Hi Santa Barbara Board of Supervisors,



You know. I worked in the Tenderloin (TL) in San Francisco (SF) for FIVE YEARS (2003-2008). So, I know what it's like to walk the streets with a large houseless population. I did so -- 5 days a week -- for 5 years when I was in my mid-to-late 20s.

The reason that the TL had such a concentration of houseless folks is that the majority of services for that community was located in the TL.

As well, the SROs that try to support and house these folks are located there as well.

It makes *sense* to see such a large population of houseless folks in that neighborhood...

And, by the way, I have some heart-warming stories that I witnessed on those streets and I have some horrific stories that I witnessed.

Flash forward to today -- 2022 -- Santa Barbara.

A sleepy, coastal CA town? Um. No. Maybe 20-30 years ago.

State Street is right on par with things I saw in the Tenderloin in SF and that says a lot about the current state of Santa Barbara's 'commercial corridor.' Wow. It's unbelievable what this city has allowed to transpire on its most walked street! Incomprehensible!

Santa Barbara, apparently, is not equipped to meet the needs of the houseless folks that are piling up on State Street. And, maybe...just maybe...it has no idea what is happening to itself.

With a poor diet...you get mental health issues and a big houseless population.

That's just how it is.

Working with the houseless population is all about pain management.
