# Background - Summary of New Funding Cycle

- Past 3-year cycle Board recommended a more strategic approach for funding Human Services Programs
- Fewer grants at higher amounts to achieve greater impact
- Resulted in a new 3-tiered New Funding Cycle Concept:

Grant	Grants Amounts	Program
1 year Mini Grant	\$5,000 - \$7,000	Capacity building
1-3 year Basic Services	\$20,000 - \$50,000	Basic Services, Safety net programs
3 year Best Practices	\$50,000 - \$100,000	<b>Evidence-based Practices</b>

 Priorities: seniors, children, freedom from abuse, transportation, services for non-English speakers, improved service access

# 2015 Allocations Committee Review Process

- □ Committee members individual access to ZoomGrants software
- □ Reviewed each application independently
- ☐ Used HSC Criteria and Guidelines
- ☐ Interviewed all 116 applicants
- □ Scored and ranked proposals according to criteria, strength of proposals, interviews, and committee discussions
- ☐ Public deliberations Friday, February 6, 2015
  - > Recommended supporting the highest ranked proposals
  - ➤ Funds remaining in Basic Services and Mini Grants went to medium ranked proposals after discussion
- □ Resulted in 42% fewer agencies funded and 65% fewer programs funded
- □ Clients projected to be served past cycle (i.e., FY 2012-13) equaled 114,688 vs. FY 2015-16 cycle of 117,688, an increase of 2,732 persons
- □ Full HSC Commission approval received March 5, 2015
- □ BOS approval required May 5, 2015

#### 2015 NOFA Criteria:

Proposals were recommended based on the following factors:

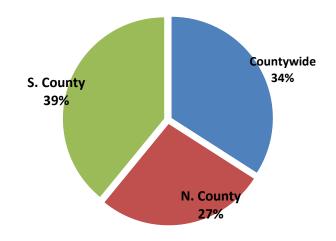
- Degree to which proposal met HSC priorities (seniors, children, freedom from abuse, non English speaking services)
- Demonstration of significant positive impact improving lives of target population
- Meeting County Poverty Study and other assessments of needs including unmet needs Countywide
- Whether a proposal was the only program/service available in a geographic area, serving a population in need
- Strength of program targets and proposed outcomes
- Agency capacity, experience, performance
- Best Practices: strongest history, experience with Evidence-Based Practices (EBP)
- Mini Grants: What would achieve the most impact with a one-time investment; effort to move toward EBP

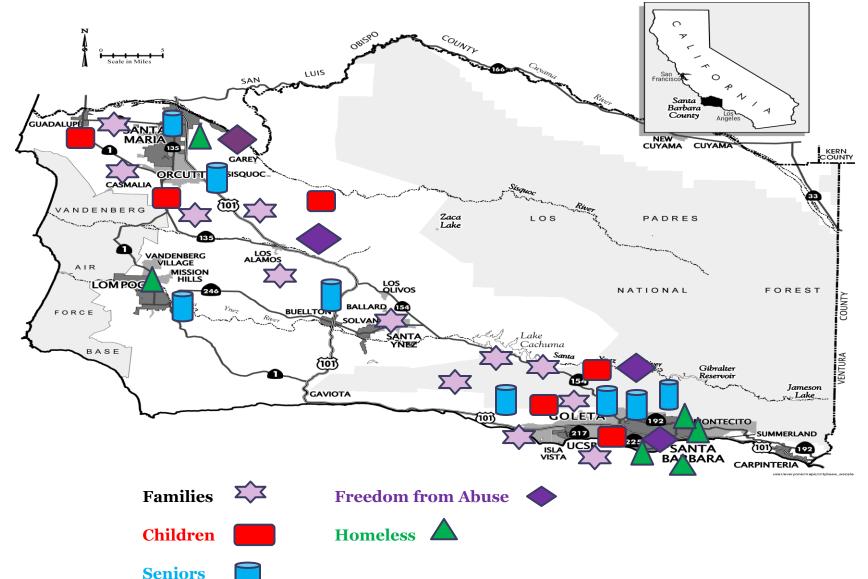

### Geographic Distribution of Proposed Services

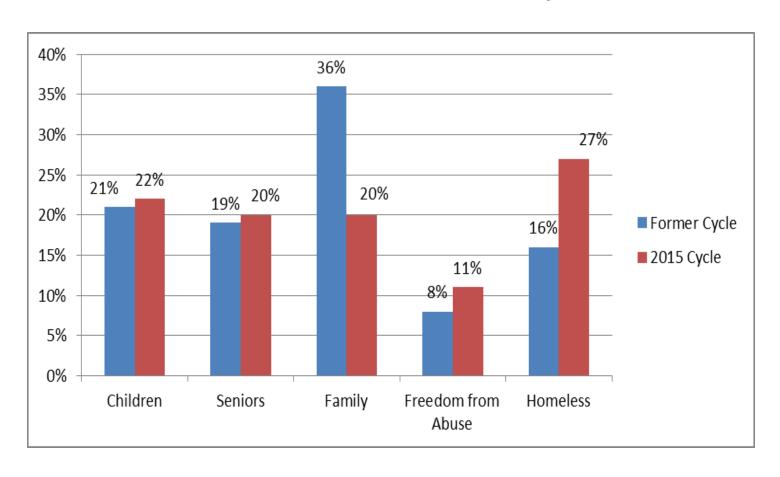

#### Recommended Actions:

- Receive and consider recommendations from the County of Santa Barbara Human Services Commission (HSC) regarding the expenditure of \$1,200,000 in Human Services General Funds for Fiscal Years (FY) 2015-2016, 2016-2017, and 2017-2018 to support twenty (20) Basic Services Grants with \$540,000 and five (6) Best Practice grants with \$450,000
- Receive and consider recommendations from the County of Santa Barbara HSC regarding the expenditure of \$59,000 in Human Services General Funds for FY 2015-2016 to fund ten (10) FY 2015-16 "Mini Grant" programs
