.

In addition, we are concerned that inmates on medications, both mental health and medical, are sometimes experiencing lapses in med delivery, either when they arrive at the jail and need to be bridged, or at times when meds have simply not been supplied. Continuity of medication must be a priority and must be assured, despite staffing shortages (if this is the reason for lapses), lest inmates suffer serious decompensation resulting in crisis.

Our hope is that any such deficiencies can be addressed in the context of the Wellpath contract extension, and the defined system of oversight the county put in place some time ago.
