# **Summary Text:**

On December 20, 2021, the Santa Barbara County Grand Jury published a report titled "Lompoc Police Department: Moving Toward a Safe and Proud Community." Today, the Board will consider the County's proposed response to the report, adopt their preferred response and authorize the Board Chair to sign the response letter. The Board is required to respond in writing to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court by March 21, 2022.

#### **Background:**

The 2021-22 Santa Barbara County Grand Jury report investigated how the City of Lompoc's finances have impacted the Lompoc Police Department and how remediation is being implemented. The Grand Jury found that the budgetary limitations have handicapped the police force. Over the last six years, the force has lost a third of its officers, and equipment failures have hindered immediate response. The Grand Jury report concluded that the Police Department has been underfunded for over half a decade, and there have been concerns that the City balanced the budget at the cost of public safety.
