Dear Supervisors:

As the county supervisors contemplate this final vote on whether to transfer the operating permits from Exxon to Sable, please recognize this for what it is: a corporate shell game implemented solely to avoid reputational risk for Exxon and to avoid financial responsibility on the part of Sable Offshore Corp, which cannot afford any substantive cleanup cost whatsoever in the event of a future oil spill.

If we recall that Exxon is the also the company that for decades had the highest quality studies of the environmental damage caused by the oil industry, and deliberately hid that research from the public, the emergence of a crafty shell game to duck responsibility is right in line with Exxon's longtime corporate DNA.

While so many Santa Barbarans would like to cease all production activity in the county altogether, we could suggest to the supervisors a less drastic step that might please all parties. That is: if Exxon wants the oil to flow then it should take over the pipeline operation and carry the substantial operational and reputational risks that this project poses. That way we could preserve the jobs related to the pipeline and make sure that a corporate entity will be standing there when - not if - there's the next spill.

If the supervisors took such a bold step, I would bet real money that Exxon would not accept that opportunity, and likely shut down the pipelines and the production platform altogether.

We do applaud the supervisors diligence and supervision over this matter for the past several years. We hope that you will continue to view this corporate ruse for what it is: a naked money grab by a very thinly capitalized, irresponsible corporate entity.

Dear Supervisors,

I am writing today to once again urge the Board of Supervisors to deny the transfer of permits to Sable Offshore. I have been researching Sable since it first proposed to acquire permits for the Santa Ynez Unit (SYU). In this time, I have discovered a company that consistently misrepresents itself and its impacts on California's oil markets.

Initially, Sable claimed that restarting production from the Santa Ynez Unit (SYU) would displace foreign imports and provide "cleaner" oil than from abroad. In February 2025, I presented an in-depth statistical analysis to the Board of Supervisors based on data from state agencies showing that these claims are false. Restarting SYU production will not displace foreign oil imports on a cost basis, as SYU's barrels are not more cost competitive than existing foreign suppliers to California. And the SYU's carbon intensity is higher than imports, such that production from the SYU would increase greenhouse gas emissions above and beyond what would be emitted if the unit remains inactive.

Now, Sable is claiming it has the financial capacity to safely operate the SYU, the POPCO facilities, and the Las Flores Pipeline system, positioning itself as a financially capable operator in the event of a spill or accident. Yet its financial record is abysmal. Based on its latest securities filings, Sable owes existing liabilities of \$1 billion, coupled with accumulating debts of roughly \$36 million in cash per month in servicing and repairing the SYU. In its latest 10-Q, it reported only \$41 million in cash on hand, which even added to the \$250 million raised in November, means that the company is teetering on the edge of a perilous fiscal cliff. Even if production commences, this is not a company that is financially stable to cover the costs of any disaster, let alone cover the costs of routine operations and repairs.

If the County does not grant its permit transfer, the company is effectively threatening to forego the pipelines and sell its crude via an Offshore Storage and Treatment Facility (OSTF). Yet here again there are misrepresentations. Not only does the company lack the financing to acquire an OSTF or to convert an existing vessel to an OSTF—which would cost roughly \$600 million to \$1.2 billion—there are no available OSTFs on the market nor will there be for upwards of 3 years.

Enough is enough. This company has misinformed, misrepresented, and mischaracterized itself since Day 1. I strongly urge the Board to stick to its November 2025 vote and deny the permit transfer once and for all.
