Dear Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors,
I am writing to express my strong support for the National Library Week proclamation scheduled for April 21, and to thank you for recognizing the vital role libraries play in Santa Barbara County.

Each month, I meet with our library advocacy committee, which includes members of the Santa Barbara Library Foundation, the Friends of the Santa Barbara and Montecito Library, our Library Director, and representatives from the Library Advisory Board. Together, we work to support and strengthen our library system, and we have developed a toolkit to help communicate the importance of continued library funding across all county libraries. While not every branch offers every program, the following highlights illustrate why libraries are such an essential community resource:

Books and More — One million checkouts. One million possibilities.

From novels to ukuleles, sewing machines to board games, the Library of Things expands access far beyond books. Every checkout is free, and every event is open to all. A library card is truly a passport to opportunity.

Libraries provide Chromebooks, hotspots, Wi-Fi, meeting spaces, and safe, welcoming environments. Whether someone needs to work, learn, connect, or create, the library is a trusted and accessible hub for all.

Support for People Experiencing Homelessness — More than books, a lifeline.

Libraries offer job preparation resources, social service connections, outreach support, and access to basic necessities. They provide a place to recharge, both literally and figuratively, and to begin rebuilding with dignity.

For Immigrants and Newcomers — Welcome in every language.

With ESL tutoring, multilingual collections, bilingual Storytimes, and workforce resources, libraries help individuals and families integrate, learn, and thrive in their new communities.

Educational and Enrichment Programs — From Storytime to career readiness.

Libraries support lifelong learning through early literacy programs, teen labs, 3D printing, coding kits, tutoring, workshops, and even opportunities to earn a high school diploma online.

Why This Matters — The library isn't quiet; it's powerful.

Libraries are among the last truly free public spaces—places where dignity meets opportunity, and where anyone, regardless of circumstance, can learn, create, and grow.

We understand that there are many competing priorities for public funding. However, beyond housing, it is difficult to think of a more essential and far-reaching service than our public libraries. Continued investment in libraries is an investment in education, economic mobility, and community well-being.

Thank you for your leadership and for helping make Santa Barbara County an exceptional place to live.
