Dear Chair Capps and Members of the Board,

Los Padres ForestWatch hereby submits this comment letter in support of the Santa Barbara County staff report's recommendation of an ordinance to 1) prohibit new oil and gas wells, and 2) phase out existing oil and gas facilities/operations. We respectfully request that our letter be formally incorporated into the record and considered.

For nearly two decades, Los Padres ForestWatch has been dedicated to halting any further expansion of oil and gas drilling in our national forest and surrounding communities. Oil production harms endangered and sensitive species, pollutes our air and water, and worsens the climate crisis in one of the world's most biodiverse regions.

For decades, oil production in our county has put residents at risk from air pollution, contaminated drinking water, and climate-fueled disasters. Today, more than 40% of wells are located near homes, schools, and hospitals. Research shows that continued oil production contributes to asthma, heart disease, and cancer, while exposing us all to unnecessary risk of spills, fires, and drilling accidents.

The benefits of transitioning away from fossil fuels are clear. Research estimates that reducing operations could prevent \$54 to \$81 million in premature death costs by 2045. With oil generating less than 0.2% of county

revenue, the economic impact of phasing out is minimal. In fact, clean energy development and well remediation work will create new, safe jobs for local workers and help build a more resilient economy.

Under AB 3233, local cities and counties are granted the authority to pass ordinances, regulate, limit, or prohibit proposed and existing oil and gas operations within their jurisdiction. We encourage Santa Barbara County to exercise its authority and adopt a strong, equitable ordinance to phase out oil and gas operations.

The oil industry and its allies are already pushing to reverse decades of progress and return us to the "drill, baby drill" agenda that ignores science, public health and the climate crisis. The Trump Administration recently announced plans to open 400,000 acres of federal lands to new oil leases along the central coast, including Santa Barbara County. On June 23, the Bureau of Land Management announced it would be conducting an environmental review of facilities resuming its oil and gas leasing program in California. The County of Santa Barbara has a unique opportunity to chart a different path and demonstrate true climate leadership.

To ensure that the ordinance is effective and equitable, we recommend that the county include the following:

- **1. Prohibit New Extraction or Production Facilities:** No new permits for oil and gas drilling, redrilling, deepening of wells, or accessory production facilities shall be issued.
- **2. Nonconforming Use Designation:** Existing oil and gas operations shall be classified as 'nonconforming uses' and will be subject to an amortization period before mandatory cessation and removal.
- **3. Strengthen Infrastructure Language:** Ensure strong, enforceable provisions to prevent new or expanded oil and gas activity on surrounding public lands.
- **4. Just Transition Support Policies:** Commission a workforce development study and subsequent programming to assist oil and gas industry workers in transition to other employment sectors, with particular support for transition to clean energy jobs.

California is leading the nation in moving beyond fossil fuels. Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-79-20 commits the state to achieving carbon neutrality no later than 2045, and sets clear targets to phase out fossil fuel dependence. Local action is essential to meeting these goals. By acting now, Santa Barbara County can serve as a model for climate leadership and protect the public health of communities.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge the Board of Supervisors to draft an oil and gas phase-out ordinance and make this a top priority for Santa Barbara County. We further urge the County to complete this ordinance and amortization study in a timely manner. Thank you for your leadership and your commitment to a healthier, more sustainable future.
